

#### **National Academies of Sciences Environmental Scientist** And Belmont native, April Melvin, to speak at The Mt. Holly Town Library.

On Friday, July 28th at 7 p.m., April Melvin will present her program, Understanding Climate Change in Your Backyard.

April is a native Vermonter who has spent her career studying the impact of climate change and air pollution on society and the environment. As an environmental scientist, she has worked extensively researching forest health in the Northeastern U.S. and in Alaska. Her more recent work

as a policy professional has focused on estimating how much damage caused by climate change may cost the U.S. April currently resides in Washington D.C. where she is an Associate Program Officer

at the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. In this role she brings together leading experts to provide advice to the Federal Government on issues related to climate change. She received her Ph.D. in ecosystem ecology and biogeochemistry from Cornell University and holds a B.S. in ecology and evolutionary biology from the University of Rochester.

April's program is sure to be both interesting and thought provoking. There will be a question and answer period at the end of the program. The Mt. Holly Town Library is located at 26 Maple Hill Rd. in Belmont, Vermont.



- 1. Boat design and construction
  - a. boats must be made before the race
  - b. boats must be made ONLY of cardboard and duct tape

NO reinforced cardboard tubes, only broken down cardboard boxes

- c. cardboard cannot be sealed with paint or sealants
- d. boats must be completely enclosed or permit crew to remain fully on top of vessel

# Wood Guthrie: Dustbowl Balladeer – August 6<sup>th</sup> at 4:00 pm – Mount Holly Town Library

In his music and writing, Woody Guthrie chronicled the devastation of the 1930's dust storms and the Great Depression, championing the dispossessed and economic and social justice. Many of his songs ("This Land is Your Land") have become American classics and he has influenced subsequent songwriters, including Bob Dylan and Bruce Springsteen. This presentation by Mark Greenberg explores the alwaysrambling Guthrie's life and legacy through readings from his prolific prose writings, recorded and live examples of his music and slides of Guthrie's own art and of photographs documenting his complex life and times.



## Rescheduled – Matthias Weiter – Lecture and Q &A on the Middle East August 20 at 4:00 pm Middle East Update will be the subject matter of discussion.

More than six years after the start of the "Arab Rebellion", the perspectives of the population in Wester Asian and Northern African countries have not gotten any better – rather the opposite. Matthias Weiter lived and travelled in this region over a period of more than 40 years, worked for the German government, international organizations and as a consultant specialized in water and education. He will give a 20 minute overview about the present situation of the region, talk about his recent trip to Tunisia and answer questions of the audience.

Born and raised in Berlin, Germany, Matthias Weiter holds an M.A. in engineering and economics of the University of Hamburg, a PhD in Geography of the University of Giessen, a honorary professorship at Hamboldt University Berlin/Germany and is an alumnus of the German Development Institute. He joined the German Ministry for Development in 1973. Until 2012 he served there and also in various organizations and foreign countries in the field of development cooperation. This included Indonesia, Egypt, Yemen, Brussels (EC) and the USA (UNDP New York, MIT Cambridge/Mass).





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#### Stranded in Gander

**With all the nastiness and negative news stories** being circulated currently don't you feel that you need to hear something positive & inspiring? I just came across a story that might just do the trick.

In the immediate aftermath of 9/11, numerous flights had to be diverted from American airspace to ensure that no other potentially dangerous flights were incoming. Canada had a tiny town of only 10, ooo people, but with a sizeable airport. Landing some 38 jets there was relatively easy. Figuring out what to do with the 7,000 + passengers and crew was a bit tougher, especially for a town with 6 stop lights & only 500 hotel rooms. The mayors of all the tiny villages all around, the ministers of the churches and the Salvation Army all put their heads together to come up with a plan. Passengers spent 7--23 hrs. Aboard planes before being cleared to file out to be billeted to waiting accommodations. Residents met them with homemade lunches and an endlessly cheerful and kind generosity during 5 days of uncertainty.

Volunteers from the Salvation Army & Red Cross made meals, & the hockey rink became a walk-in refrigerator. Responding to radio announcements the residents and businesses put everything on hold and supplied toothbrushes, deodorants, soap, blankets, pillows and even spare underwear, along with hot

put everything on hold and supplied toothbrushes, deodorants, soap, blankets, pillows and even spare underwear, along with hot showers and guest rooms for the elderly. One pregnant young lady was put up in a private home across from a 24 hr. urgent care facility. Local companies set up a bank of phones where passengers, watching on supplied cable TV at schools and church halls, could call home to check on loved ones or use classroom computers to email.

At Gander Baptist, Gary and Donna House cared for the needs of four Moldovan refugee families, members of a religious sect who spoke no English and were bewildered by events.

The "plane people" included the frantic parents of a NYC firefighter (he gave his life), a man and a woman who fell in love in Gander (they got married), and a gay couple who worried about whether a small Canadian town would welcome them (it did.) The plane people hailed from 95 countries, including Zimbabwe; kosher meals were required, as well as a place for Muslim passengers to pray. The town vet took free care of cargoed animals, including 2 chimps enroute to the Columbus, OH zoo (a baby chimp was later named Gander.)

When it came time for passengers to reboard, they were no longer strangers (to themselves or to their hosts). Locals hugged them, everybody was on a first name basis, swapping stories of their stay. Nobody would take any money.

So when back on Delta Flight-15, Dr. Robert Ferguson MD, addressed his fellow passengers. "I learned from these folks that they have a big drop-out problem because there aren't any jobs. So, let's pass some pledge sheets and I'll match whatever we raise." More than \$15,000 was pledged on that one plane. 228 kids have received that scholarship. 3 or 4 are now MD's and a number have gone on for advanced degrees. Both ways that demonstrates clearly the power of love in the midst of trials. When folks rally together incredible things happen. Maybe we need to realize that we have more friends than enemies in this world.

As the September 11th anniversary arrives with its reminders of unfiltered evil in our world, we need reminders of the human capacity for kindness, selflessness and generosity. What actions might we take in this next month to restore our faith in humanity and bring out the best during the darkest of times? Hebrews 13:2 states, "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have entertained angels without realizing it!" Pastor Glenn Davis





waiting for college level graduates before getting them involved. Another question asked if there was an age limit on Sub committees involving young people? Are there peer run committees? With the help of local educators, a large proportion of children resident in Ludlow, Mt. Holly, Cavendish, Plymouth and parts of Reading are now registered to receive these books each month. The Ludlow Rotary is absolutely delighted with the results to date.

An easy way to register your under-age-5 child, or children, for this program is to visit the children's section of Ludlow's Fletcher Memorial Library, where there is a display of Imagination Library books and lots of registration cards. Registration cards can also be obtained from the Ludlow Rotary, PO Box 216, Ludlow, VT 05149. The privacy of the children is strictly honored.

The signature book of the Imagination Library, "The Little Engine That Could", is recognized by most parents. The books are

addressed and mailed directly to the children, much to their delight. The mailings start about six weeks after the date of registration. As a past president of the Ludlow Rotary said, "Opportunities to do this much good don't come along very often so we have to

give it our best effort." We tried and it turned out we could, even though the Ludlow Rotary's financial resources are stretched at a cost of about \$25 per child per year. With research

#### **Mount Holly Dog Ordinance Reminder**

The Mount Holly Animal Control Officer would like to remind residents and visitors that there is a leash law in the Town of Mount Holly. Your dog must be on your property or under your immediate control. If your dog likes to roam, maybe you should consider a containment system, a fenced yard, a kennel or a tether.

Occasionally dogs escape from their owner, or stray from their property and that is understandable. In most instances the dog will return home, but sometimes it becomes necessary for the Animal Control Officer to respond and secure the animal. Vermont State law requires that all dogs six months and older be licensed, and that the license be secured to a collar or harness. If the ACO responds to a found dog, the following steps are taken: The license if any is checked against town records, the owner is notified and the dog is returned; If there is no license, the dog's photo and description are put on social media and Newsflash as available; If no one claims the dog in a reasonable amount of time, the animal is removed to the Rutland County Humane Society for boarding.

Unlicensed dog owners will have seven days to obtain a valid dog license or face civil penalties.

The Mount Holly Dog Ordinance is on file at the Town Office.





#### **FOLA Decides To Dismantle Old Piano**

After advertising its availability at no cost for six months on social media, Frontporch, news releases, and every other conceivable means of communication, FOLA (Friends of Ludlow Auditorium) decided it was time to dismantle a very old and somewhat out-of-tune piano that someone had stored back stage in the Ludlow Town Hall Auditorium. 
