

In FY 2007, with the help of grant funds available to the Planning Commission, the distribution list of the paper was doubled to include all households in town. For FY 2008, with those grant funds no longer available, the Select Board budgeted modest funds to cover increased costs of printing and the valuable information it disseminates about such matters as deliberations and hearing on the town plan, solid waste and transfer station news, vacancies in town offices, and more.

In 2007, the Chit Chat incorporated and was granted IRS tax-exempt status. An organizational meeting was held where membership was conferred upon any individual making an annual donation to the Chit Chat in any amount. Policies were developed relating to advertising rates, submissions, and opinion pieces.



Jane Beck, Vermont's Distinguished Folklorist – Presents Program - Jane Beck, founder of the Vermont Folklife Center has had a career of amazing accomplishments in the field of Vermont history by documenting it, preserving it and presenting it back to its people. On Sunday, April 6th at 4 pm Dr. Beck will present a slide presentation and lecture looking at the artistry of Vermonters, their stories and their connection to Vermont and its culture. Ms. Beck has dedicated her life to capturing examples of traditional Vermont art and educating people to appreciate it in terms of a real culture. She has put together more than 30 folk art exhibits which have included a wide range of materials, from textiles to carvings, and from whirligigs to miniatures—all exquisitely crafted within informal traditions and practices passed down the generations. She was instrumental in archiving 4,000 interviews and 20,000 photographs of Vermonters at the Folklife Center in Middlebury, Vermont. Don't miss the opportunity to hear this foremost authority on Vermont and its people.


In October, 2013 3,429lbs of prescription medications were collected in Vermont during National Take Back Day, which is held twice a year. April 26th is the next scheduled date.



I also want to share this sticker that was made in the late 70's. Apparently the MT Holly Sno*Drifters was looking for a new logo back then and asked the students at the MT Holly School to come up with ideas, they made it into a competition. Well, somehow we pulled it all together and got our Visa's in time and we were off to Russia. We stayed in a small hotel by the black sea about a mile from the Olympic Coastal cluster in Adler, which is apart of Sochi we were told. Our son Elijah stayed with us at our hotel and had arrived there 3 days before us. Thankfully he had the mission of getting us up to the mountain cluster figured out; taxi to train 15 minutes, train to the mountain area of Rosa Khutor 45 minutes, walk 20 min to bus, bus to gondola 10 min, gondola 10 min and then a 20 min walk with about a thousand steps to the half pipe. Around 2 and a half hours total and then the same back down. We heard his first trip up there was way longer. We found we had to give up our regular nights sleep to pull this everyday with the events ending around 10:30 pm. It was so worth being in the area we did stay though, amongst the local Russian people whom were wonderful, caring, always looking out for us. It was also worth every bit of effort to be present to see both Hannah and Elijah do such an amazing job!!! It was an honor to be there to support them.

Some fun facts:

Hannah was given 4th in half pipe. The scores were some of



the closest we've seen in women's halfpipe event. She rode

so well! Elijah received the best coach award from Gold medalist Kaitlin Farrinton,

- which was well deserved!
- We would sometimes get off the bus 10 blocks away and walk to the hotel on back streets at 3AM and never felt unsafe.
- Perfect weather in Adler with mid 60s and sunny, and up in the mountains 30 degrees and calm wind.

All the Russian people we met were very friendly and tried to be helpful in any way they could. An example would be when we were walking about the neighborhood we stayed in, and got stuck in a dead end, we turn around and there was a local elderly Russian women whom we had passed earlier that had come to find us and show us the right way to walk to get to the coast. (no English spoken)


We printed google maps to show the taxi drivers where we needed to go, which worked well thankfully since it was so hard for us to attempt Russian language and make any sense to them.

The mountains where the events were held were stunningly beautiful and looked like the back country of Alaska except way at the top of those pointy peaks you could see a lift tower, all to the joy of the snowboarders and skiers. They said it was some of the best they had ever ridden. We found that the Russians did an overall great job putting on these Olympic Games and we felt very safe. 

NITKA'S NOTES FROM THE STATE HOUSE

Animal issues certainly evoke strong feeling in Vermont and one surely sees that played out in the State House. This year in the Senate, there are multiple bills, either "sitting on the wall" where they will never see action or are being studied by committees for possible passage. This is also true in the House and two of their bills introduced by retired veterinarian, Representative John Bartholomew of Hartland have already passed and moved to the Senate. H-50 speaks to the welfare of animals and the sale of dogs (including wolf hybrids) and cats. Added to existing state law is a new definition of persons known as "pet dealers" and many provisions that will apply to them if this bill also succeeds in the Senate. There are also revisions and clarifications to current state law in it. H-347 amends requirements for the practice of veterinary dentistry.

Two current Senate bills that were controversial in past years when introduced, S-8 and S-109 propose to prohibit tail docking on a horse or a bovine except when performed by a vet to relieve pain or save the life of the animal. Otherwise, tail docking would not be allowed. The farm community previously was split on this bill. A somewhat similar bill, S-126 would prohibit debarking, tail docking, ear cropping, and surgical birth procedures on dogs unless performed by a licensed veterinarian with appropriate anesthesia.

One doesn't hear much about red deer in VT but S-228 would exempt these deer, when owned as domestic animals or livestock from the Agriculture Agency, Food and Markets' requirements for testing for chronic wasting disease. The concern here is the health of state's white tailed deer herd and not endangering the herd in any way. I don't know what the testimony will be in regard to this issue. Stay tuned. All of the aforementioned bills are in the Senate Agriculture Committee.

The length of a tether that a dog is tied to outdoors, the size of the dog's shelter and other proposed requirements re watering and care are addressed in S-145 which is in the Senate Judiciary Committee for some reason. No testimony has been taken on the bill but it could wind up being combined with any of the animal bills. S-237, is appropriate for Judiciary since it would revise civil forfeiture proceedings concerning animals seized due to abuse or neglect. Keith Flynn, the head of the state police testified for the need to shorten the timelines for the courts to address these cases. The animals frequently need medical care and the volunteer organizations, the Humane Society or citizen volunteers for them don't have the authority to consent to this without the owner's approval. Their day to day care can also be very costly if a case should involve multiple animals or horses over lengthy periods of time. Deb Loring of Spring Hill Horse Rescue in Clarendon testified that her organization's efforts also go toward prevention. She mentioned helping owners gain compliance with the law by providing free blankets, medications, low farrier costs and the hay bank where owners can get three months' worth of coupons for hay. Dr. Peggy Larson, a vet who grew up in Northern Minnesota and practices in VT testified about investigations, horses that like to be outside in the winter and there



being nothing wrong with it provided their need s are met and many other points of interest. Follow some of these bills at www.leg.state.vt.us They are quite interesting.

MESSAGE FROM MONTPELIER

Legislative Report from Rep. Dennis Devereux For Ludlow, Mount Holly, and Shrewsbury

For the most part, floor action to move bills has been slow. The few moved have dealt with the use of cell phones, the right of a woman to deny access to a father when he child is the result of rape, and a

commerce bill. This will be the fourth time in my eight years that I have voted to not allow any hand-held device to be used while driving. It will be interesting to see if the Senate makes any changes again. We will see much more action in the next several weeks as we need to act on the capital budget adjustment and transportation bills. These are major bills that must be approved before the end of the second week of March.

My Committee on Government Operations has been busy working on bills that run the full gamut of issues that are assigned to us. We are finalizing an elections bill that came over from the Senate last spring, and are considering some changes. The biggest would move the primary date from the end of August to the first Tuesday. The push for this has come from the Department of Justice to allow for more time between the primary and general election to send and receive overseas ballots. This, after just having moved it a couple of years ago.

Our committee has taken introductory testimony on many bills assigned to us, but we will likely not take action on some of them. We did vote bills out of committee that give more protection to whistleblowers concerning misconduct or government fraud and waste. Our state will also start licensing property inspectors through the Office of Professional Regulation. This will guarantee the level of expertise required to protect house purchasers, and was supported by a report that it is needed. We are also ready to vote on changes to our open meeting laws that better define what an open meeting is, and what may be discussed in an executive session. If a violation is alleged, it gives a board an opportunity to respond or even cure it by ratifying or correcting the violation. Some of our other discussion has been around regional policing issues. It seems likely we will request a study that looks into state police contracts with towns, area dispatching cost savings opportunities, improvement of service to small communities, and the retention of our law enforcement officers.

I hope to hear from you about the issues we are considering, and I will be around during our town meeting break the first week of March. As always you can reach me at home at 802-259-2460, or with a message at delege.state.vt.us.

HOW MUCH WILL INTEREST ADD TO COST OF THE GARAGE BOND?

In order for taxpayers to understand how much their tax bills will increase for the new Town Garage, they should have some idea of the total amount to be repaid. This will include the amount of the bond (\$600,000) and the interest charges.

Using the Municipal Bond Calculator on the website of the National League of Cities, a 20-year bond for \$600,000 at 4% yields an interest amount that could be as low as \$273,000 or as high as \$432,000.

These interest amounts could bring the total bond to be repaid by Mount Holly tax payers to an amount ranging from \$873,000 to \$1,032,000. One of the factors affecting interest charges is the tax rate paid by the bondholder on their bond earnings. The Select Board and its bond lawyer have access to a broader range of information and should be able to obtain a good deal for the Town and be able to specify the total interest charges. Dear Mount Holly Residents,

I feel it is necessary to comment on the proposed building site for a new town garage. The Select Board has been looking for a new site for a new town garage for over 20 years. Numerous sites were considered and for various reasons didn't work; for example, not everyone is anxious to have the town garage near their property. When the Select Board approached the School Board about six years ago, the School Board was willing to consider the idea of building the garage on property the town had been using for over thirty years.

The existing town garage has been inadequate for a number of years. Size, building safety and sanitary issues needed to be addressed. The existing site doesn't have room for expansion or an area for a septic system. Now is the time to go ahead with the planned site for a number of reasons. The town has been using the proposed site for over thirty years for storage of equipment and materials. This property is conveniently located near the town office which is ideal for the town road crew as they often need access to this building. Being centrally located the town trucks can respond quickly to any area of town. The fuel tank is located in this area. All the preliminary work has been done for this site and selecting another site would incur more expense. Any other site, whether free or not, will cost more because none of the preliminary work is done for a different site. All the necessary permits, surveys, and paperwork for the school property site are in order. This area, where the Select Board has proposed the garage, has never been a problem for the safety of the school children. Nevertheless, the Select Board has planned additional safety precautions. With the approval of the voters, the new garage can be built this year.

It is sad that this issue has become contentious. That was certainly not the intent of the Select Board. I hope when building a new town garage comes to a vote, you will show your support and provide a building which will facilitate the continued excellent maintenance of our roads. Taking everything into consideration, **THE SITE PROPOSED BY THE SELECT BOARD REALLY IS THE BEST POSSIBLE SITE FOR THE NEW GARAGE.** Best regards, Paul Nevin

CHOOSING THE BEST SITE FOR THE GARAGE

Three sites that have been proposed or offered to the Town for the purpose of building a garage:

- 1) 4.1 acres on Route 103 S near the flashing light, owned by Marilyn Martin and Phil Dunwoody, is a flat, hayfield with no trees. Available for \$35,000, it has 1000 feet of direct clear access to Rte. 103, is about 800 yards from the Town Office, and could accommodate the future addition of Fire and Rescue departments. It is a safe site for the sand pile, adds to the Town's land, and is served by utilities.
- 2) 5.6 acres split off from the School's 13 acre parcel is covered with tall pine trees and is generally sloping with sharp drops to the stream and railroad. Available for \$50,000, on a Class 2 road close to the Town Office, it joins Rte. 103 at a hazardous intersection. Losses include the School's nature trail, open air classroom, and expansion

room for the School and Town's only athletic fields.

3) 5.0 acres on Hedgehog Hill Road North offered as a free gift to the Town by Carol Ballou. It is a hilly site with access to a class 3 road about 3 miles from the Town Office. It reaches Rte. 103 at Healdville Road. It does not allow for any future expansion, but is in a residential area with a fine view of Okemo Mountain, and might be used as an exchange for a parcel of land better suited for a garage.

Further detailed, careful comparison of these three sites (and perhaps offers from other residents) could create confidence that the Town's future is well served and costs kept to a minimum. Annette Lynch


who finds herself breaking her own rules to offer immortality to an ordinary man. Weston Producing Artistic Director Steve Stettler comments, "We were





The Mt. Holly Volunteer Fire Department was organized in 1946.
The very first piece of equipment was a secondhand Larabee truck, bout in Long Island, with donations from several residents. 2 years later a portable pump was added and throughout the years other additions were made; one of the most important was a tank truck, as it soon became evident that lack of water to fight the fires with was a big problem. Most of our equipment has been secondhand with the men working many hours to make them efficient.

In 1960 it was decided to build a much needed fire house for all theequipment; in 1966 a 1954 GMC pumper was bought and in 1968 the ottank truck was replaced with a 1954 GMC oil truck; again many hours were spent in rebuilding this piece of equipment for our use. Next year this truck will have to be replaced with something larger and

year this truck will have to be replaced with something larger and more capable of handling the needs of our growing community.

Besides working on the engineer the volunteers have attended schools on firefighting, and in the Ray's 25 years several h5-hour courses were taken, as well as intensive fraining in the local depart

ment during the past 3 years. It is hoped that in the near future we can have a hanhour State course at the department with all members attending.

This winter we have 8 members attending an Advanced First Aid and Emergency Procedure Course in Rutland; better care and assistance will be given during fire calls as well as in various rescue and Civil Freparedness situations.

Raffles are being held monthly to raise money to purchase a vehicle to transport our resource material as well as to update the

equipment itself.

CIVIL PREPAREDNESS

Civil Preparedness "means that a community is prepared to react promptly to save life and protect property if it is threatened or hit by a disaster or major emergency of any type. This requires that

planning and preparatory actions be taken before there is an emergency:
For the town of Mt. Holly it means that a Unit be organized with knowledge of supplies, equipment and trained people to meet any emergency we may have. Besides the organization, at present underway, 8 people are enrolled in the Red Cross Advanced First Aid and Emergency Procedure course in Rutland. This course requires 56 hours to complete and demands recretifications every three years. Another course may be

given in Indlow in the near future.

Besides our volunteer firemen, Civil Preparedness will give us intersection guards to assist in the safe passage of fire or emergency vehicles to the site, These guards will also act as guides for emer-gency vehicles drivers from other communities unacquainted with the

Communications with these guards, the firemen and first aiders will require a broader means than the present two fire phones. Volunteers will be needed, who are home, and can receive and pass on phone messages to those who will assist in the emergency.

A survey is being undertaken of volunteers and equipment available in the community; a quick look in this area indicates that there are 90 self employed residents. Some of these would have services and equipment to share with the Civil Freparedness Unit when necessary.

Through a well-organized and functioning CP Unit the town of Mt. Holly can take pride in its ability to meet any emergency and we have the resources and the talent to make this Unit e very successful





Town Garage On The School Land

Hi, I'm Jeff Teter and I have been working for the Town of Mount Holly on our roads for the last 28yrs. I'd like to give you some information concerning the discussion of the proposed new town garage.

We had an informational meeting that started at the Town garage back in November. What was apparent when you walked in was how the heck do we pack all that equipment in there. The walk to the back of the garage where the office and wood stove are located involves turning sideways and ducking between equipment. One of our main winter tools, the loader, is kept outside because there is no room for it. So bottom line, we need a new garage because we out grew this one years ago plus its flat roof has allowed leakage and mold growth to a serious and unhealthy degree.

We started looking for land around 20 years ago back when Warren Cole was a selectman. We have looked at several places on 103 and 155 but the best was always the school property. Not only because of it's central location for school, town office, fire and rescue winter maintenance, which is key for an efficient cost effective operation, but we can build it completely out of site. Do you really want to drive into Mt Holly and see a big sand pile, maintenance building and stock piles of gravel right on the hi way instead of farm land. When we looked at the newer state and municipal garages for ideas, most were off the road and out of site.

Why would the school want to sell the town the land in the first place? The answer to that is our relationship between the school and town in the form of ongoing help on projects that the school could not have afforded on its own, examples being the athletic fields, basketball court, moving around the wood chips for the playground each year and many more things that helps the school keep its budget lower but still gets extra fun things done. Beyond these areas, we are always close by to be there to take care any of their needs.

The school is willing to sell the town the land, which we have already been using for the last 35yrs and have developed for our needs. For the cost of 15 thousand, which is the lowest appraised value, and a 35 thousand solar electric system that the town will own and install by the town office for use in the summer. The school will use this system in the winter for electricity and data for a teaching aid for the children to see real time value of renewable energy. This is a very progressive and forward thinking deal.

I should also comment on some of the information, and at times miss information I may add, that has been posted in the chit chat and spread around town.


The concern about sand pile deaths. The situations cited in the chit chat had nothing to do with municipal sand piles. One example given was actually a death where a path gave way near a river in a state park. Trying to add fear tactics to this discussion sure seems questionable and a waste of everyone's time. Also, there will be a fence around the proposed site to make sure it is safe. This has **always** been a part of the proposal.

The land offered by Carol Ballou is not usable for our needs. It consists of wetlands and hillside. It is difficult to understand why this proposal was put out there.

We have looked at the Dunwoody property but ruled it out for these reasons; the need of an expensive septic system, the amount of gravel needed to raise the operational land out of the wet nature of the site, and being right on 103 with the need to screen it from view and the dangers of access right onto 103. Part of this land is located in VTRANS high accident rate segment map of 103. Also, the right turn from 103 onto Hortonville Road is difficult and dangerous with a plow on.

So, as tax payers of Mt Holly consider this proposal of buying the school land and building the town garage there, if you want the logical, least expensive and most efficient site, that even the neighbors are happy with, then it is clear that buying the school land for the town garage and keeping most of the money in town (true, some of the 15k will go to act 60 but all of the 35k will benefit the town for many years to come), makes the most sense. Please, let us all use common sense in our decision making.

There were 95 Transfers of property in 1974. About 75% of them were between family members. Today Sue tells me that we still have between 85 and 100 Transfers in a year.


