



SURPRISING SOLAR FACT: ONLY SOME VERMONT SOLAR IS CLEAN & GREEN

How's that? All solar is green. That's obvious, isn't it? Well, is a solar project that sells RECs green?

RECs are renewable energy credits. They represent the environmental attributes of the net metered electricity produced by a solar facility. RECs can be sold separately from the electricity output and for a ton of money.

The catch is when you sell RECs, you sell the rights to make any green or renewable energy claims. So a solar project that sells RECs no longer can claim to be green or clean or even solar.

Many if not most large scale solar projects in VT sell RECs out of state, and only the new owner of RECs can claim its energy as renewable. Nevertheless, these developers, after pocketing big money profits, still make clean and green energy claims, and their output is still counted toward VT's renewable energy goals.

That's double counting -- and is unethical if not fraudulent.

There are currently proposals to build more solar across VT, including some giant projects many times larger than any array operating in the state. If these projects sell RECs, they are goldmines for the developers at the expense of the state.

Fortunately, solar energy can be produced at great benefit to the local community and without selling RECs. There is an operating model called Boardman Hill Solar Farm that is being promoted by Vermont Natural Resources Council and Vermont Law School and is currently being replicated in other communities in VT.

This model is member owned, financed and managed and retires the RECs without selling them, so it is truly green. Yet it has lower costs than residential or off-site arrays, and is the only community scale solar project in the U.S. with a structure that the IRS has found eligible for the federal 30% tax credit.

Let's do clean and green and renewable energy in Vermont and let's be sure to do it for the benefit of the residents as a whole. Roland Marx

DO YOU KNOW VERMONT SNOWMOBILE LAWS?

• Liability Insurance is mandatory: All individuals operating a snowmobile, in Vermont on the statewide snowmobile trails system, shall have a liability insurance policy or bond in the amounts of at least \$25,000 for one person and \$50,000 for two or more persons killed or injured and



\$10,000 for damages to property in any one accident. In lieu thereof, evidence of self-insurance in the amount of \$115,000 must

be filed with the commissioner. You must carry proof of insurance and show it upon demand.

• Speed considerations: Under Vermont Law, Title 23, Chapter 29, you must operate your snowmobile at a speed that is reasonable and prudent, taking into consideration current conditions, trail traffic and other hazards present on the trail.

• The maximum speed limit on state lands is 35 M.P.H. The use of radar on snowmobile trails is becoming a standard practice. With the use of hand held radar guns, the enforcement of speed limits that are imposed on all state lands, has increased dramatically. Snowmobiles are subject to posted speed limits on public roads open to snowmobile traffic.

• Vermont has a tough "Snowmobiling While Intoxicated" law. This law covers both drugs and alcohol. While you will be charged with SWI on the VAST trail system, intoxicated snowmobilers operating on a public highway will be charged with DWI. As a result of this violation, you will be assessed points and your driver's license will be suspended.

The Mount Holly Photo Contest and Calendar are sponsored by the Mount Holly Community Association. All proceeds help fund activities in our community. • A frozen lake maximum speed limit: A frozen lake is considered a public highway and the maximum speed limit is 50 m.p.h.

• Accident Reporting: If you are involved in an accident, resulting in personal injury, death or property damage in excess of \$500, it is your duty to stop and report it to local authorities. You must give your name, address, registration number and the name of the owner of the snowmobile to the party whose person or property is injured. You must also file an accident report with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles within 72 hours.

• Equipment Requirements: Your snowmobiles must be equipped with: headlight; red rear light; windshield free from jagged or sharp edges; a fully functional brake in good condition; efficient muffler and such other equipment and devices as may be required to meet the noise level specifications of not more than 73 decibels on the A scale at 50 feet in a normal operating environment. Colored lens covers on headlights are illegal. Windshields are mandatory or the operator must wear eye glasses, goggles or a protective face shield.

• Helmets: Helmets are mandatory for all riders on the VAST trail system.

• Replacement Exhaust Systems: It is against Vermont law to sell a replacement exhaust system that exceeds the manufacturer's original equipment specifications. Violation of this law will result in a fine of \$300 for the snowmobile operator and a \$300 fine for the person selling the illegal exhaust system. No by-pass of a muffler system is allowed.

Matthias Weiter – Continuing the Series of Talks on the Middle East

On Tuesday, October 6th at 7:30 pm Mr. Weiter will present "New dynamics in the Middle East - how peace initiatives might supersede regional feuds." 



SELECT BOARD ~ SEPTEMBER 08, 2015 - The meeting was called to order at 7:30pm by Ted Crawford, chair. Ray Tarbell and Tim Martin were present. All stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

- 1. Additions/Deletions to the Agenda: There were no additions to the Agenda:
- 2. Minutes:
- The minutes of the regular meeting of August 11 were sent out before the meeting for review. Upon motions made and seconded it was VOTED: To approve the August 11 minutes. (3-0)
- 3. Highways
 - Fuel and Propane bids The Board discussed the current suppliers of diesel, fuel oil and propane, which was prompted by a letter from another supplier requesting to be included in a bid process. The Board agreed that there would be no bid process this year, as all were satisfied with current status.
 - Winter Sand Jeff noted that all winter sand is in, just over 3000 tons.

4. Report of Treasurer

• David Johnson was unable to presents copies of the finances, as the copier, which is his printer, died this afternoon. He did present some highlights. The town has collected \$3,380,000 in property taxes, which is 77.4% of the total. The

discount amount is \$135,000 versus the \$132,000 which was budgeted. Solid Waste label sales were \$3,873 thru 08/24, versus \$4,400 last year. Casella's bill for August has not arrived, but tonnage seems to be lower as well thru July. The highway paving is done and came in as budgeted; \$1,200 has been charged to the town office for the paving of the handicapped parking area. (Some of the concerns were corrected during the paving process, but we have not been revisited to determine if we are now compliant.) David noted that we are only in month 2 of the fiscal year, so there is not a lot to report.

• VT Grant Agreements. The State is now going to require grant agreements for state payments, such as current use and lister education payments. This will require use of the online grant system, once we are notified that we have been added to the system. David noted that many towns are authorizing the Treasurer to complete the 'eSign' for the agreements. Upon motion made and seconded it was

VOTED: To authorize the Treasurer to complete the online grant agreements. (3-0)

- Health Insurance rates: BCBS has notified the town of the 2016 insurance rates, which will be approximately 5.2% higher than last year. If the rate increases remain at this level, the town will likely avoid the 'Cadillac' premium penalty, scheduled to start in 2018. Even with the increases over the last two years, the town is still below the FY2013 cost of insurance.
- 5. Star Lake Dam Reconstruction Project Ron Unterman
 - Work is under way and so far is proceeding ahead of schedule. The coffer dam is expected to be pulled before the Oct 1 date.
 - All permits were received.
 - Canoes: VLCT provided guidance for selling the canoes as abandoned property. The process includes notices in the Rutland Herald for 3 weeks, and going before a judge with the accounting of proceeds and costs. Ron will work with Rhonda to determine if these costs will make it feasible to go thru the process, as some of the 9 canoes are in bad shape and not worth much.
 - The monument plaque honoring Patricia Nye has been ordered.
 - The Fire Dept. has applied for grants to apply to the costs of the new dry hydrants.
 - Interesting stuff is being uncovered during the excavating, including a 200 lb. metal door which is going to the Historical Society, hand-hewn logs, horse-tie stanchion and gears.
 - New Annual Dam Registration Fees: Last year, the legislature approved new dam registration fees, to be due May 16, 2016. The fees range for \$200 for a low hazard dam to \$1000 for a high hazard dam. Only Star Lake dam was listed in the letter; Rhonda will confirm status of Lake Ninevah dam.



Mount Holly Select Board and Planning Commission Special Meeting Minutes - September 16, 2015 Meeting came

Special Meeting Minutes - September 16, 2015 Meeting came to Order at 7:00 pm,

Ted Crawford announced this is an informational meeting on Solar and wind. Ted Crawford and Bill McGrath introduced Karen Horn from Vermont League Cities and Town and Ed Bove from Rutland Regional Planning Commission. Karen gave a statement from there member's point of view, that there is not a balance today between public good and energy production. The land conservation measures in municipal plans and recommendations of municipal planning commissions and select boards are given "due consideration". Also under the new H.40 energy bill that the State goal is to be 90 % green by 2050. There is a debate in legislature that what is appropriate for permitting energy facts from the Public Service Board. They also do not have any regulations in effect right now for the rapid growth in solar farms in municipalities. A 150kw solar farm must be 150 feet from state highways and 50 feet from abutting neighbors. A 15-150kw must be 40 feet from state highways and 25 feet from abutting neighbors. For municipalities to have regulations they need to adopt a zoning by law or standalone by law for wind, solar and hydro areas.

Ed Bove from RRPC was the next speaker and the RRPC has 27 towns in there district, Mount Holly being one of them. He asks the residents what comes to mind when you think wind and solar? 35-45% raised their hands that it is ugly. Ed also noted that there regional plan for energy gives citizens some voice on solar and wind in their towns.

Paul Barton spoke up and said that KWs was not registering on how many panels that are being put up.

The RRPC transportation representative for Mount Holly Don Richardson spoke and noted that 4 panels is 1,000 kW of energy. Ed Bove noted that there are 14 commercial solar farms in Vermont, and the one located on Route 103 and 7 was a 4.4kw solar farm. He also noted that there are 28 solar farms right now ready to be put up and ½ of them would be in Rutland County. There have been 150 solar projects accepted since January. It was noted that each solar company is different but Green Mountain Power has to accept power from all facilities. The question was asked how this benefits the town. It does not; it benefits the state which cannot reach its goal with small solar farms and only 21% sunlight during winter.

Another issue was raised as to the solar farm being put up in Mount Holly and would it benefit town residents? All the power goes to the grid and then is divided by the electric company. The neighbor across from this project on route 103 was concerned about the buffer not being any effect since the property has an up- hill. There whole view will be of this solar farm.

It was noted that property owners are leasing land at a significant rate due to increase in solar field demands. The Federal tax credit for solar is 30% and expires next year and goes down to 10%. The Vermont State tax credit expires in the next 6 months and there is a rush to get these projects in. You will see a high number of projects this year and likely to come way down in the following year.

Another concern was if there was any data or information on the health effects of these solar farms. Ed Bove answered; there is no new data to answer these questions.

Dennis Devereux pointed out that there is a lot of people from out of state buying up our prime agricultural land to get state tax credits in their states.

Paul Barton said that we are selling our land to outsiders and getting no input on what is being done, also that we live in a tourist state and he came here to see the views of the 4 seasons, not these solar farms.

Ted Crawford asked a couple of question to see what the public view was. The general consensus from residents is they are OK with residential alternative energy, but not commercial. Meeting was adjourned at 8:25pm

We are all experiencing higher disposal costs at transfer stations because of state law changes. Black River Good Neighbor Services is not immune. To generate funds necessary to fulfill our mission of providing food and assistance, we need to receive donated goods to

sell in our thrift and furniture stores. During summer, yard sales increase. Often, once the sale is done, sellers bring the stuff that could not be sold to BRGNS and leave it in the donation box or on the ground outside our door. We understand that this is done with the best of intentions, but if the item did not sell in a yard sale, we are not likely to sell it in our store either.

Please realize that the unintended consequence of donations that we cannot sell is less money available for us to buy food because we now have to pay new fees when we dispose of unsalable goods. Unfortunately, this is our new reality. As a result we must limit the quality of goods we accept so that we do not diminish mission fulfillment by paying excessive disposal costs.

The best way for you to help us is to be extra careful in what you donate. This is particularly true of furniture and mattresses. Leaving a couch outside for even one night in heavy dew will ruin it. If it smells, is torn or is badly stained it becomes a burden to us rather than a blessing. The transfer station considers mattresses and furniture to be construction/demolition waste, assessed by the pound. A wet item becomes an expensive liability.

As a result of the increased disposal fees, the BRGNS Board of Directors has charged our employees and volunteers with being more careful in accepting donations. They have a good understanding of what will and will not sell in our stores. Please be understanding if we refuse a donation. We are grateful that you thought of us, and that you care enough to help. Going forward as in the past, we are guided by our mission of providing help to those in need. We don't want that mission unnecessarily diminished. Sincerely, Peter J. 



Orson Welles in a "Touch of Evil", FOLA's Next Ludlow Movie, Oct. 3

The next FOLA film, a "Touch of Evil", will appear on Saturday, October 3 at 7 PM at the Ludlow Town Hall Auditorium, featuring an all-star cast in the last, and probably greatest, of Hollywood's film noir era.

Touch of Evil is a 1958 American film noir crime thriller film, written, directed by, and co-starring Orson Welles. The screenplay was loosely based on the novel Badge of Evil by Whit Masterson. Along with Welles, the cast includes Charlton Heston, Janet Leigh, Joseph Calleia, Akim Tamiroff, and Marlene Dietrich. Also appearing in lesser roles are Joseph Cotton, Dennis Weaver, and Zsa Zsa Gabor.

Touch of Evil is one of the last examples of film noir in the genre's classic era (from the early 1940s until the late 1950s). Since its release, the film's reputation has grown in stature, and it is now widely regarded as one of Welles's best films. In 1993, Touch of Evil was selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry by the Library of Congress as being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant". The film was placed #64 on American Film Institute's "100 Years, 100 Thrills" list.

Basically, a "Touch of Evil" is a story about a Mexican narcotics investigator confronting a lying, crooked police captain and the subsequent action that takes place as a consequence.

A number of leading actors, anxious to work with Welles, agreed to participate in the film, some, like Joseph Cotton, not even being included in the film's credits. According to Chalton Heston, Welles was originally only to act in the film. But, as events later proved, he also directed and wrote the film's script.

Janet Leigh recalled how Welles asked for input from the actors in the cast:

It started with rehearsals. We rehearsed two weeks prior to shooting, which was unusual. We rewrote most of the dialogue, all of us, which was also unusual, and Mr. Welles always wanted our input. It was a collective effort, and there was such a surge of participation, of creativity, of energy. You could feel the pulse growing as we rehearsed. You felt you were inventing something as you went along. Mr. Welles wanted to seize every moment. He didn't want one bland moment. He made you feel you were involved in a wonderful event that was happening before your eyes.

NO SOLAR OR WIND PROJECTS IN MOUNT HOLLY Planning Commission Makes Decision

At its regular meeting on Monday, September 21, the Mount Holly Planning Commission unexpectedly went into executive session to consider a proposal by *SunCommon* for a community net-metering solar array on Route 103 near Bowlsville Road. The Commission emerged with a policy against the development of community solar and wind projects in Mount Holly.

This action by the Planning Commission appears to be in response to a rapidly unfolding story: *SunCommon* applied to the Vermont Public Service Board (PSB) for permission to build the solar array. The Town was notified and the Select Board, at its regular meeting on September 8, made three decisions: 1. To seek "party status", in order to have input into the PSB hearings. 2. To hold a special public meeting on the current law regarding the siting of solar and wind energy projects in towns. 3. To hear the opinions of town residents on such projects.

On September 16 about 100 residents attended the special public meeting (announced on the Mount Holly Flash). The meeting was generally informational with citizen input.

However, the Planning Commission on September 21 avoided any public input on the *SunCommon* proposal, but then - in executive session (against the provisions of the Open Meeting Law) - it went a step further to announce a policy limiting solar and wind energy development. It will make this recommendation to the Select Board and has the legal basis to make the recommendation to the PSB.

It appears that the future of clean energy development in Mount Holly – with both positive and negative implications for our economy, energy costs, development, environment, and general beauty – may be in the hands of the Select Board. As one member of the Select Board is a voting member of the Planning Commission and another is an ex-officio member, the resulting decision may be pre-determined.

To my mind, the Select Board needs strong citizen input at its next meeting on October 13 to counteract - or confirm - the recommendations it will receive from the Planning Commission.

Following that the Planning Commission needs to revise – with vigorous public and professional input – the Energy chapter of the Town Plan, hold public hearings, and submit the result to the Select Board for adoption. A Town Plan that clearly states the position and policies of its citizens is a powerful tool through which the Town can be heard and can influence decisions by the PSB.

COVE works hard to enhance senior independence through advocating for low-income subsidies for such things as home heating and prescription drug coverage, as well as transportation and kinship rights. 


