#### Trout In The Classroom At Mount Holly Elementary

On Monday June 10, 2019 Emma Vastola's first grade class at Mount Holly Elementary School released trout into the stream as a part of the Trout Unlimited Organization's Trout in the Classroom program.

Trout Unlimited helps the initial set up of the program including almost \$1,200 in equipment to raise the trout from eggs to maturity over the school year. They also provide support throughout the year as ongoing difficulties can result.

Teachers who run the program in the class alongside their trusty budding scientists have to engage in complex chemistry

and consistent observations to ensure the baby trout survival throughout the year. This year at MHES, 43 of the original 100 trout eggs survived – a great number according to program volunteer and Rutland and Bennington counties coordinator, Joe Marks.

Joe Marks and Kathy Ehlers came out to the school for the incredible end of the year fish release day, on what can only be described as a Vermont fisher person's ideal 75 degree buggy day. The students at MHES hiked down to the nature trail and got right in the brook to collect bugs. They identified bugs to gather information about the health of the local stream.

Through examining the bug species present, students learned that the stream was indeed a healthy place to release the trout. After collecting bugs and an introduction to the art of fly fish casting, the students all

gathered to each release three of the fish they had raised from egg to baby fish. As the students came down the brook bed one at a time to release their fish. Many said an eager heartfelt farewell: "Have fun, fishy" and "Stay safe, fishy".

All the culmination of the day's activities, students gathered together in a semicircle of rocks in the stream classroom and reflected on the program. One memorable quote from the lively conversation included, "When we first got the eggs, they came out and ate their yolk."

When Vastola asked what would be the one most memorable thing about the program, an eager student responded, "We will always remember them."

Another responded, "We will remember to not pollute to help keep them safe."

The hands-on introduction to science and the environment proved invaluable to this group of students. Students learned life cycle science, chemistry, and environmental factor that play a role in the health of their local ecosystem. The hard efforts of all the volunteers who make this program happen are clearly being put to good use as


#### THANK YOU!

# A Tribute to Jim Osborne From The Mount Holly Community Association

Communities thrive because of the commitment of the people who devote themselves to insuring the on-going strength of the spirit of those communities. Jim Osborne was certainly one of those people for the town of Mount Holly, Vermont.

In ways both big and small, Jim contributed selflessly to creating, maintaining, and supporting this community. The Mount Holly Community Association will forever be in his debt for, in truth, it would probably not even exist if it were not for him and William O'Connor, who put together the first Board of Directors for the MHCA some 35 years ago. Essentially, they were transitioning the Belmont Improvement Society (founded in 1913 for improving the village of Belmont) to a larger organization that would encompass the entire town of Mount Holly.

Jim continued to serve on our Board for decades and, even when his health was failing, he continued to attend Board meetings and offer an invaluable historical perspective to all that we did. When he could no longer join us at our monthly meetings, the Board named him a Director Emeritus and he continued to talk about "things he had to get done" at the ComCen, as he called the Community Center. We remember Jim fondly, and gratefully, for two things in particular. He was passionate about the wonderful historic building that now houses the Library and Community Room and from the beginning believed in the idea that it was a community space that would encourage people to come together and share their common interests in this wonderful town.

Equally important was the role he played in the very beginning of our award winning festival... Cider Days. From the very early days in the late '70s when folks brought their own apples to the Green for pressing, right up to the large event that it is today, Jim was there making sure that Cider Days would go off without a hitch. For many years, Jim is the one who kept the press running, demonstrating once again the amazing mind he had for how things worked. The press became his "baby" and there is no question that Cider Days would not have continued through all these years without the singular devotion he brought to taking care of this 100+ year old machine.

Jim did so much for the MHCA and for this town and he did things because they needed to be done, not for any recognition that he might get for doing them. A good example of that was his yearly "job" of putting the raft in the lake. Probably many of you do not even know that that's how it got there! It would just magically appear in late June before Mount Holly Day. Who knew where it came from and for Jim Osborne that didn't really matter. He did what he always did...look out for something he could do to make his community a better place and then just go ahead and do it.

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



At Reinbow Riding Center fun and games go right along with riding lessons. Staff and instructors are always developing fun new strategies to challenge riders.

Even the long, cold, wet spring wasn't enough to dampen the spirits of those of us at Reinbow Riding Center. #### **Timothy Carey Is Vermont's Warden Of The Year**

Senior Warden Timothy Carey of Mount Holly is Vermont's State Game Warden of the Year. A game warden since 2013, Carey received the award in recognition of his excellent service from Gov. Phil Scott June 4 in Montpelier.

"I want to thank Timothy of his outstanding performance in protecting Vermont's fish and wildlife resources and serving the people of Vermont," said Gov. Scott. He added, "Warden Carey was chosen for his integrity, professionalism and high motivation in all of his work duties and that he has earned respect from other wardens and the public."

"Senior Warden Carey is a consummate professional who effectively

enforces hunting, fishing and trapping laws." Said Fish & Wildlife Commissioner Louis Porter, "and in 2018 he responded to more than 217 incidents and made 21 arrests. He displays a keen sense of judgement, treating all people fairly and with dignity, regardless of the situation."

Warden Carey also is a field training officer and an emergency medical technician as well as serving on the Vermont State Game Wardens' Honor Guard.

In 2018, he found an injured elderly hunter who had fallen and had been on the cold, wet ground with a broken leg for 12 hours. Using his EMT skills, Carey provided emergency treatment until a rescue crew arrived to transport the hunter out of the woods. He also administered CPR to a mountain biker who had experienced cardiac arrest. And he had been on many search and rescue operations, including a successful search for a downed airplane.

Warden Timothy Carey's district includes the towns of Clarendon, Shrewsbury, Plymouth, Wallingford, Mount Holly, Ludlow, Mount Tabor, Weston, Andover, Peru, Londonderry, Winhall and Windham.

#### "Life is Short... Live It Well." --- Switchfoot

He locked eyes with me as I passed down the side aisle after a funeral message at the Mt. Holly Baptist Church. "I'm Ed." he said, "I liked what you had to say. The gospel and the way of salvation was made very clear. I'd like to have you stop over to the house and see me." I said, "I'd be delighted, "and I did. After 20 minutes with Ed Beebe I felt like I'd known him a lifetime.

He'd moved up here from CT to his trailer on Dawley Rd. after a series of unfortunate events. He was thin as a rail and wrinkled as a spring pea. His wife, whom he'd cared for in her illness, had passed. I was welcomed into his ancient, humble house trailer and the first thing I noticed was his cats. Baby cats, big cats, skinny cats, sick cats, mostly stray barn cats. Cats asleep like furry donuts. Cats on top of the refrigerator. Cats taking a stroll on the dinner table. It was catastrophic. Ed's place was like cat heaven.

We became fast friends. And it's a good thing, because we only had him for a few short years. I have a clear mental picture of him seated across our dining room table laughing and joking with our kids. He touched our family.



I was honored to have him attend my ordination service and even more so to extend the right hand of fellowship to him across the communion table upon his decision to join our church.

I loved his stories. Like how he anonymously found ways to help families of the poorest

boys in his scout troop, finding uniforms for them, and even going to bat for them when they got in trouble with the law. He took on a Sunday School class of rowdy middle school boys and befriended them and impacted their lives with a love for God and His word.

When Ed Beebe came out of his hermitage and joined the warm fellowship of the body of Christ he was "all in." He found joy. He never looked back. He lived it well.

He was as regular in attendance as his fragile health would allow and enjoyed getting to know the folks at our church and at other gatherings. When we had his memorial

service (leukemia took him home) all I could picture was his toothless grin beneath a gold viking helmet at Jonathan's fourth birthday party. Our last son, Wesley, was born three weeks after Ed entered the arms of his Savior on Good Friday Eve 1990. A line from a Chicago tune came to my mind: "And there'll be one child born in this world to carry on... to carry on." Pastor Glenn Davis VBC





5. Reports

a. Highways

i) Update - Clinton Woolley reported: the Freeman Brook Road project is now complete; the cost for a new ditch bank mower is \$12,400; he has an offer of \$1,500 for the old mower; there are no offers on the second

mower only a willingness to take it on consignment with the understanding that it has little dollar value.

- ii) Winter Sand Quotes Two bids in the same amount of \$7.45 per ton have been received from Markowski and Pike. Mr. Woolley recommended Pike due to its coarser sand. Ron Tarbell made a motion to accept the bid from Pike, seconded by Jennifer Matthews, passed unanimously.
- iii) Municipal Roads Grants-in-Aid Program The town received an invitation to participate in the State program which provides 80% of the documented expenses for Best Management Practices on hydrologically connected roads so as to be in compliance with the Department of Environmental Conservation's Municipal Roads General Permit. Clinton Woolley will work with the Rutland Regional Planning Commission on the project with a June 30, 2020 completion date. Ron Tarbell made a motion to participate in the program, seconded by Jennifer Matthews, passed unanimously.
- iv) Summer Paving will be scheduled for Healdville Road from below the corner with Hedgehog Hill Road to the new bridge, 1.5" overlay when complete, with a cost of approximately \$82,000. Treasurer David Johnson noted there was about \$100,000 in the paving budget.

b. Treasurer - David Johnson

- i) Monthly Income & Expense Report David Johnson noted some highlights: the Town has paid the Vermont Education Fund; the \$5,400 item is for the start of the parcel mapping project; the snow plowing bills to Plymouth and Wallingford (total of \$5,700) have now been paid; the Solid Waste Income is at \$3,000 and counting over what was expected; the Highway Fund Benefit Expense shows a surplus due to two employees instead of three; Solid Waste Expenses are coming in under budget.
- ii) Late Filed Declaration Penalty Waiver Late filers of the Vermont Tax Form HS-122 may be subject to a town penalty if the town so chooses. Mount Holly has waived the penalty in the past. Ron Tarbell made a motion to continue the policy to waive the Late Filed Declaration Penalty, seconded by Jennifer Matthews, passed unanimously.
  - iii) Annual Financial Management Checklist The VT State Auditor's office puts out an annual questionnaire to check on

municipalities' financial management. There have been no changes in the town's financial management policies. The Select Board reviewed the checklist and signed.

- c. Delinquent Tax & Tax Sale Attorney Update Peter Perrino was not present.
- d. **Rutland Regional Planning Commission Report** Jon McCann reported that Efficiency Vermont announced a new campaign for free walk-through energy efficiency evaluations of residences and small businesses in Rutland County. These no-charge

walk-throughs, usually costing \$400-500, take about one-to-two hours and can result in significant energy savings. If the retail sale of marijuana bill passes out of the Legislature next session, towns will need to opt in to allowing marijuana stores. The Select Board will monitor this. The Shrewsbury Town Plan was approved by the RRPC.

#### 6. Old Business

**a.** Conflict of Interest Policy – The policy was signed by the Select Board for the period of June 2019 to March 2020. Jennifer Matthews stated that the policy will be placed in a Policy binder in the Town Office and it will be on the town website under a new Policies tab.

b. Swap Shed – Ms. Matthews reported she had received a call from a resident with a wood base available for the construction of a shed. The base was a bit small, but she thanked the resident for the offer. She asked if some of the surplus solid waste income might be used for the purchase of a new shed. Mark Turco repeated his wish to spare the town any costs for this item, but the Select Roard agreed to look at quotes for a pay shed.

Jennifer Matthews responded that she had reached out to Mr. Fitzgerald a couple of times. He indicated he was quite busy at present. No one knew if contact had been made with the State Police or with Jo Bania, but the Mount Holly Constable indicated in an email to the Select Board that he was available to help set up the service. The Select Board will put that information out on the Newsflash.

#### 7. New Business

- **a. Cemetery Issues** Tabled until Dennis Devereux could be present to discuss. Clinton Woolley reported that volunteers spent four hours at the Packer Cemetery setting up headstones, mowing and cleaning.
- **b. Appoint Forest Fire Warden** A Town Forest Fire Warden is appointed every five years. Jim Seward is the current fire warden, and he is willing to serve again. Ron Tarbell made a motion to appoint Jim Seward Town Forest Fire Warden, seconded by Jennifer Matthews, passed unanimously.
- **c. Propane & Oil Pricing** Cota & Cota submitted a quote to supply 600 gallons of propane for the Town Office and Garage at a cost of \$2.39 per gallon. The Select Board decided to put out an RFP (Request for Proposals) for propane, heating oil, and diesel in order to get additional quotes.
- d. Microcell Survey & DPS Letter The town received a survey from the Vermont Public Service Department to gauge interest in a proposal to help expand cell service in Mount Holly. Jennifer Matthews explained that the State currently has 220 uninstalled, 2G microcell devices, which are to be used to fill coverage gaps in cell service. The microcells can be installed on utility poles to bounce a signal about a ¼ mile. Ms. Matthews noted that a broadband deployment bill, H. 513, which has passed both the House and Senate, includes an amendment on microcells authorizing the Commissioner of Public Service to spend up to \$100,000 to assist municipalities acquire and install microcells; operational costs would still be the responsibility of the municipality. The Select Board agreed to complete the survey, expressing interest in the microcells but at no cost to the Town. Ms. Matthews noted that the Select Board had submitted a letter to the Public Utility Commission expressing Mount Holly's concerns about the lack of phone service during prolonged power outages, especially so with the unavailability of cell service. Ms. Matthews also reported that AT&T is to construct 36 cell towers around the State over the next three years with a goal of 99.9% coverage. Mount Holly is on the list for a tower location. Clinton Woolley said that the Planning Commission had received information about this.
- **e.** Town Office Roof Sue Covalla reported that a number shingles had come off the roof; she has picked them up off the ground. The Town Office has three sections with three roofs of 23, 13, and four years old. The Select Board decided to have all looked at and to fix what needs to be fixed, and to ask for quotes to do so.

- **a. Household Hazardous Waste Collection** Will be held at the Transfer Station this Saturday, June 15<sup>th</sup>, from 8:00 am to noon.

Mark Turco said that the matter would be reviewed. **Question from the public:** Judy Hyjek asked if there was a requirement to have a permit for a campground in Mount Holly. Mr. Turco stated that would fall under state regulations.

**Question from public:** Paul Barton asked about the fox face signs at Star Lake beach to prevent goose droppings. Clinton Woolley stated the signs were put up but had disappeared by the next morning. Mr. Barton said he will try to find some more.





#### **FACTUAL Information on Columbus:**

Columbus didn't "discover" America — he never set foot in North America.

During four separate trips that started with the one in 1492, Columbus landed on various Caribbean islands that are now the Bahamas as well as the island later called Hispaniola. He also explored the Central and South American coasts. But he didn't reach North America, which, of course, was already inhabited by Native Americans, and he never thought he had found a new continent. You may also remember that it is believed that Norse explorer Leif Erikson reached Canada perhaps 500 years before Columbus was born, and there are some who believe that Phoenician sailors crossed the Atlantic much earlier than that





And here's something he did do that you may not know:

\* Columbus was a brutal viceroy and governor of the Caribbean islands on which he did land.

He committed atrocities against native peoples on the islands and decimated their populations while he also terrorized Spanish colonists, according to the biography "Columbus" by Laurence Bergreen.

Those who favor renaming the holiday make the points that there were millions of people already living in North America in 1492 and that Columbus's journey encouraged centuries of exploitation of Native Americans.

For these various reasons, as of April 28, 2019, at least six states and 130 cities and towns have now renamed "Columbus Day", some replacing it with Indigenous Peoples Day to honor the original inhabitants of the islands where Columbus landed. Other replacement names are: Native American Day, American Indian Heritage Day, and Discovery Day.



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#### 2019 SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED BY LUDLOW ROTARY






