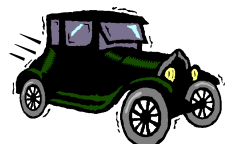

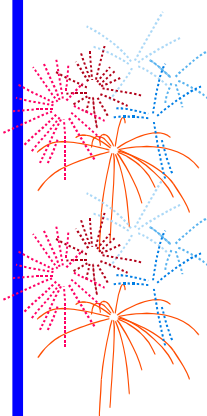

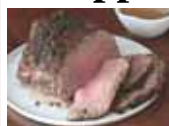
She was pre-deceased by her husband in 2008 and her daughter-in-law Ledora Harrington in 2015.

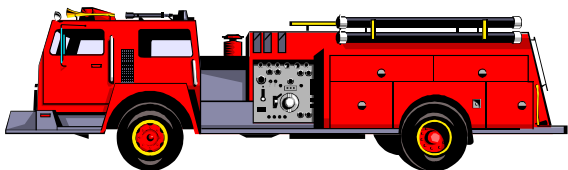

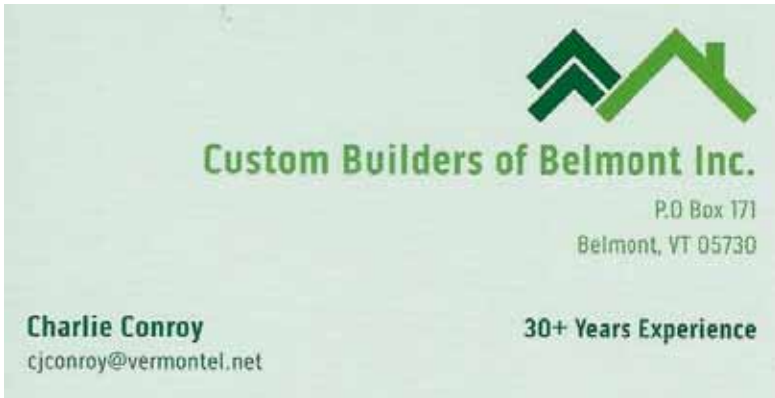

Vermont Riding on Public Roads Statute VERMONT STATUTES

TITLE TWENTY-THREE. Motor Vehicles

CHAPTER 13. Operation of Vehicles

SUBCHAPTER 11. Miscellaneous Rules

1127 Control in presence of horses and cattle

- (a) Whenever upon a public highway and approaching a vehicle drawn by a horse or other draft animal, or approaching a horse or other animal upon which a person is riding, the operator of a motor vehicle shall operate the vehicle in such a manner as to exercise every reasonable precaution to prevent the frightening of such horse or animal and to insure the safety and protection of the person riding or driving.
- (b) The operator of a motor vehicle shall yield to any cattle, sheep or goats which are being herded on or across a highway.

Mt. Holly School Board Meeting

The Mt. Holly school board met on Wednesday, June 7 at the Mt. Holly Elementary School Library. The board approved the agenda for this meeting and the minutes from the last meetings. The board appointed Kelly Tarbell to the U39 board. The board discussed the next steps with regard to Act 46 and Article 721. They approved hiring an attorney to help them navigate their options. They also voted to not join an Act 46 study committee.

The board approved policies and discussed a restructure plan at MHS. They also discussed with the other boards their plan to hire an attorney and not join an Act 46 committee. They discussed options available to the entire group.

The next meeting will be the annual school meeting on Wednesday, July 5 at BRHS.

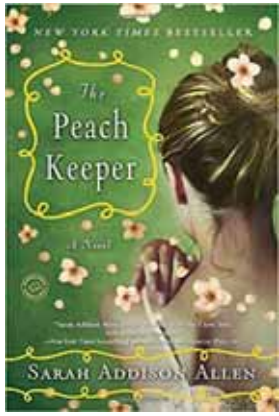

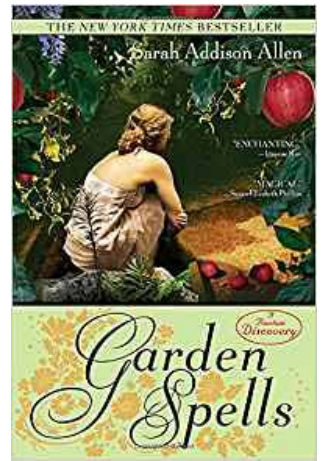

Our Small School Dilemma

Recently, the Towns of Ludlow and Mount Holly voted differently on whether to merge with Mill River High School. Ludlow voted to keep open their small Black River High School, and the voters of Mount Holly were in favor of joining

with Mill River. As the state representative who has represented both towns in Montpelier for eleven years, I have a pretty good sense of how the voters feel.

The dilemma facing Ludlow is an example of things that happen that are out of our control. First, about twenty years ago, came Act 60 when Ludlow was among a group of the earliest towns affected by the new mandate to send property tax revenue to

Montpelier to be shared with other districts. The court found that some towns did not have the ability to provide an equal educational opportunity for their students. Then Cavendish chose to create a union school district with Chester in the early 1970s. Up until that period, most of their students attended Black River. Also in 1976, when the Ludlow GE plant merged with the Rutland plant which resulted in the loss of around 400 high-paying jobs, they were left with mainly service industry jobs, retirees, and second homeowners. Since then, property taxes have increased many times over, and school enrollment has dropped. This combination has placed Ludlow in the situation that their high school cannot likely survive.

For full disclosure, I graduated from Black River in one of their largest graduating classes ever, and worked at GE when half of us were laid off prior to the consolidation with the Rutland plant. I know that closing schools and laying off school employees does not help the local economy and makes it a less attractive place to live.

I understand why the people in Ludlow want to keep BRHS open, but with the declining enrollment, I am afraid their situation will only get worse. Personally, I would be disappointed if Ludlow did not fight to keep their high school open. The decision is not an easy one for any community, but I do not see a path for it to survive.

Act 46 was a reaction to the lack of response by schools to Act 153. Our district received incentive money to create a new supervisory union with the former Chester-Cavendish district, and it did not come easy nor save much money. This latest effort seems to be about pressuring small schools to create a plan to merge in the name of increasing educational opportunities.

My vote to merge with the Mill River district was not a vote to close Black River, but one to allow each town to move separately in its own direction. If there were a plan to grow the enrollment I would certainly be interested, but otherwise the cost per pupil will only increase. I know many graduates of Black River who are successful, and feel as if I received the educational opportunities I needed.

Nothing breeds growth like positive results and high test scores, and that is exactly what happens at the Mount Holly Elementary School. The top two graduating seniors at Black River High School both attended our elementary school. A recent Rutland Herald editorial was about "Small is Beautiful" with some schools, but parents still want to see a positive atmosphere. The Poultney principal declared at their recent graduation that "Just because you come from a small school, does not mean you can't do big things." State Representative Dennis Devereux

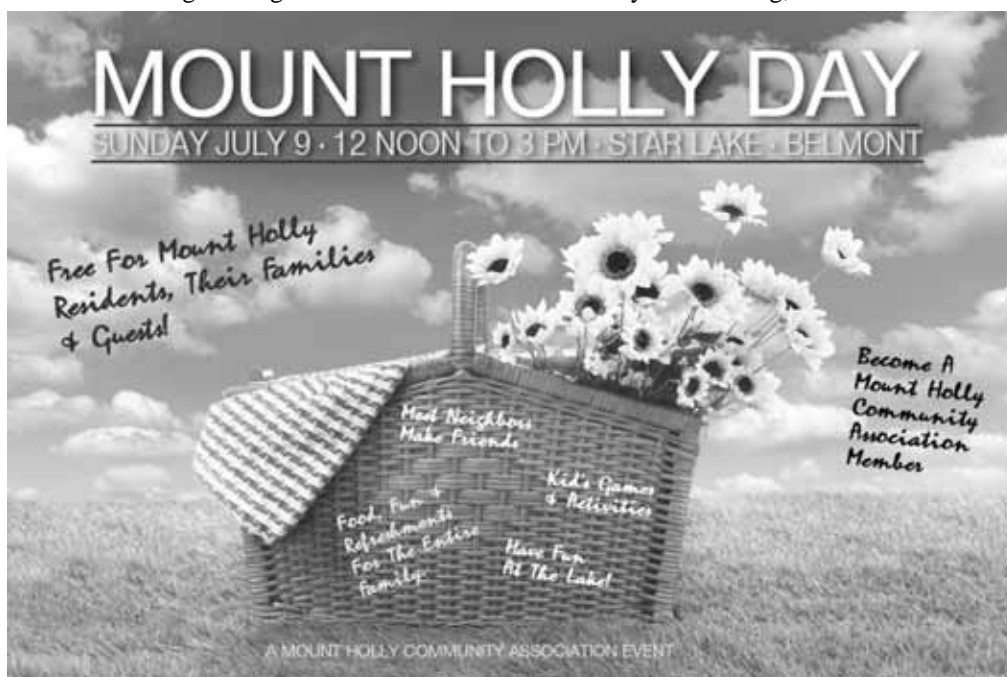
Rescheduled - Matthias Weiter - Lecture and Q & A on the Middle East: This lecture was originally scheduled for June, as been

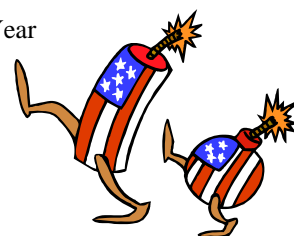

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We're Losing a Great Nation

Have you noticed that we are rapidly losing the ability to look each other in the eye and have a civil conversation about things that matter without being hateful? There has always been anger in American politics, but lately, it seems we've crossed the line. Democracy depends on our willingness to respectfully debate those things that matter most.

There has got to be a change in the discourse in our society, from the road rage on our nation's highways to the rhetoric in the media or on line. Yes, I realize that it's difficult and there's plenty of room for blame on both sides (last week with Steve Scalise's shooting it was fingers pointed at Bernie and guns. When Gabby Giffords was shot it was talk radio that was blamed and guns). How quickly we can identify any incident with a political side or agenda.

Our most eloquent president gave us some timeless advice in his 1st Inaugural Address: *"We are not enemies. We are friends." (Those guys were prepping for a bi-partisan baseball game with great camaraderie.) "We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained, it must not break our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory...will yet swell...when again touched, as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature."*

We desperately need to be acting from those "better angels." Left, right, and everywhere in between we need folks to speak up on this or our country is going to be ripped apart. The problem is that the institutions designed to produce that citizen who can both contribute to the world of ideas and to society as a whole, intelligently engaging with others of differing opinions without violence, are failing. Alas, there seems to be no room left on modern college campuses for the cherished academic value of civility. Rhetoric, censure and prohibition are the watchwords today. Whether the violent protests at U.C. Berkley and Middlebury, over conservative speakers or the Montana Republican congressional candidate who allegedly punched a reporter, our political discourse has run off the rails. How long then can our democracy last if we are unwilling to have a conversation with anyone outside the bubble of our own ideas? We are the ones who must be civil and build bridges with neighbors and folks with opposing views (even if it's over a local school vote.) It will not always be reciprocal. Unstable people are often given to shouting and acting out.



Maybe we all need to calm down, regain our civility, and ask questions such as: What's good that we can celebrate together? What's evil that we can resist and condemn (behavior like shooting and death threats)? As Christians we

should ask, "What's missing that we can contribute?" Christians have dramatically added to culture things that have not been there before.

Well, do you think we can do it? Model civil discourse? That is, both standing up for the truth, but doing it with respect? Honestly, let's talk with each other. Free speech and the ability to tolerate offense are the hallmarks of a free and open society. Lincoln appealed to the best instincts of the human spirit as the *better* way to navigate through the storm. "We are *not* enemies. We are *friends*." Respectfully, Pastor Glenn Davis

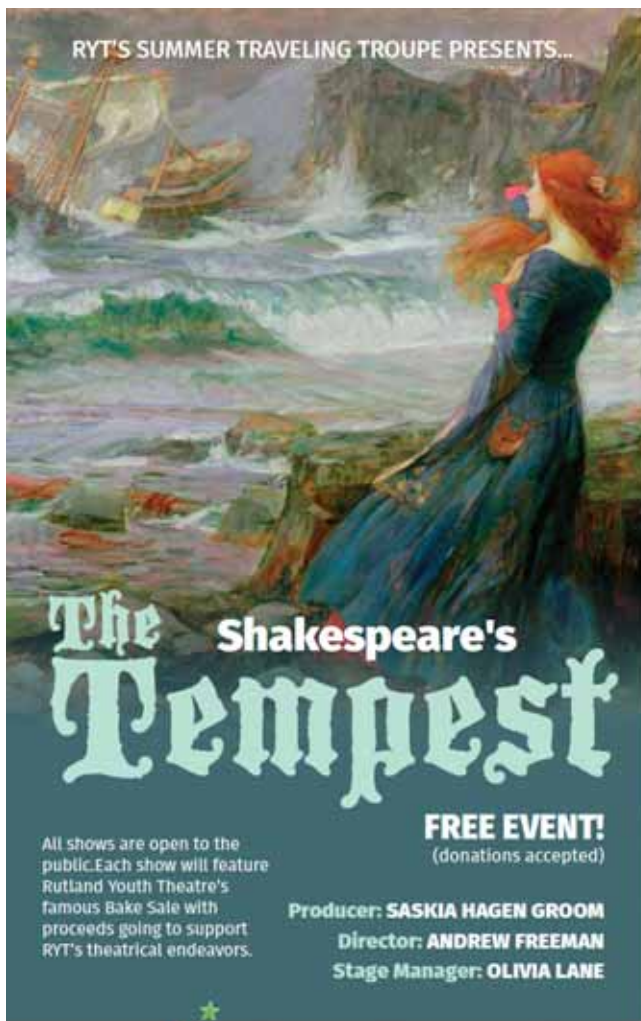

single largest segment of Vermont's residential waste stream. But small rural communities such as Mount Holly are insignificant contributors to this segment of waste. We have a small population and the majority of people owning homes are seasonal. We have no restaurants, only a few small businesses, a small elementary school and a small store.

We believe that small rural towns such as Mount Holly should not automatically have to do what the Legislature and Governor deem to be in the best interest of every Vermont community. Solid waste requirements are certainly different in Burlington than in Mount Holly. For example, we were required by the State to have a container available for leaf and garden debris and to this day it has never been used. Why do we have the same regulations? Similarly, the Town of Mount Holly is clearly not going to generate enough food scraps on a weekly basis to warrant having a large (pollution generating) truck travel to our transfer station to pick up a few, if any, food scraps. We will make this container available in July, but if after two months it is not being used we will discontinue doing so and wait until it becomes a requirement in 2020.

We believe there should be a peer review of all new statutes imposed by the Legislature before they become required of small communities. This peer review should consist of members of the Legislature who actually represent small towns (1,500 people or less for example). They should be able to determine if the new regulations are relevant to the small communities they represent. Some laws will be deemed inappropriate for our communities. Others may be revised to meet our specific needs and some may be considered appropriate for all communities regardless of size. Thank you for your consideration, Mount Holly Select Board

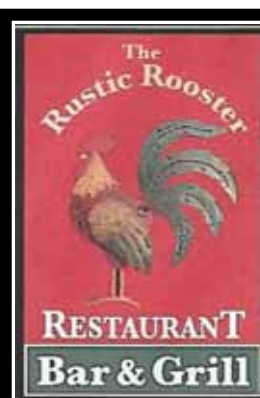

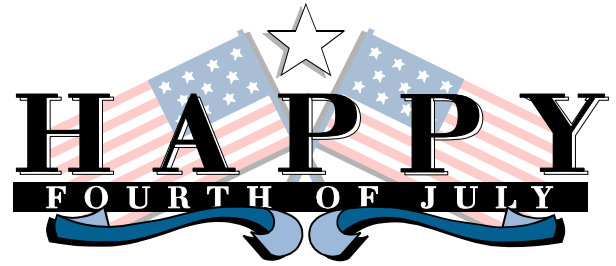
