"Pathways to Possibilities" embodies the vision and mission of the school; working collaboratively with business leaders, community organizations and educators, students will graduate with a profound appreciation for the world they live in, how they can positively impact their communities and an informed understanding of 21st century career opportunities.

Kendra Rickerby, Head of School, shared this observation; "When we collaborate with an instructor from Vermont Institute of Natural Sciences, we go for a hike. Expeditionary School at Black River Receives EpicPromise Grant

The Expeditionary School at Black River (ESBR) announced last week that they are the recipient of a \$4K from EpicPromise, a Vail Resorts foundation. - 2) If your dog gets loose and I get a call, he or she can be identified so much sooner and can be returned without possibly ending up at the Rutland County Humane society where there are fees to get them back.
- 3) It is a VT law to have them licensed and vaccinated for rabies, which is needed to get the license.

The photograph in the February issue shows the front of the store operated by the Horton family. It was located at the intersection of the Hortonville and Turnpike Roads and is identified as #3 in the area photograph in this same issue. The store was operated by three generations of the family, with Lindie Horton Russell being the last one. Mrs. Russell was also the postmistress for about 40 years and ran the central office of the Telephone Company in the same building. The post office moved in 1940 to where it is now near the railroad tracks. The telephone office moved shortly after that until in 1945 when it went into the home of Clifford and Rita Pratt across from Frost Hill Road where Mrs. Pratt was the operator. The old store was sold to Harry Colburn in 1946 who used it for a tenement house. After being vacate for several years it was taken down in the 1990s.

During the summer months we again participated in the Two River's Supervisory Union's Go Wild Summer Camp, teaching campers about fishing, outdoor activities, and empowerment. While we have had to cancel in person events for the time being, we continue to improve our current programs through additional training, and collaboration with other Vermont Coalitions.

Underage Drinking, Abuse of Prescription Drugs, and Use of Marijuana by youth aged 12 - 25 years are still our priorities. As we enter our 18^h year we continue to support and promote activities and programming that address these issues.

- We promote National Prescription Drug Take Back Days twice a year and using permanent drug return boxes in pharmacies and police departments.
- We offer presentations for teens, teachers/staff, and parents to reduce current trends in underage drinking, tobacco and drug abuse and recovery resources. (Currently provided via Zoom)
- Our collaboration with Turning Point in Springfield provides education and support services in the recovery sector, and have one of our staff currently training as a Recovery Coach
- Collaborate with the Vermont Department of Health and Ludlow Health Center
- Recognize Responsible Retailers as part of our effort to reduce alcohol and tobacco sales to minors.
- Work to reduce tobacco & electronic cigarette use in collaboration with the school substance abuse prevention staff.
- Participated in county wide educational efforts to reduce drug and alcohol abuse and wrote grants, including obtaining funding for our School Based Substance Abuse Counselor to increase coverage from two to four days for the 2020-2021 school year.





PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FOR DISABLE VETERANS AND THEIR SURVIVORS

The following are eligible for the exemption: Veterans receiving Disability Compensation at a rating of 50% or higher; Veterans receiving Non-Service Connected Pension (also called improved Pension); Veterans collecting permanent military retirement pay for medical military retirement; and Surviving spouses of veterans who had received the exemption (surviving spouses may also be eligible for Dependency and indemnity Compensation or Death Pension).

The exemption is \$40,000 in Mount Holly. The exemption reduces the appraised value of the home prior to the assessment of



taxes. The exemption only applies to homes that are owned by the veteran or survivor and is the primary residence.

To receive the exemption, the veteran must provide proof of eligibility to the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs every year before May 1st. Veterans who are determined to be totally and permanently disabled only have to provide proof of eligibility the first year they use the benefit for a home (if they move to a new home in a different town, they will have to provide proof of eligibility again). They also must provide proof of eligibility by May 1st.

Proof of eligibility is provided to the Town by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Our recommendation is to call the VA at 1-800-827-1000 no later than April 1st to request the documentation. The proof of eligibility may also be obtained through ebenefits.

State Representative Report for Ludlow, Mount Holly, Shrewsbury

Somehow things seem to be moving so much faster and slower all at the same time. The House and the Senate have already passed three bills. The first granted authority to municipalities and Select Boards to hold their town meeting on a different day later in the year or by Australian ballot. The second extended deadlines for provisions the legislature wrote last March for worker's compensation in response to the pandemic until the end of the state of emergency. Last spring we had written a lot of our bills assuming we would be on the other side of the pandemic by now so many of those provisions were set to expire.

The most recent bill passed was the Budget Adjustment Act. I've written about this in the past but basically the BAA is something we always pass this time of year to adjust and "shore-up" the current fiscal year's budget. The state's fiscal year runs July 1-June 30, so we are roughly halfway through and some Departments/programs inevitably use more or less money than they were originally budgeted. The BAA is how we fix projections and make sure Departments/programs have the funding they need, but no more than they need. Last year we did not actually finish the budget until October, so all things considered, the BAA was fairly "normal" this year and did not need as much work.

Obviously one of the bigger issues this session will be the teachers and state employees' pension system. I hesitate to bring it up here because I don't really have any more information yet. It is something we are working on and are trying to find a solution everyone can accept. I will say I do not support the plan proposed by Treasurer Pearce and fear that even just it being proposed, on top of the current stress and pressures with COVID, may lead many people to retire early. I have multiple active and retired teachers and state employees in my family, so this issue is very personal to me and I know the fear and uncertainty you are feeling because we're feeling it too.

In my committee we've been splitting most of our time these last couple weeks on recommendations for proposals in the Governor's budget and specific wording on a program to grant out \$10M to businesses around VT that were ineligible for the federal relief grants and loans that have been offered up to now. It's a big change from the work I did last session in Human Services, but I am learning more every day. And I know how important this committee is going to be in how Vermont recovers from the pandemic.

As always, please feel free to reach out if you want to talk about anything I mentioned here or anything I didn't. Calling is best, I get too many emails to respond to all of them.

Mount Holly Biodiversity Project Going Strong!

Since January 17 Mount Holly residents and visitors have been contributing their observations to a new project that aims to compile a comprehensive inventory of all living things found in the town of Mount Holly. As of Feb. 22, there have been 1,216 observations submitted and 559 species of plants, animals, and fungi identified by 96 observers! Already 22 volunteers have joined to project and spring is just around the corner. Recent observations include Bobcats, Barred Owls, and Bald Eagles. Can you guess the most common plants found in Mount Holly? The Project is Free and open to the public and everyone is invited to check out our progress at https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/mount-holly-biodiversity.

Your observations will help! Every time you see a bird, plant, or wild animal in Mount Holly iNaturalist can help you identify it and then submit it to our community project. iNatural is a Free app that works on your smart phone and computer. All you have to do is take a photo on your smart phone or digital camera, submit it to iNaturalist, and the program gives you the probable identification!

Ready to give it a try? Download the <u>Free</u> app to your smart phone from the Google Play Store or Apple App Store. Once downloaded, navigate to Help in the drop-down menu and follow the illustrated instructions for Getting Started or watch the video tutorial. Your smart phone is now your easiest tool to learn the names of the plants & animals that you find.

How can I join? Once you have the app on your smart phone then you can join the Mount Holly Biodiversity project on your smart phone or computer. When you go to our project webpage on your computer (https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/mount-holly-biodiversity) click on "Join Project" just above the green "About" square of text describing the project. Once you have joined the project your observations will automatically be submitted to our town's ecological inventory plus you will receive occasional news and updates about the project. The project webpage also shows you the list of who has the most species, how many species have been found, lists the most frequently seen species (can you guess what it is?), and provides an interactive map showing where all the observations have been recorded!

This is "citizen science" at its best, we hope you will enjoy using iNaturalist yourself to learn the names of those trees, birds, wildflowers, you see and join us in knowing more about the amazing natural biodiversity of Mount Holly. This is a great outdoor family activity and a wonderful way to teach children about nature. The project is sponsored by the Mount Holly Conservation Trust and the Mount Holly Conservation Commission. Working with the Mount Holly Conservation Trust, the Commission has also submitted an application to the State to receive free technical assistance to draft a Municipal Shade Tree Preservation Plan. Mr. DeVine thanked the Select Board for the letters of support on both projects. He also reported on the on-going work to update the inventory of Mount Holly's natural resources, and on the iNaturalist bio-diversity project, in which participants can download an app, photograph an animal, and the app will aggregate the data for the town. To date, 550 species have been reported by 93 observers in town. The Commission hopes to work with the school on this project, and all information gathered will help update the natural resources inventory.

e. Rutland Regional Planning Commission Update – Jon McCann reported it was a very short meeting; no update necessary.

6. New Business

- **a.** Improvements to Nature Trail Network Mount Holly School Student As no student was in attendance, this item was tabled.
- **b.** Lake Ninevah Aquatic Nuisance Control Grant The Select Board agreed to continue to partner with the Ninevah Foundation and to support the Aquatic Nuisance Prevention program, as the town has done for the past 20 years. The

Select Board also agreed to sign the necessary grant documents once in hand. c. Highway Mileage Certification – Review & Sign – Mr. Chase made a motion to approve and sign the Certificate of Mileage, seconded by Mr. Turco, unanimously approved.

- **d. Town Highway Retreatment Plan Draft** Mr. Chase working with Mr. Woolley put together a 12- year Retreatment Plan for both Class 2 & Class 3 roads prioritizing pavement replacement based on prior paving, current need, and funding available. Using \$55,000 available from taxes, \$21,000 in this year's budget, and \$31,000 from State funds, the end of Healdville Road and Station Road as well as Chalet and Alpine Drives are scheduled for work this year. Mr. Chase and Mr. Woolley will put together a RFP for this work. Mr. Woolley stated the FY22 Town Highway Structures and Town Highway Class 2 Roadway grant program information has been released. The plan is to apply for a grant for work on Belmont Road. Mr. Turco and Ms. Matthews thanked Mr. Chase and Mr. Woolley for their work on the retreatment plan.
- e. Other Grand List Certificate of No Appeal or Suit Pending Mr. Johnson stated this was just a formality from the Listers for the Select Board to sign.

Geese Depredation Permit – Ron Unterman explained this was the 10th year of working with the town to decrease goose poop on the beach at Star Lake by killing a few geese. Ms. Matthews made a motion to approve and sign the Migratory Bird Depredation permit, seconded by Mr. Chase, unanimously approved.

7. Ongoing & Old Business

a. Audit RFPs – Open & Review – Ms. Matthews reported that six RFP packets were mailed out: five to firms in VT, and one to a firm in Maine which performs audits for a number of municipalities here in VT. Three of the VT firms and the ME firm submitted proposals. The Select Board did an initial

review of the proposals. Three firms had similar bids, and one firm's bid was double that of the others. The Select Board decided to only consider the three firms with similar bids. Ms. Matthews will draft a list of questions to ask when talking with the municipal references provided by the firms.

- **b.** Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update Review & Adopt Ms. Matthews made a motion to adopt the 2021 Mount Holly VT Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, seconded by Mr. Turco, unanimously approved. Ms. Matthews and Mr. Turco thanked Mr. Chase, Mr. Woolley, Jon McCann, and Russ Garrow for their work on the plan.
- **c. Class 4 Highway Policy** Mr. Chase drafted a policy based on VLCT's model policy. One issue that remains is the need for a Highway Access Policy, which with the 2019 adoption of the Road & Bridge Standards, we no longer have. Mr. Chase will work on a draft for highway access, again using the VLCT model policy. Ms. Matthews noted the recommendation by both VLCT and VTrans to have both policies reviewed by the town attorney.
- **d.** Lowery Property VT Route 103 Mr. Turco reported that Health Officer Tim Bickford visited the property and found: water is hooked up to the trailer; gray water is being collected in buckets under the trailer and disposed of properly; bathroom black water is being collected in bagged buckets and being disposed of accordingly; trailer is to be moved into its permanent position in the spring.
- **e. Select Board Admin. Assistant Position** Ms. Matthews reported that she had learned of a couple of prospects for the position, but unfortunately neither panned out. It was decided to re-advertise the position in the Vermont Journal and to contact a temp agency.
- f. EV Charging Station Don Richardson was not in attendance. Ms. Matthews reported that he was still gathering information.



Parent Child Center of Rutland County to expand space and services for rural families, affordable daycare

The Biden Administration recently announced that the <u>United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)</u> has provided \$1.2 million to the Parent Child Center of Rutland County (PCC). Grant and loan funding will be used to renovate and modernize PCC's Chaplin Campus into a community facility that includes a food pantry, affordable daycare programs and services for families disrupted by economic stress and substance abuse.

Acting USDA RD State Director of Vermont & New Hampshire, Cheryl Ducharme, was pleased to make the recent announcement. "Since 1984, the Parent Child Center of Rutland County has provided crucial services and rewarding educational experiences for area children and their families," she said. "This funding will enable the PCC to provide additional services, create more space for families and staff, develop new programs and widen access to their food pantry. We are proud to support this project, as its positive impacts on the Rutland community will be felt for generations to come." In recognition of the COVID-19 pandemic's harmful effects on community non-profit organizations, USDA allocated \$367,600 to the project through a Community Facilities Disaster grant. An \$833,900 loan from USDA's Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program, and a \$299,999 block grant from the Vermont Agency of Commerce and Community Development, complete the funding package.

The PCC's Chaplin Campus 2Gen Whole Family Education Center will be a multidimensional, therapeutic community hub, providing a recovery-friendly social environment and resources to help reinvigorate and transform the social fabric in Rutland County. The center will house expanded childcare, parenting and recovery support, career-pathways programming, special-needs playgroups, a greenhouse and gardens, meeting space, and a commercial kitchen for community meals and social events.

This assistance supports housing, infrastructure improvements, business development, high-speed internet access, and community facilities such as schools, public safety and health care. Ludlow Rotary Club Celebrates 94th Anniversary

On January 13, 2021, the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) welcomed its 94th year as a member of Rotary International (RI). When it was initially incorporated as a member club of RI in January of 1927, there was some doubt among residents as to its durability. According to one history of the club, "There were doubters in the town who said 'No such club will last but a few months in this town'."

As events and a stubborn determination have proven, the club has remained fully active and will probably be celebrating its centennial in 2027.

Much of the reason for this dynamic growth of the club is tied to its motto: Service above Self. This has been the driving force behind the club's efforts to provide local and regional assistance to area groups and schools along with the development of national and international projects. Some of the latter included work in eliminating polio, helping nations

develop clean water projects, supporting a child adoption program in Africa, and assisting countries suffering from floods.

Locally, the LRC has supported education with scholarships and literacy projects, helping local government and charitable programs, involvement with the RI Youth Exchange program, and supporting programs for seniors.

The initial club founded in 1927 had 25 members. Charter members in that founding group included: Frank Agan, Jay Archibald, Jay Brown, Mitchell Carey, John Dorsey, Daniel Edwards, Leon Farr, Allen Fletcher, William Forkell, Louis Hope, James Gill, Leon Gay, Olin Gay, Isaac Goldberg, Lowell Hammond, William Lamere, George Levey, Carl Lawrence, William Phelen, Merrill Proctor, and Herbert Walker. Olin Gay was the first President of the club.

A sample of the future LRC Presidents included: Henry Vail (1935), Dr. Everett Holmes (1939), Wendell Spaulding (1944), Daniel Kesman (1953), Norm Schmidt (1957), Frank Bixby (1960), Donald Ellison (1967), Paul Pullinen (1970), Earl Washburn (1977), Martin Nitka (1985), Ed Matulionis (1988), Barbara LeMire (1991), Glenn Heitsmith (2001), and Tesha Buss (2017).

One of the major events during LRC's history was in the late 1980's when women were allowed to join RI. Barbara LeMire was the female member inducted into the Ludlow club.

In 2002, the LRC celebrated its 75th anniversary with a banquet at The Gables at Okemo. President at this occasion was Glenn Heitsmith who was passing the gavel to incoming President Jack Dortch at this event.

Kevin Barnes is the current LRC President. A recent club photo includes the late Robert Kirkbride who was active in the club for over 60 years and was the leading force in the annual Penny Sale which raised funds for scholarship for area seniors graduating from high school.



Senator Alison Clarkson's Legislative Update 21 February 2021

Our Town Meetings will be unusual this year. Yet another example of Vermont's ability to respond flexibly to the continuing challenges the Covid-19 pandemic presents. Some towns are holding Informational Meetings in advance of the vote by Australian Ballot on Tuesday March 2nd. Some are holding off until May in hopes of gathering in person once again. Having attended Woodstock's Informational Meeting by Zoom, I was impressed by how well it went. It was the first of two such meetings and almost 60 people attended. It was good to 'see' so many as the Town reviewed everything from its Vision, its planned Capital Improvements to its Budget and all the Articles on the Ballot. In this unusual year, I look forward to attending many



more town informational meetings than normal – an opportunity enabled by our Zoom life.

This virtual gathering year reminds me of how much we've learned during this pandemic - and, how many of these 'lessons learned' we may incorporate into our lives and statutes as we go forward into the 21st century. Remote access to the Governor's Press Conferences has been wonderful for small newspapers and news outlets, and, it's made it easier for witnesses to testify in our Legislative Committee meetings – as they can participate from almost anywhere in Vermont. And, more people are attending Selectboard and other municipal meetings than ever before.

It has also laid bare major needs in Vermont. Our remote life, forced upon us by Covid, has been a clarion call for Vermont to invest in major social and technological infrastructure needs we've known about for years. Upgrading our State's technology infrastructure (30 year old mainframes overwhelmed by the volume of need and incapable of adapting to change), enabling high speed internet connection to every Vermont business and home, expanding affordable, accessible childcare for our families, expanding and improving our mental health system, expanding our Tele-health opportunities, building more affordable housing and eliminating homelessness, digitizing land



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records, and building our civic engagement by enabling access – these are just a few of the needs articulated by this Covid pandemic.

The Senate Government Operations Committee has just passed out an Elections bill which would change our laws to reflect some of these 'lessons learned'. We had record voter turnout in our 2020 General Election due in large measure to our Vote by Mail initiative. All registered voters in Vermont were mailed a ballot (over 500,000) and had the ability to return it by mail, in a drop box, or in person. As a result, voter turn-out rose from 63% in 2016 and 57% in 2018 to 73% in 2020. Three quarters of the ballots voted were by mail/absentee.

The process went very smoothly, with high integrity, despite concerns to the contrary. This bill celebrates the success of this effort by making permanent the mailing out of ballots to all active registered voters for general elections. The bill, S.15, has a lot of detail needed to allow this to happen in an efficient way - ability to cure certain defective ballots, more flexibility for towns around polling places, allowing town clerks the ability to process ballots early, asking for suggestions for best practices for translation services and more.

Another SGO bill, S.87, is also from Covid-19's 'lessons learned'. It would automatically allow certain changes to government functions in the event of a declared emergency without the legislature having to scramble once an emergency is declared. All of the solutions in it are ones that had been passed during the 2020 Session and were created in response to the Covid crisis.

RE: Open Meeting Law

Christine Pratt's letter to the Chit Chat (January, 2021) regarding my observations of the Select Board meeting on October 13, 2020 is welcome, and it clarifies a number of points about the concerns of those who spoke at the meeting.

However, I would like to respond to her version of my involvement in the issue of the Town garage. I and a number of other Town residents believed that the Select Board was in violation of the requirements of the Vermont Open Meeting Law, when it reached its decision regarding the very-much-needed Town garage. We believed that this was a serious matter. Vermont Open Meeting Law provides only one way for citizens to seek redress: an appeal to the Vermont Superior Court.

As going to court is a serious matter requiring legal representation, I and other members of the group pooled our resources and sought a legal opinion from one of the state's top-flight law firms.

Based on the written evidence, the lawyer concluded that the Select Board had violated the Open Meeting Law. In the hope of avoiding court action and promoting some dialog, I took our findings to the Select Board. The Select Board deliberated and eventually proposed a number of public meetings - to which we agreed.

I learned a number of things from this experience. The most important was: once a detailed plan is presented to the public, questions or suggestions or alternative proposals will be viewed as unhelpful and even obstructive. If decisions by local government are to benefit from maximum public input, then they must be made – as prescribed by the Open Meeting Law – throughout the whole planning and decision-making process. Re: Giraffes in Mount Holly

I thank Christine Pratt for her letter to the editor (Chit Chat January, 2021), which I hope will stimulate further discussion of this important subject.

In a previous letter to the Chit Chat, I told the story of an outsider who wanted to bring a commercial 1,000+ animal wildlife park/zoo to Mount Holly. The focus of the story was how local residents fought the plan in Act 250 hearings and eventually before the Vermont Supreme Court. In those hearings, the Town Plan was important in establishing that the residents of Mount Holly wanted to remain a quiet, unpolluted, scenic town, and that the proposed wildlife park was not compatible with those wishes.

This episode from the Town's past does not involve the issue of zoning – not even zoning by the back door. This Town has made it clear that it will not tolerate zoning. In the mid-1970's and early 2000's, this Town voted down zoning regulations that had been prepared by the Planning Commission and approved by the Select Board.

The Wildlife Park case was not a zoning matter. It was an Act 250 matter stimulated by the size of the development and its commercial nature. In the hearings before the Environmental Board and the Court, the Mount Holly Town Plan was treated as the voice of the people regarding the future that they wanted for their Town.

Going forward, most plans for development that stimulate the Act 250 process in Mount Holly – because of the size of the plan or its commercial nature – will be made by outsider developers. The giraffe case shows the importance of the Town Plan. In order that the voice of Mount Holly's residents is heard, the Select Board has requested that the Planning Commission strengthen the 2018 Town Plan to withstand vigorous legal arguments in Act 250 proceedings.
