Richard "Dick" Eddy

Richard "Dick" Eddy FAIR HAVEN - Richard William "Dick" Eddy, 86, formerly of Mount Holly, died Friday, Oct. 12, 2018, at his Fair Haven home, after a period of declining health. He was born in Hamden, Connecticut, on Dec. 8, 1931, to Estella Courtois and Abel Eddy. He attended Hill House High School until he enlisted in the U.S. Navy on Oct. 8, 1951. During the Korean War, he served aboard the USS Block Island for three years, obtained his GED, transferred to an LST, and was honorably discharged after a four-year term. Dick went on to take art classes at the University of Hartford and Pratt Institute. Dick married Georgiana Doody Eddy on Oct. 3, 1953, in New Haven and lived on Connecticut's eastern shore before moving from Madison to Mount Holly, Vermont, in 1966. Together with their four children and a variety of pets, Dick and "George" lived for decades on the former Goddell Farm, where Dick tended his woodpiles, fed the chipmunks and enjoyed country life. Although Dick worked in sales and retired from the Gift Box Corporation of America, his lifelong passions were art, fly fishing, bird hunting, antiques and the outdoors. He was an accomplished watercolor and pen and ink artist, established Weather Hill Gallery and became a member of the West River Artists' Guild. He exhibited at the Chaffee Art Center, Fletcher Farm School for Arts and Crafts, the Southern Vermont Arts Center and many "Art in the Park" events. He raised rainbow trout in two ponds on his property, tied his own flies and made his own fishing rods. He also collected and sold antiques and trained English setters to hunt game birds. He is survived by his four children Karen Eddy, of Randolph, Richard and wife Barbara Eddy, of Eugene, Oregon, Elizabeth Eddy, of Castleton, and Ellen Eddy, of Kenesaw, Nebraska; four grandchildren Marlys Eddy, of Braintree, Vermont, Jesse and Brie Eddy-White, of Kenesaw, Nebraska, and Shana and husband Chad Mart, of Eugene, Oregon; his sister, Doris Hatfield, of Alexandria, Virginia; and nephew, Dr. Tim Richardson, of Hallowell, Maine. He was predeceased by his parents; wife Georgiana in 1993; his sister, Estelle Richardson, and brother, William. Friends were invited to attend a funeral Mass at St. Patrick's Church in Wallingford, Vermont, on Saturday, Oct. 20, at 11 a.m. A gathering was held in the Parish Hall afterwards. Memorial contributions may be made to Trout Unlimited.

Dorothy Anne Tomkinson, age 74, of Mount Holly, VT passed away on October 15, 2018 at home, in the care of her loving family.

Dorothy "Dot" was born November 7, 1943 to Edward and Theodora LaRoche of Claremont, NH. She was the sixth child of ten and the first daughter in the family. She and her husband, Craig Tomkinson, of Mount Holly, were married in April, 1988 in Westport, CT. Their marriage moved Dot and her youngest child, Elizabeth, to Vermont later that year, a move that she always said was a major turning point in their lives.

Dorothy lost her parents at an early age and spent most of her childhood at the Mooseheart School in Aurora, IL with five of her siblings. Her experience as a young girl at Mooseheart gave her the opportunity to attend Saint Anselm's college where she graduated with a degree in Nursing. She worked as a Registered Nurse for many years, including six years as the school nurse for Sherburne Elementary School in Killington, VT. At the age of 50, she went back to school and earned a master's degree in psychology from Lesley University. After several years in private practice in Rutland, VT, she retired to travel with her husband, spend time with her family, volunteer with hospice, and grow her faith through regular attendance at services at the Weston Priory in Weston, VT. Dorothy's faith was unwavering since childhood. Her time spent at the Priory for the past 30 years was an important source of strength and comfort for her.

Dorothy was a devoted wife, mother, grandmother, and friend. She attracted people to her, and everyone she met became an instant friend. She loved her family above all else, especially her

three grandchildren, who gave her so much joy. Having two of her grandchildren in Mount Holly filled her daily life for the past six years. Her role as Mèmè meant more to her than any accomplishment she had made previously. Some of her favorite things were: cooking for her family, gardening, family reunions, walks in the woods, cross country skiing, long talks with family and friends, spending quiet time at her "trout crossing" and her "meditation rock", going on spiritual retreats, the Maine coast, RVing across the country, putting out holiday decorations, having tea with loved ones, soft serve ice cream, maple syrup, and whole belly clams.

She is survived by her husband Craig, by two daughters; Elizabeth Chase, of Mount Holly, and her husband, Jeffrey, and their two children; and Teresa DeMaria of Stratford, CT and her daughter; and a step-daughter, Breege Tomkinson, of Sacramento, CA. In addition, Dorothy is survived by her brothers Richard LaRoche and his wife Maureen, Louis LaRoche and his wife Vicki, Art LaRoche and partner, Mary, Robert LaRoche and his wife Claire, as well as many nieces and nephews.

Dorothy was predeceased by her younger sisters, Annette LaRoche and Katherine Lyons, as well as her brothers Norman, Charles, and Francis LaRoche and her step-daughter Aubray Tomkinson.

In lieu of a traditional funeral, Dorothy will be honored at the Weston Priory during a regular Saturday service. A celebration of life and internment will take place in the spring in Claremont, NH.

Bless the apple pie and tea, Bless each and every calorie. Let us enjoy Thanksgiving dinner. Tomorrow we can all get thinner.



Ecological Inventory of the Ninevah Foundation Lands Mount Holly and Plymouth, Vermont



What surprises did nature have in store when Vermont ecologist Brett Engstrom surveyed Lake Ninevah and the 3,300 acres of conserved land surrounding it?

On August 4, Vermont ecologist Brett Engstrom came to Mount Holly to discuss his remarkable two-year inventory of ecological resources around Lake Ninevah. His observations and report will guide the management of these lands for many years to come. From meadows to a wide variety of wetlands, bear and other wildlife habitat and one of the largest undisturbed old growth forests in the state, Engstrom's findings document the treasure discovered in our own backyard.

The Ninevah Foundation and Farm & Wilderness Foundation, newly affiliated this year, will work with the state and local communities to provide public access and educational opportunities for young people on these lands. All are invited to view the full presentation on Okemo Valley TV: http://okemovalley.tv/lake-ninevah-ecology

This two-year inventory yielded surprising and remarkable results, revealing for the first time many rare and state-significant features on Ninevah Foundation lands. With information from Brett's field work along with other sources, cartographer Andrew Toepfer created a set of four maps: Natural Features; Wetlands; Cultural Features (showing historic homesteads, old roads and contemporary and historic farms); and Rare, Threatened, Endangered & Uncommon Species and State-significant Upland Natural Communities.

Engstrom says, "The Ninevah Foundation Lands, tucked up in the elevated basins found at the south end of the Coolidge Range in the Green Mountains, present a surprisingly diverse landscape of natural communities. Not only was there an unusual rich northern hardwood forest perched high in the mountains, but also wetlands, including numerous vernal pools and seeps, appeared almost everywhere I went on the elevated flats north and south of Lake Ninevah. And Lake Ninevah – the crown jewel – and its large peatland occupying a bay at its south end, are among Vermont's ecological treasures, both for their biodiversity, including many rare plants, and their sheer beauty."

This inventory documented five new rare, threatened, endangered and uncommon species on Ninevah Foundation Lands and on Lake Ninevah, bringing the total species now confirmed to 18. These species include two birds, the Common Loon and the rusty blackbird, the latter protected as Endangered and Threatened in Vermont. All except two of the species are associated with wetlands or the lake, which highlights the biodiversity importance of the NF Lands wetlands and Lake Ninevah.

Is The Light Going Out?

Historian Arnold Toynbee stated that there are nineteen major civilizations that have existed since mankind began to structure governments. Of the nineteen, only five remain. Our Western civilization is among them. Today we might well ask, with growing concern, "Will it survive?"

Western civilization has allowed a traveler today to circle the globe in a matter of hours. (You know, breakfast in Chicago, lunch in Helsinki, luggage in Milwaukee.) Yet millions of folks have no direction to their lives. The opioid crisis has become epidemic. There is serious fear and trouble in our schools. Technology has brought many blessings and yet curses creeping like mold. Some say we have not been this divided since the Civil War (and then not much is *civil* anymore.)

A former Health, Education, and Welfare secretary, John Gardner, wrote, "Back of every great civilization behind all the power and wealth, is something as powerful...a set of ideas, attitudes, convictions, and the confidence that those ideas and convictions are viable. No nation can achieve greatness unless it believes in something --and unless that something has the moral dimensions to sustain a great civilization.

Gardner's example is the [5,000 marching toward our border right now] lineal descendants of those who created the Mayan civilization. Today these are people, not seeking or getting much, other than asylum. A light went out.


What is the light that sets apart our Western civilization? Unless we know, we might unknowingly let that light sputter and go out.

The Book upon which our republic was founded says, "When the foundations are being destroyed, what can the righteous do?" It says that nations fall because they turn from God and from His Word. They attempt to construct an adequate way of life by their own efforts. The result: the historical cycle of inevitable rise and thunderous collapse.

But there's an alternative. A nation does not *need* to fall. If the cause of collapse is turning *from God*, the remedy is turning *to God*. We can cry out to God for help in returning to Him. "Turn us, O God", the psalmist pleads, "and cause Your face to shine, and we shall be saved." We need God's help and mercy even to seek Him.

Lukewarm, apathetic Christian *you* need to rise up and call on God to revive His people, pray for this nation as you never have before and then go vote. As individual believers we can promote honesty, humility, and a genuine readiness to serve. We can call for higher standards of morality and civility and take a stand for truth. Then ask Him to make you a Christ-like man or woman (never underestimate the power of one) with a holy life that cannot go unnoticed.

Dying civilizations are the sum total of dying individuals. Yet God can do great things through consecrated individuals, through yielded lives. Ask Jesus to light the light that makes a nation great in the *truest* sense of that word. Ask that He start with you, right now. Pastor Glenn



Candidate's statement: Government and moderation

Thomas Jefferson held strict views about the government's powers. Most of us share a measure of his commitment to limited government. We expect the government to leave us alone in our private lives.

Over time, though, we've expanded what we expect from government. A century ago Teddy Roosevelt, for example, championed a stronger government. He concluded that ordinary citizens like you and me needed an advocate who could contend in strength and stature with modern corporate interests. For Roosevelt government was that advocate.

We rarely all agree about how to apply those valid principles, but Jefferson taught that unanimity isn't the point. Instead, government is about achieving a "workable consensus for a given time."

Governing isn't winner-take-all. Our government's decisions and actions should represent not only the slightly more than half who are the majority, but also the substantial body of citizens who are at that moment the minority. No republic can survive if nearly half the population is routinely denied a proportional share in governing.

George Washington warned that political parties would only deepen the divide. He foresaw today's polarized government, with representatives torn between party loyalty and their better judgment.

Some issues are for some of us truly matters of conscience. Most governing decisions, though, come down to grappling with Jefferson's workable consensus, a centrist agreement most of us can live with, even if it leaves each of us a little dissatisfied.

All this requires moderation.

Instead extremes seem to rule the day. We suffer discouragement. Our confidence in government declines.

It's my sense, however, that in between those vocal extremes, most of us are seeking moderation in the public space we share.







engaging in a bit of sober self-reflection. Kline relishes the comic challenge in this snazzy production.

To begin with, Kline looks the part of Garry Essendine, an aging but still seductive roué who leaves the ladies weak at the knees. Although never ridiculous, he's genuinely funny. This handsome, narcissistic baby who's terrified of being alone but complains loudly at the hordes of visitors who descend on his handsome London townhouse. However chaotic the manic events unfolding in his living room, he automatically pauses to glance at a mirror before leaving the room — a small but significant staging detail that pays off with a terrific sight gag.

What makes Garry so endearing is that he never questions himself but accepts the world's adulation as his due. "Everybody worships me, it's nauseating," he says, without irony. The young ones, too.

Coward has said that "Present Laughter" was the most autobiographical of his plays, so Garry's advice should be taken at face value. In the same way, Garry's disarming admissions of frailty—his fear of growing old, of losing his magnetic appeal, of being alone and unwanted—run like a rushing underground river beneath the farcical fun. It seems that Coward, the most successful actor-playwright of his time, was human, after all.

THE GIFT OF STORY, Clarissa Pinkola Estes, Ph.D.

... Whether you are an old family, a new family or a family in the making, whether you be lover or friend, it is the experiences you share with others and the stories that you tell about those experiences afterward, and the tales you bring from the past and future that create the ultimate bond.

There is no right or wrong way to tell a story. Perhaps you will forget the beginning, or the middle or the end. But a little piece of sunrise through a small window can lift the heart regardless. So cajole the old grumpy ones to tell their best memories. Ask the little ones their happiest moments. Ask the teenagers the scariest times of their lives. Give the old ones the floor. Go all around the circle. Coax out the introverts. Ask each person. You will see. Everyone will be warmed, sustained by the circle of stories you create together.

Though none of us will live forever, the stories can. As long as one soul remains who can tell the story, and that by the recounting of the tale, the greater forces of love, mercy, generosity and strength are continuously called into being in the world. I promise you...It will be enough.

Change your clocks - change the battery in your smoke and co alarm

As Vermonters move their clocks back an hour November 4th, the Vermont Division of Fire Safety wants everyone to remember to also change the batteries in all smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

While changing the battery, it is also important to check the date on the alarm. Most smoke alarms have an effective life span of around 10 years, and carbon monoxide alarms work for approximately 5-7 years depending on manufacturer. If you do not have smoke or carbon monoxide alarms in your home, it is strongly recommended you install them as soon as possible to increase your chance of escaping a home fire.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), approximately 60-percent of home fire deaths between 2009 and 2013 were in homes with non-existent or inoperable smoke alarms. Failure to maintain or replace dead batteries was the leading cause of the failure.

Vermont law requires all new smoke alarms to be of the photoelectric type. Photoelectric type alarms have been proven to reduce "nuisance alarms" due to cooking, or steam from bathrooms, and can activate sooner to smoldering (upholstery) type fires.

In addition to working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, it is always important to have a fire escape plan, especially in homes with small children, and practice that plan at least twice a year. 




