Mt. Holly School Board Meeting

The Mt. Holly school board met on Wednesday, September 6 at Mt.

Holly Elementary School. There was discussion about the financial report. The board approved posting a position for a .2 fte enrichment teacher to assist advanced students in pursuing more enrichment. Mr. Hutt Vater reported that there are 111 students in the school this year, with many new students in the 3/4 classroom. He explained some of the strategies that the team of teachers will employ in order to effectively teach this large group of students. The board also discussed the changes made as a result of the Consolidated Federal Program grant reductions.

The board discussed in the carousel meeting the work being done by the Looking Forward Steering committee. They also discussed the Health Insurance Recapture process that will begin soon and its impact on the budget. The board ratified the

teachers' master agreement for the 2017-2018 school year. The next meeting will be a special carousel meeting to discuss the recommended proposal of the Looking Forward Steering





<u>A reminder that Mount Holly has a leash law</u>, and dogs must be restrained from running at large. A dog is considered to be restrained from running at large when it is kept upon the property of its owner, or is kept within an enclosure, or is kept on a leash or is under the immediate control of its owner. Please keep your dogs secured on your property either on a run, kennel, fenced yard or electric fence.

All dogs over the age of six months must be licensed in the State of Vermont. If you have not obtained a license yet, please visit the Town Office as soon as possible. You will need an up-to- date rabies certificate.

Each dog shall wear a collar or harness with the current license attached. Violations can include a civil citation and/or removal of the dog from the residence.

On some occasions, dogs wander off their property, please do not bring a dog in your home or garage unless you know the owner. Often the stray dog will return home on their own.

How To Slay a Dragon

Rabbi Michael Weisser and his wife, Julie, had just moved from New York City to take a job in Lincoln, Nebraska. It was a Sunday afternoon and they were unpacking when the phone rang. A menacing voice on the other



end said, "You'll be sorry you ever moved into that house, Jewboy!" (click).

The rabbi called the police who took a report saying they had a hunch who it might be: Larry Trapp, a white supremacist and Grand Dragon White of the Knights of the KKK. At first, the Weissers locked their doors. warned their kids, and worried themselves sick. A thick package arrived full of anti-

black, anti-semitic brochures and the business card had a note, "The KKK is watching you, scum!" The rabbi just wanted to scream, "Leave my family alone!" Then he decided to do the unexpected. After a particularly onerous diatribe from this double amputee spewing out his hate-filled venom against "Asians running this country," Michael decided to contact Larry. He began leaving little phone messages: "Larry, you're going to have to answer to God for all this hatred one day." or "Larry, there's a lot of love out there. You're not getting any of it. Don't you want some?" or "Why do you love the Nazis so much? They'd have killed you first because you're disabled." Julie said, "Hon, if he answers say something nice."

One day Larry figured it out and called back screaming, "Why are you hassling me?" Michael refused to hate back and said, "I don't want to hassle you. I heard you're disabled. I thought you might need a ride to the grocery." There was a long silence. "I've got that covered. Don't call me. This is my business, phone!" One night the rabbi's phone rang. "Is this the rabbi?" "Yes, Larry." After a long pause, the Grand Dragon said, "I wanna get out of this and I don't know how!" The reply was, "If you wanna talk, we'll come over."

Later, Michael's son said, "You're not going to do it, are you?" Dad replied, "Yeah, I'm gonna go. I'll pick up some chicken and go to his house. He pleaded, "Dad when a Nazi wants to have you for dinner he means it literally." Michael and Julie went to Trapp's apartment. Larry met them at the door with an automatic weapon laid across his wheelchair. He reached out his hand and as the rabbi shook it, the KKK Dragon burst into tears. The three talked for hours. That night, over chicken dinner, this lonely man decided he was going to live a different way. Eventually, they made a trade: for their love, Larry gave them his swastika rings, his hate tracts, his tattered copy of Hitler's *Mein Kampf* and a collection of white robes and hoods. "Take 'em all away," he said.

Soon thereafter, the Weissers moved Larry into one of their bedrooms as his health deteriorated. Julie gave up her job to become his caretaker and confidante. Larry began calling people to apologize and spoke at the high school against racism. Nine months later, "Uncle" Larry died in the rabbi's home, a better man than he'd lived. The Dragon had been slain by faith and love.

One act of kindness can make a significant change. So how about giving someone the gift of forgiveness? How about filling a cup full of kindness or making a phone call of grace to someone who'd never expect it? How about (no strings attached) an authentic extension of love to someone who doesn't deserve it? Proverbs 16:7 says, "When a man's ways are pleasing to the Lord, He makes even his enemies to be at peace with him." Go slay a dragon. Pastor Glenn

ST. MARY'S CHURCH, MT. HOLLY, VERMONT

Saturday, September 23, 2017. Almost ten years after the beloved St. Mary's Church in Mt. Holly burned to ashes, was the scene today of a reunion of former parishioners, numbering about 50. A special Mass was said by Father Thomas Mosher of Church of Annunciation, Ludlow. The air was crisp and then warmed by the sun, blue skies and spirit of this day.

Everyone was invited to attend and to bring a chair, and a dish to share for the refreshments served after Mass. A table was filled with albums of photos of special occasions and histories throughout St. Mary's life. Folks were urged to sign their names in a guest book before they left.

If you wished, you could purchase a souvenir of the church which was two rusty nails found in the rubble that are formed into a cross. Diana Garrow said that when the nails were found they were bright as if just cleaned.

The area where the church once stood was mowed and raked, and large stones outlined the area. A handmade large cross built by Arthur Krueger, and a wooden table/bench built and inscribed by B-J Stewart were still standing where they were placed right after the tragic fire. An impromptu altar was prepared with a table and cloth and three lovely yellow mum plants standing in front. Brian Winkler took photos of the Mass and the faithful.

After Mass, the folks present chatted and enjoyed the refreshments. Needless to say that in ten years, some of our faithful have passed away, babies were born, and hair color changed to white. I did not personally remember names of everyone, but once I recognized them, it was like greeting an old friend.

Another thoughtful addition to the property was a Porta Potty, Thank you to the committee who handled all the preparations and who takes care of this property.

As we left, we all hoped to see each other in another 10 years. And as B-J Stewart said to Father, "Thank you Father for this special Mass in this special place". Respectfully reported by Ruth Winkler


