



## **Black River Independent School Kicks Off Capital** Campaign

The Black River Independent School Committee (BRISC) has begun seeking the support of the community through their first annual Capital Campaign. The group is actively pursuing establishing an independent school in Ludlow which would serve all students in grades 7-12 of Ludlow and Mt. Holly. As of June 2020, Black River High School will close its doors. The towns of Mount Holly and Ludlow will acquire school choice, opening up the opportunity for the independent school to accept public tuition dollars. BRISC has already retained the professional advice of several experts in the field as to how this can be

The response from the community has been inspiring and the financial support currently received is encouraging.

The group is soliciting input from the community. Weekly meetings are held every Thursday from 6:30-8 p.m. at the Black River High School library. Anyone with interest or expertise is encouraged to attend the meetings and to contribute to the work in progress. The group's primary focus is to define a mission and vision for the independent school, Black River Academy. BRISC is seeking not only monetary support but also volunteers.

We seek to expand opportunities that provide high expectations, clear boundaries and strengthen bonds between youth and adults. We encourage and educate adults about the importance of being good role models.

BRACC focuses on pro-active programming aimed at reducing high risk behaviors of our community's young people.

BRACC's goal is to change the norm in our communities to send a clear message to youth that illegal use of alcohol and drugs are harmful to their health and future. BRACC is a collaboration of numerous groups, individuals and businesses in the community working for a common goal of safely raising healthy youth, with adults serving as positive role models.

As we enter our 15<sup>th</sup> year serving our local community we continue to expand our offerings and resources.

## This long collaboration resulted in a variety of significant accomplishments and sponsorships over the year:

- ➤ Grant funding through the Vermont Department of Health allowed for the installation of a second Prescription Drug Take Back Box in the Ludlow Pharmacy. Take Back Days in April and October have netted over 50 pounds of prescription medicines. We have also distributed mail back envelopes throughout our region.
- Presentations by Colin Andrzejczyk, to students at BRHSMS. Mr. Andrzejczyk is a noted drug and alcohol counselor who has been requested by students for the past four years.
- > Our Youth Leadership Group performed community projects in Mount Holly and the surrounding communities
- ➤ Held a Wellness Fair in the Spring of 2018
- ➤ Partnered with the Ludlow Summer Camp on a Fishing Program and Crime Scene Investigation course.
- Sponsored the 13<sup>th</sup> annual After Prom party in cooperation with Okemo Mountain Resort and other businesses
- ➤ Local chapter of Interact including doing Sticker Shock and instilling leadership skills in teens,
- Recognized Responsible Retailers as part of our effort
- Promotion of our message on electronic and print media, and Okemo Valley TV to involve the public.
- Supported the schools with special prevention programs, and the Substance Abuse Counselor and other staff at the middle and high schools. We work closely with the VT Departments of Education, Health and Liquor Control in supporting collaborative efforts with law enforcement to improve the school climate and education.
- ➤ We are partners in the Green Peak Alliance and are working with Turning Point in Springfield to establish recovery coaches,
- ➤ Partnered with Regional Prevention Planning Commission to assist towns with policy reforms around alcohol use.

#### To the editor -

I've always told my students that representative government depends on citizens being willing to participate and serve. When I was appointed to fill the vacated seat on the select board, I became a candidate for a full term as a selectman.

By way of brief biography, I've lived in Mount Holly for forty years and serve as vice chair of the planning commission. I retired last June after three decades teaching English and history, and my newspaper column, "Poor Elijah's Almanack," appears in the *Rutland Herald*. In it I try to bring common sense and a little humor to education and political issues

Thomas Jefferson taught us that "government closest to the people serves the people best." Yet while Vermonters are supremely interested in their town's character, state agencies exercise increasing jurisdiction over development, often leaving citizens and town governments all but excluded from the permitting process in their own towns. The legislature is currently considering a proposal to revise Act 250 which would further limit a town's influence over development within its borders.

State officials, through regulations and laws like Act 46, have likewise granted themselves ever broader authority to manage our schools.

I've found our interests are best served by complying where we must with state regulations so we can retain the most influence over those decisions. At the same time, I've testified before the legislature on behalf of local schools' and towns' ability to govern themselves. As a selectman, I would continue in the same course.

## Something to Write Home About Back to Work

**Democrats, Independents and Republicans.** In this bitter time in Washington, Vermont is a light of hope simply because we get along with one another. Democrats and Progressives are a united team. Both the Governor and the Legislature understand that, having elected divided government, Vermonters have indicated that they see value in our divergent understandings, and expect us to work through our differences.

**The Common Agenda.** As part of the Senate Democratic Caucus, I'm happy to support our shared priorities; paid family leave,

raising the minimum wage, clean water, addressing the shortage of mental health facilities. Drug addiction, affordability, and less burdensome taxes remain persistent challenges. Access to affordable health care is unfinished business. And Global Warming remains the overarching existential issue of our time. In that regard, serving on the executive committee of the Climate Solutions Caucus is probably the most important work I do as a legislator.

My Bills. In addition to this shared agenda, legislators offer bills on many other issues. I'm either sponsoring or co-sponsoring bills to do the following: Create a rebuttable presumption of joint child custody after divorce, allow expedited eviction of tenants who vandalize rental properties, allow qualified psychologists to prescribe medications, create a moratorium on Act 46 driven actions till resolution of related pending law suits, prohibit use of glyphosate herbicide, require a study of Civics as a condition for high school graduation.

**Committees.** My morning committee is Health and Welfare which deals with all medical, mental health, health access and benefits issues. My afternoon committee is Appropriations. We're considering the Fiscal Year 2019 Budget Adjustment Bill. Such a bill is considered mid-way through every fiscal year to true up overestimates and underestimates of revenues and expenses and shift resources where needed. As with the FY 2020 Budget, the Administration proposal is the template, but the Legislature does its own calculations.

**Springfield Hospital** Legislators representing the Springfield region, are carefully monitoring developments at Springfield Hospital. The Scott Administration is working with the Hospital board and administrators to deal with these highly complex financial issues. They've asked for time and patience to work things out, and for politicians to exercise restraint. I'm sorry to disappoint folks who look to their legislators to give voice to their anger, but I think the plea for calm and restraint is reasonable and necessary to work through the situation.

**Budget Adjustment** Since convening in January, the Senate Appropriations Committee (SAC), on which I serve, has spent most of our time on the Fiscal Year 2019 Budget Adjustment Act (BAA). The Senate has passed this bill which is now in a conference committee to reconcile differences between the Senate and House versions. The BAA is a true up to correct for differences between expected revenues and expenses, circa Spring 2018, and actual revenues and expenses, circa January 2019. It's also sometimes used as a vehicle for structural changes, but we generally try to avoid using the BAA for big policy changes.

**FY 2020 Budget** The SAC has now turned its attention to the State Budget for Fiscal Year 2020 (July1, 2019 to June 30, 2020). Under the Vermont Constitution spending bills must begin in the House of Representatives. But in practice the process begins with the Governor's recommended budget. It is a recommendation only, a template from which the Legislature works, but it carries enough weight that many of my colleagues mistakenly call it "the Budget."

Although the Appropriations bill is still in the House, the SAC is now considering the proposed budget, department by department, in anticipation of the bill eventually reaching the Senate. Witnesses for the various departments testify to the full committee. In addition, each committee member is responsible for evaluating the budgets of particular departments.

Civics Senate Republican Leader Joe Benning and I spoke to the Senate Education Committee to urge passage of our bill to require the inclusion of Civics in Vermont's high school curriculum. I held forth on the issue in a previous legislative report. The bill has met with some resistance based on the possibility of controversy. I think some controversy is not only tolerable in a

democratic system, it's desirable.

Constitutional Amendment The Senate Government Operations Committee has taken up the proposal to delete the Vermont Constitution's prohibition of slavery. I argued to the committee that being the first American polity to ban slavery is something of which Vermonters are justly proud, and that any imperfections in the specific language need to be understood in the context of the time. Vermonters who want to preserve this point of pride need to tell their legislators.

**Time** We are now a third of the way through the allotted time for the 2019 legislative session. Legislative Report, Senator Dick McCormack <a href="mailto:rmccormack@leg.state.vt.us">rmccormack@leg.state.vt.us</a>



#### NITKA'S NOTES FROM THE STATE HOUSE

Military days and evenings at the Legislature aptly describes what has been happening here this week. In the Senate Appropriations Committee, Major General Steven Cray and staff presented the Military budget for the National Guard which includes Air Services, Army Service and the Office of Veterans Affairs. The \$27 million proposed appropriation includes \$5.4 million of VT General Fund dollars with the remainder being federal money distributed through the state to the Guard. In addition to the money details, Major Cray reported that the tuition benefit program that was started last year to incentivize persons to join the VT Guard is improving recruitment. The program is designed to compete with out of state Guard programs that Vermonters have been joining in order to obtain tuition reimbursement. Along with businesses and schools the Guard has also been impacted by the smaller pool of available young people to recruit. In its first year, 35% of the persons signing up for the tuition program were women.

Regarding the plane situation in Chittenden County, the aging F-16 planes will cease to fly in VT at the end of April. Personnel will then begin training for the eighteen new F-35 jets that will arrive in September. Construction has already begun at the airport to upgrade the infrastructure to accommodate them.

General Cray left the Adjutant General position with the Guard today, February 21st and plans to resume his employment at American Airlines as a pilot. He has been on leave to serve as the Guard's leader. Today, the Legislature choose by secret ballot, Col. Greg Knight as his replacement. Brigadier General David Baczewski received the second highest number of votes. VT is the only state to choose its Guard leader by a Legislative election and it has been happening this way for more than two centuries. Other candidates were Col. David Graham and Col. Rosanne Greco. All campaigned in the State House for the position.


On another military front, Norwich University celebrated part of its 200th Anniversary at the State House this week. The State House has many Norwich related artifacts and art pieces. Historian Howard Coffin narrated the Battle of Cedar Creek in front of the large painting of the battle and reported on the contributions of Norwich alumni to the Vermont Brigade. In an unusual event on the front lawn of our majestic building, the Norwich Men's and Women's Ice Hockey Teams "scrimmaged" on our State House ice rink. They were joined on the ice by some young local Norwich hockey fans. To cap the evening off, the Norwich Regimental Band in full military uniforms performed for Farmer's Night. A nice evening for many local people. At the same time that all these events and more were taking place, the 150 member House of Representatives was debating H-57 a bill concerning abortion. They took a break from their deliberations at 6:45 to allow the scheduled band concert to take place in the well of the House. At 7:15 pm, the Judicial Retention Committee in a room below the band concert began interviewing VT Superior Court Judges who are up for retention this year. An action packed day.

# By request of Tim Martin the following is his letter of resignation December 11, 2018 from the Selectboard. Mount Holly Residents,

As you all know, the past few months the selectboard has been subject to the daunting task of hiring a new road foreman. As we drew closer to finding a replacement foreman, it became apparent that two selectmen had a conflict of interest. One selectman recused himself from the process. At this point the board decided to hire an HR professional to help navigate the process of finding the best candidate. The selectman, who did not recuse himself, claimed he could have an unbiased opinion. He decided to be part of the hiring process. We had multiple interviews and meetings involving the HR professional.

During this time, it became apparent that this selectman was interested in his own social welfare. He made several derogatory comments about an interview candidate before both interviews. He directly lied about a recommendation he received from the VLCT. At this point, we came to an impasse.

Tuesday, December 4, 2018, the selectboard met for a warned special meeting. I am very unclear as to how he came upon this information without violating the open meeting law.

Throughout my time serving the town, I have always put the interests of the town over my own social and personal interests. However, I also should not have to feel bullied or lose sleep due to the stress trying to make the best decision for the town. So, tonight with mixed feelings and regret, I am announcing my immediate resignation from the Mount Holly selectboard. Tim Martin


