


Well here at Vermont Ghost Hunters we encounter spirits, ghosts, and demons year round as we help people, families,

parishioners, their families, friends, inns, restaurants and merchants from the local area, and make great gifts for a head start on your Christmas shopping.



### Where Was God On 9/11?

I recall a conversation that took place on the street in Belmont in those horrific days following 9/11. Someone said, "I lost friends in those buildings, reverend. Where was God on this one?" I said, "Right where He's always been: watching, weeping, listening, just as He did to the cries of His only son in death's final moments. He always hears the cry of faith and receives **any**one who'll trust Him." The reply was, "Well, I've still got a lot of questions." It reminded me of Mother Theresa's comment when asked why God allows such suffering. She said, "When I see Him, He's got a lot of explaining to do." With a smile, I thought, "Maybe that's why she lived so long." Every time she came near to dying I can imagine God saying, "Hold up! Don't let her die yet. I don't think I can handle her right now."

A misconception that people have in dealing with life's tragedies is that it's wrong to ask why – that a Christian simply accepts and never questions. Abraham, Moses and David all interceded and struggled to understand God.

But the lives of these men model for us a

total dependence on God, even in the midst of questioning. God never turns His back on those who ask honest questions...sincerely seeking is acceptable to God. Obviously dis**belief** is sin but it's not a sin to doubt, because in the presence of God you may ask any question you want.

Perhaps the reason that God doesn't always give us the answer to the "whys" of our existence is that He knows we haven't got the capacity to understand the answer. In learning to depend on God, we've got to accept that we may not know all the answers, but we know who **knows** the answers.

There is a mystery to it. I have to ultimately admit that I don't know God's reasons. I have to accept by faith that God is a God of love and mercy and compassion even in the midst of suffering.

I've looked into the eyes of a young man my own age horrible disfigured by cerebral palsy and as I've changed his bed sheet I've asked, "Why?"

I recall standing at the bedside of a child who was dying and asking, "Lord, why?" When we watch the devastation left by tornadoes, earthquakes and hurricanes we can't help but ask ourselves, "why?"

The Bible says God is **not** the author of evil but that it is a mystery. There is something about evil that we will **never** understand this side of eternity. The Bible also says there **is** a real devil who has great power and that the human heart is evil and capable of almost limitless evil when it is cut off from God and the moral law. The prophet Jeremiah said, "The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked. Who can know it?" That's us without God. And that's one reason we each need God, for only He can change our hearts and give us the desire and power to do what's right.

Events like 9/11 and Irene not only teach us about mystery but also about community. Tragedies that could tear us apart can instead **unities** us in comfort, compassion and in outpouring of sympathy and help. We experience a bit of what God feels when he sees the suffering on this planet. The other lesson is one of frailty and the brevity of life. I doubt that any of us ever dream that this will be our last day on earth.

### **Mount Holly Constable Update**

I would like to express my thanks to all our residents, volunteers, and emergency responders for all their dedication and support during Hurricane Irene, and the days that followed. So many people volunteered their time to make sure that our community and those around us received adequate supplies and services. On the first day of the storm, I coordinated efforts with Fire Chief Keith Hawkins and other department personnel to set up a shelter and command center at the Belmont Station. Notifications were made to local and state agencies throughout the day. Fire personnel checked several homes for possible evacuations, and kept us informed on road conditions. Eleven people utilized the shelter that afternoon. By nightfall, everyone had been relocated to local homes since the Red Cross was not able to travel to our location with cots & blankets due to road washouts. Over the next several days I worked with Jeff Teter, our Road Foreman and the rest of the town crew, updating road closures daily and ensuring that all washouts were clearly marked. Thanks to Randy Bixby for sending out information on the Newsflash. On Wednesday & Thursday we received water, blankets and MRE's from FEMA, via the Vermont National Guard. Thanks to all those who came out to unload the trucks, especially Josh & Leslie Bixby & Ethan Young. After taking care of our own town needs, we put the word out to surrounding communities and subsequently delivered several truck loads to Proctorsville, Cavendish, Plymouth, Shrewsbury & East Wallingford, as well as Black River Good Neighbors. Thanks to Aaron Sanborn & Wes Hupp for donating their time, trucks and trailers.

On another note, I would like to commend the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for their remembrance of the tenth anniversary of 911. The community prayer service at the Belmont Baptist Church was moving and eloquent. Thanks to Pastor Glenn Davis for his reflections and to the musicians who performed so many patriotic hymns.

### **Guidelines for Failed Septic Systems**

The Wastewater Management Division has five regional offices that can provide assistance and answer questions about wastewater systems, water supplies and the permitting process. The new guidelines advise anyone who has an onsite sewage system to take the following actions if they find wastewater above ground:

- 1. Contact your town health officer. Your town office can provide you with the appropriate name and phone number.
- 2. Anyone who has a wastewater system that continues to have surfacing of household waste after the water recedes should take steps to prevent people and animals from entering the contaminated area.
- 3. As much as possible, take steps to prevent surfacing wastewater from flowing toward wells or off your property.
- 4. If you have a pump station as part of your household system, do not immediately pump the wastewater from the septic tank until it is known that the water table has dropped to an acceptable depth. An elevated groundwater table may cause an empty tank to collapse or shift in the ground.
- 5. Hydrated lime (also known as calcium hydroxide) may be applied to help disinfect the area. Lime is caustic so you must follow the instructions, wear rubber boots, gloves, goggles, and other protective clothing, and prevent people and animals from exposure.
- 6. Contact your ANR regional office and staff will assist you through the process of replacing the failed wastewater system and will provide information on how to obtain a permit if one is needed. - 7. A licensed designer will need to design the wastewater system if the failed system needs reconstruction or replacing. Safe Drinking Water After the Flood: Private drinking wells that were subject to flooding should be tested for bacterial contamination. Contact your Health Department district office or town health officer for a free test kit and disinfection instructions. Until a test confirms that your water is safe, boil water for one minute before use in drinking, cooking, making juice or ice, washing fruits and vegetables and brushing teeth. This also applies to water that is dispensed by a refrigerator system. Shower with caution. Avoid getting water in eyes, mouth and wounds. Do not allow children to swallow bath water if on a boilwater

Residents who get their drinking water from a public system should look for boil water or other instructions put out by their own system.

If there is a smell of petroleum or fuel, do not use water at all for cooking, bathing or washing. Use bottled water or water from a known safe source. Call the Health Department drinking water program at <u>1-800-439-8550</u> for consultation and testing information

- Belmont Road culvert: unclear if this would qualify for FEMA aid; Jeff will cover it with the FEMA project officer to see if it can be

included as a project.

- The Road Crew and the Select Board were commended for their efforts to get the roads back up and running so quickly.
- 3. Report of Treasurer.
  - David Johnson presented an income and expense statement dated August 31, 2011 showing cash balances of \$3,125,069. August is the biggest month for collection of property taxes, thus the large difference from last month.
  - Outside Audit: The 2009 and 2010 town audits are complete. Fire Dept. and Rescue Squad are complete. The auditor is completing the setup of 2011 on the computer (QuickBooks Premier software) and will install it all on the town's computer and provide the training for David and Diana
  - Annette Lynch will obtain the name of another software product which was suggested at a town officer's conference as being better for government accounting than QuickBooks.
  - Paul will ask the auditor for a special meeting date (October 3), in order to combine trips for setting up the computer and a presentation to the Select Board. Fire and Rescue audits to be included.
  - In response to questions, it was noted
    - There are a few additional items that need to go up to the auditor to complete the 2011 year, then is should all be done.

- 8. Star Lake Dam report: The 2011 State report was received; the only change described the bridge over the spillway as 'unstable'. Ron Unterman noted he kept a close eye on the lake during Irene and water never reached the bridge. As the water rose, the spillway and culvert were balanced and handled the water, until it reached the top of the walls. The bridge will be considered as part of the redesign.
- 9. Other Business
  - Catamount Trail Association Paul met with them at the bridge to review the town's concerns. He reported that the deck is in surprisingly good condition, but there are some loose cables at one end that need repair. The CTA will get back to the town.
  - The Board received a letter complaining about a junkyard condition on a neighboring property, and also potentially someone living on the property in an RV. The Board will contact the Health Officer to look into it. The town has a junkyard ordinance; however enforcement is difficult; the state hasn't always backed the town. Paul will look at the property and report back to the Board.
  - Cell Tower news: Via an email received by Dennis Devereux, AT&T has permits for the Stewart Rd. and Weston towers; construction is likely in 2012. Another tower developer is planning to file for a tower in Plymouth.
  - Blue Spruce news: The town has no further word on this project. The Planning Commission is sending a letter to the New England Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church (property owner), as well as a copy of the last meeting's video. It is believed the project is still being considered and that the group plans to resubmit their proposal to the State.
- 10. The Board reviewed and signed the August orders for payment.
- 11. The Board adjourned to Executive Session at 8:22pm. The Board returned from Executive Session at 8:33pm.

Chairman Howard asked Ms. Kelly (and the members of the planning commission) if she had thought about the potential for conflict of interest. Lisa Kelly admitted that she saw no potential for a situation of conflict of interest. The members also were in agreement that because the AO does not make any final decisions (they are left to the Planning Commission), conflict of interest would not be an issue. 

### **Star Lake Undate**

<u>Weed Control:</u> For almost a decade the Friends of Star Lake (FOSL) has been implementing an annual program to control invasive Milfoil, and more recently, nuisance native weeds. This year we treated with the herbicide, "sonar," and the results have shown significant Milfoil knock-down, although the herbicide was-out from Irene set us back somewhat. Please remember that these and other weed control measures need to be applied annually as we work to maintain Star Lake as an open water body, recreational area, and beautiful natural habitat.

<u>Dam Repair:</u> FOSL has now engaged an engineering firm to work with us on this critical project. Their first task is to define the scope of work to repair the dam, the spillway and beach and shoreline areas and to identify the State and Federal agencies that will be involved. This will be a 2-3 year project and will keep you informed as we move through the process

Our services develop the self reliance of individuals through pre and post purchase education, budget and credit counseling, foreclosure intervention, home rehab and energy retrofits, and technical and financial services.

### **After the Flood Food Safety Advisory**

The Vermont Department of Health is advising gardeners to throw away any fruits and vegetables – including root crops – that have been in contact with floodwater. According to the federal Food and Drug Administration, all flood-affected crops – fruits and vegetables, above and below ground – should not be consumed, sold or given away.

Apples, pears or other high-growing fruit that were not touched by floodwater should be washed with a known safe source of water before eating.

"Any fresh produce that has been in contact with floodwaters cannot be considered safe to eat," said Health Commissioner Harry Chen, MD. "This is a change from our earlier advisory. Because the flooding was so extensive and so forceful, there is potential for contamination that cannot be washed or disinfected away."

### Flood food safety guidance:

- Throw away ANY food that has come into contact with floodwater.
- Throw away any food that is not in a waterproof container if there is any chance that it has come into contact with floodwater. Food containers that are not waterproof include those with screw-caps, snap lids, pull tops and crimped caps. Also discard cardboard juice/milk/baby formula boxes and home canned foods if they have come in contact with floodwater because they cannot be effectively cleaned and sanitized.
- For canned goods that came into contact with floodwater, remove labels; wash thoroughly with soap and hot water. Then place in a weak bleach solution made with 1 tbsp. unscented liquid chlorine bleach for every gallon of water from a known safe source and leave for 15 minutes. Re-label with marker.
- If refrigerator and freezer doors are kept closed as much as possible during a power outage, a refrigerator will keep food cold for about four hours. A full freezer will keep the temperature for about 48 hours, a half-full freezer will keep the temperature for about 24 hours.
- Do not cook and eat meat, poultry, fish, eggs or other refrigerated foods that have been above 40 degrees F for two hours or more.
- Wash hands thoroughly with clean water and soap before and after handling food items.
- Never taste food to determine if it is safe. Some foods may look and smell fine, but if it has been at room temperature for more than two hours it can make you sick. Bacteria multiply very quickly at room temperature.
- If you have any doubt about any food item, throw it out.

• On Sept. 1, 2011, the president signed a major disaster declaration for the state of Vermont due to damage caused by Tropical Storm Irene. This declaration allows eligible families and individuals in the designated counties to receive grants to cover temporary housing and serious disaster-related needs and reimbursement for expenses not covered by insurance or other assistance programs. The designated counties for Individual Assistance are Chittenden, Rutland, Washington, Windham, Windsor, Orange, Addison and Bennington.

Those in the counties designated for assistance to affected residents and business owners can begin the disaster application process by registering online at <a href="www.DisasterAssistance.gov">www.DisasterAssistance.gov</a>, by web enabled mobile device at <a href="m.fema.gov">m.fema.gov</a>, or by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362). ### Federal Assistance Available to Vermont Businesses

President Obama has approved federal disaster assistance for Vermont which makes help available for Vermont businesses affected by flooding from Tropical Storm Irene.

Businesses may be eligible for low interest thirty (30) year loans through the Small Business Administration (SBA) to assist with the cost of repairing storm damages. Rental property may also be eligible for an SBA loan if property has been damaged or destroyed and losses are not covered by insurance. (Businesses are not eligible for assistance FEMA's Individual Assistance programs.)

Even if you have insurance for your business, you should file your claim right away with the SBA in case some of the damage is uninsured.

### **Vermont Agency of Natural Resources**

ANR Offers Advice for Homeowners with Failed Septic Systems Homeowners must take steps to protect drinking supplies


Today the Agency of Natural Resources issued guidance to homeowners about the need to take action if they have reason to believe their septic system has failed.

"Vermont homeowners and businesses served by onsite wastewater disposal systems who see wastewater on the ground must take action," said Agency of Natural Resources Secretary Deb Markowitz. "Improperly treated wastewater is a risk to human health, both through direct exposure and by entering and contaminating water supplies."

"Many wastewater systems will properly function once the water recedes, while other systems will require repair or replacement," said Ernie Christianson, program manager for the Wastewater Management Division of the Department of Environmental Conservation. "Call our regional offices for help."

The Wastewater Management Division has five regional offices that can provide assistance and answer questions about wastewater systems, water supplies and the permitting process. The new guidelines advise anyone who has an onsite sewage system to take the following actions if they find wastewater above ground:

- **1.** Contact your town health officer. Your town office can provide you with the appropriate name and phone number.
- **2.** Anyone who has a wastewater system that continues to have surfacing of household waste after the water recedes should take steps to prevent people and animals from entering the contaminated area.
- **3.** As much as possible, take steps to prevent surfacing wastewater from flowing toward wells or off your property.



- **4.** If you have a pump station as part of your household system, do not immediately pump the wastewater from the septic tank until it is known that the water table has dropped to an acceptable depth. An elevated groundwater table may cause an empty tank to collapse or shift in the ground.
- **5.** Hydrated lime (also known as calcium hydroxide) may be applied to help disinfect the area. Lime is caustic so you must follow the instructions, wear rubber boots, gloves, goggles, and other protective clothing, and prevent people and animals from exposure.
- **6.** Contact your ANR regional office and staff will assist you through the process of replacing the failed wastewater system and will provide information on how to obtain a permit if one is needed. - **7.** A licensed designer will need to design the wastewater system if the failed system needs reconstruction or replacing. ### Safe Drinking Water After the Flood

Private drinking wells that were subject to flooding should be tested for bacterial contamination. Contact your Health Department district office or town health officer for a free test kit and disinfection instructions. Until a test confirms that your water is safe, boil water for one minute before use in drinking, cooking, making juice or ice, washing fruits and vegetables and brushing teeth. This also applies to water that is dispensed by a refrigerator system. Shower with caution. Avoid getting water in eyes, mouth and wounds. Do not allow children to swallow bath water if on a boil-water notice.

Residents who get their drinking water from a public system should look for boil water or other instructions put out by their own system.

If there is a smell of petroleum or fuel, do not use water at all for cooking, bathing or washing. Use bottled water or water from a known safe source. Call the Health Department's drinking water program at <u>1-800-439-8550</u> for consultation and testing information.

Three Ludlow groups - the Town of Ludlow, Black River Academy Museum, and FOLA (Friends of Ludlow Auditorium), have made arrangements to celebrate Vermont's 150th anniversary of its involvement in the Civil War with a free piano concert by renowned pianist, Jacqueline Schwab, famous for her work in providing music for a number of Ken Burn's epic PBS series, including both the Civil War and Mark Twain. The concert is scheduled for October 9 at 6:30 PM at the Ludlow Town Hall Auditorium. Jacqueline's solo piano concert at the Ludlow Auditorium will feature vintage American music, to celebrate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Town of Ludlow's involvement in the Civil War. She will perform music from Mark Twain's era (1835-1910) and beyond—Stephen Foster and Civil War song tunes, Victorian ballroom dance tunes, Scots and Irish songs and dance tunes


