




Dedication of Commemorative Stone for Hannah Teter

On Monday, August 8th at 3:00 pm a commemorative stone was dedicated to permanently recognize the remarkable achievements of Hannah Teter, who won a Gold Medal in snowboarding at the 2006 Olympics in Turin, Italy, and a Silver Medal four years later in the 2010 Olympics in Vancouver. It was placed in the Mary Van Dyke Garden at the Mount Holly Library & Community Center in the crossroads in Belmont village.

Hannah was born into a snowboarding family here in Belmont, Mount Holly, Vermont. Teter started snowboarding at the age of 8, taking her first lesson at Okemo Mountain and later graduating from the Okemo Mountain School. In 2002, at 15, she became the youngest member of the US Snowboarding Team. Along with her Olympic medals, Hannah has earned numerous other awards and medals in the US Open competitions, the World Cup, the X-games, and the Vans Cup Championships.

As a world renowned competitor and Olympic Medalist, Hannah decided to do some good with her fame. In 2008 Teter founded a charity called *Hannah's Gold*, which raises money through the sales of Vermont maple syrup. The charity, in partnership with World Vision, helps to support the village of Kirindon, Kenya by building schools, digging fresh water wells, and providing water filtration.

In 2014 Teter was named a Global Ambassador for the Special Olympics.

The lower level continues to be used for Folk Club, yoga, Bone Builders, as well as parties for birthdays, anniversaries, and baby and bridal showers. The playgroup meets here weekly and provides our little ones with many fun and enriching activities. We are also always open to hosting book clubs, guest lecturers, art shows and musical events. The MHCA strives to make this space easily available to all... \$15/hour for MHCA members and \$25/hour for non-members. Nonprofit groups may use it free, based on availability.

The annual events sponsored by the MHCA are becoming ever more popular, as evidenced by the increasing attendance at all functions.



Body Art

Tattoos these days are everywhere! Have you noticed? Our travels this summer convinced us that "everybody's doin' it..." I got curious and checked the statistics: 3 in 10 Americans (29%) have one tattoo and 7 in 10 (69%) have 2 or more... and the percentage of Americans who claim to be addicted to ink is 32%! My father-in-law says, in the Navy, it used to be your buddies got you drunk and hauled you into a parlor to get inked. (He resisted.) Today, curiously, it's women who have the greater predilection for getting one (58%, visible or not so).

Even with one fourth (25%) having some regrets, \$3 billion spent annually at 21,000 parlors in the U.S., the total number of Americans sporting at least one tattoo is 45 million. So this once perceived act of rebellion is now a widely practiced personal statement or form of expression.

But it is a fad. Just like piercings, spiked hair and hula hoops. And, oh yes, don't forget saggy, baggy, trousers and the resulting "plumbers crack". This fad's just a little more permanent. Although, I heard a friend joke that her next job will have 100% job security:

Tattoo Removal. As George Harrison once put it in a song, "All Things Must Pass."

This brings up the question of judgments which we make about other people. By nature we *do* form our opinions of people by what we see. Skin is the first thing we notice. By God's design we, as a human race, are such a kaleidoscope of shades of melanin. We, hopefully, are learning not to judge people by the color of their skin. Regarding tattoos, there is a similar learning curve.

When I see someone covered in colorful designs, I have to resist jumping to conclusions as to why they've chosen to look this way. Don't you? It may not be my style, but it is certainly not wrong either. The question for all of us tattooed or otherwise, is: "Do I look down on people who are different from me?"

I'm reminded of a recent encounter I heard about. A petite, blonde, middle aged pastor's wife entered a shop to make a specific purchase and the young man behind the counter, who greeted her, seemed to be her total antithesis. He was a muscular man of color who sported numerous piercings and a lot of tattooing. She began to feel a little intimidated until she noticed a small cross tattooed on his hand. She asked if it had significance and he replied, "Yes, ma'am. That represents what my Savior did for me to take away all my sins and make me fit for heaven." Suddenly, any casual observer would've scratched their head at seeing these two incongruous individuals embracing each other across the counter.

Snap judgments make us into li'l Caesars (not the pizza place): rulers who measure by eye and have to critique and form an opinion on everything and every one. I'm chastising my self here and my tendencies. I need a reminder now and then not to judge people, although moral judgments of ideas are a necessary part of life (more on that some other time).

To sum it up, the Bible says, "Looks aren't everything... God judges' persons differently than humans do. Men and women look at the outward; God looks into the heart." (I Sam. 16:7) One more verse and then I'm done. Curiously, God states in Isaiah 49:16, "I'll never forget you never. Look, I've written your names on the backs of My hands." The Creative World of Stephanie Stouffer

The paintings of Stephanie Stouffer have not, until now, been exhibited beyond her Belmont, Vermont home-based gallery, though visitors frequently recognize the work as internationally known. The artist has been licensing her work to companies like Caspari, Certified International, and Peking Handicrafts for 35 years, with her images appearing on mugs, tapestries, greeting cards, pillows and rugs. However, the more than 1,500 original paintings she has produced during her career have never been exhibited or offered for sale.

The Compass Music and Arts Center exhibit 'The Creative World of Stephanie Stouffer' offers a rare opportunity to see and purchase the unique original work of one of the few artists to earn a living as an illustrative and decorative artist. Stouffer is known for her vivid imagination, precision, and exceptional use of color which creates work sometimes described as 'folk art with a contemporary flair'. Viewers can see her masterful use of whimsy and the patience and love she puts into each piece. The exhibit opens at the Compass Center on Friday, September 2 with an opening reception from 4:00-7:30pm.

The exhibit showcases many of Stouffer's original paintings, along with selected licensed


products, and represents a significant chapter of her life's work. After a time-intensive career of creating work non-stop for the demands of

licensing companies and the fickle, ever-changing market trends, Stouffer would be the first to say that she has moved on from that life. But she does continue to paint, and is enjoying the freedom and time to pursue new creative endeavors. Visitors to the exhibit will also see examples of these new works.

Stouffer's designs often depicted traditional scenes, including iconic, recognizable symbols, as required by the commercial graphic design world. But she had a knack for turning these 'traditional symbols' into something fresh with her vibrant colors, decorative style and rich imagination.

Stouffer explains: "the simplicity of my layouts reflected the serenity and balance that I have sought in my life and that many others seek. I learned that my best work

> came from the heart, from the intuitive part of the process, and hopefully that is what others feel as well."



When Stouffer opened her gallery in Belmont in 2008 she finally understood that she was actually known by her art, if not by her name, and that she says "was a very special feeling". "The main goal of my work", she explains, "was to keep it fun and whimsical and to bring delight to people." She hopes that is what this exhibit will do for all who see it.

Stouffer will give a Gallery Talk on Sunday, October 2 at 2pm. The exhibit runs through October 29.



Letter to the Editor,

As I talk with many in our district, there is agreement that our economy has not recovered. Real estate values have not improved, and higher paying jobs are hard to find. The increases in taxes and health care costs are driving many to consider moving. Real education funding reform has had little discussion. With so many residents paying property taxes based on income, it may be time to use this method for all Vermont residents. I am interested in pursuing a fairer system that is less complicated. The Legislature has requested information to possibly change how we fund our schools. It seems the State is taking more control

3. Highways

- VLCT Equipment Grant: this is a 50/50 grant for a flammable liquids cabinet (cost \$1255, town share \$627).
- Tarbellville culverts: work should start August 15. We received approval of the plan to remove the aquatic organisms, which will save us \$2900.
- Better Roads Category A grant: The grant (for a road and culvert inventory, including capital budget plan) has been signed by the State. The work will be done with RRPC's help.

4. Report of Treasurer

David Johnson presented an income and expense statement dated July 31, 2016 showing cash balances of \$863,677. Highlights: Property taxes received in July totaled \$285,618. Tax sales: 2 of the 5 properties have been redeemed; 1 of the 2 properties in bankruptcy has been paid. First quarter State highway aid was received, and within the budgeted amount. Solid waste labels sold is thru mid-July. Election expense is for the programming of the voting machine. Under Highways, all of the winter road materials are in. David also thanked the Selectboard for signing several Grand List Errors and Omissions forms.

5. Transfer Station

- Jeff noted that a switch on the compactor is still a problem; recycles okay until trying to actually pack it. Another town also has this problem. Casella has not been able to resolve it. Jeff is trying to get them here on Wed or Sat so they can see what's happening.
- The transfer station has two electric bills, but one of them has had zero usage for two months. Jeff found that the old

baler in the recycle shed was humming and pulled the plug on that. So the only charges are the per-day charges because the meter is there (about \$19.00). The meter will remain for the time being.

- Planning Commission Clerk: Bill McGrath recommended that the town hire Jennifer Jones for the position. She is from North Carolina, is a land surveyor, writes for the VT Journal and has agreed to be here in the office for part of one day

• Emergency Management Coordinator Vacancy: Ted reported that Josh Griffin is moving to East Wallingford as of August 18th, and has resigned as the town's EMC. Ted sent Josh's email to Ray and Tim, as well as Fire, Rescue and the Constable, and suggested a name to pursue. All three departments thought the suggested person would be good, although he has not agreed to accept the position at this time. This will be discussed at another meeting. There was also another letter of interest presented from a volunteer.

7. Star Lake

• Colfax Lodge has requested that the town regrade and pave the area between the hall and the new dam. Jeff Teter had estimated the cost would be about \$1100, and the Lodge has offered to pay 50% of the cost. Discussion issues included what areas could be paved and the grading, which would need to meet the State's requirements for overflow. Upon motion made and seconded, the Board

VOTED: to pay 50% of the cost (up to \$1100) of paving at the Colfax Lodge. (3-0)

• Dam Inspection Report: The State's Inspection Report came back, listing the condition of the dam as 'Fair'. Steve Bushman (at the State) suggested that the town contact Dubois & King, and he also noted that most dams are rated Fair. After discussion, the Board agreed to have Ted set up a meeting with Dubois & King, Ron Unterman and the Board. This will be warned as a special meeting, before the next regular meeting.

8. Mount Holly Community Association

Cider Days Road Closure: Morgan Skiathitis presented MHCA's request to close Maple Hill Road again for the two days
of Cider Days (October 8 & 9). There was some discussion of improved signage about how far the road was open for
businesses. Upon motion made and seconded, the Board

VOTED: to approve the closure of Maple Hill Road during Cider Days. (3-0)

• MHCA Lease: The MHCA leases the Library building from the town, for \$1.00 per year. The current 10-year lease expired June 30, 2016. The MHCA is reviewing the lease to see if there are any changes, as is the Selectboard. It is expected that the Lease will be renewed as is, with only date changes.

9. Other Business

- ANR-DEC Watershed Mgmt: The Town received a copy of a proposed permit amendment allowing Okemo to operate the main 6-person lift for mountain biking, and create a 3-foot wide bike trail. Comments may be submitted until August 23, 2016.
- ANR Planned Stewardship Activities: The State provided the annual notice of stewardship activities planned for the Okemo State Forest.
- Cell Tower discussion: Ted still wants to pursue this. He wants to contact all small, rural towns that, like Mount Holly, have no or inadequate cell phone coverage, to see about working together to try and get this accomplished. VLCT provided the name of a state legislator who is very interested in this issue, and may already have info on towns without coverage.
- Town Office floor refinishing: Sue Covalla spoke with Al Lewis, the new custodian at the school, who has done great work reviving the school's floor and carpeting. She noted that the office floors used to be done twice a year, but had not been done for a while. The Board requested she get more information on cost before proceeding.
- Health Officer: The State approved Tim Bickford as the Town Health Officer, for a three year term expiring 07/31/2019.
- Water Rescue Don Richardson reported on a water rescue drill to be done in the next week or two (the Fire Dept wants to run thru it first, and then another session which will be open to the public).

10. The Board reviewed and signed the July orders for payment.




