

Veteran Honored

Washington, D.C. - More than 500 Vietnam veterans, including one from Vermont, will be inducted into the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund's (VVMF) In Memory Program in 2022. Since the Vietnam War ended, thousands of Vietnam veterans have suffered from exposure to Agent Orange, PTSD and other illnesses as a result of their service. The In Memory program enables the families and friends of those who came home and later died, the opportunity to have them be forever memorialized.

The 2022 In Memory inductee from Vermont is Norman Henry LeBrun, U.S. Air Force, of Mount Holly, April 19 1932 – November 28, 2020.

On June 18, VVMF hosted the 2022 In Memory ceremony on the East Knoll of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and it was shown live on VVMF's Facebook





Residents who have not licensed their dogs will be contacted by the Town Animal Control Officer.




"Safe, Legal, and Rare"? No, This Is Radical

"We speak for those who cannot speak for themselves." That, I recently discovered, is the banner phrase for the... Springfield Humane Society. In light of new technology, science and a fresh look at abortion policies, I felt the need to continue giving a voice to the 60 million innocent babies aborted in our country since 1973.

Remember in November that Vermonters will be asked to vote on Proposal 5 (aka Article 22) which proposes to strip the unborn of any current or future consideration, legal recognition or protection at any stage during pregnancy. Prop 5 is being palmed off as a statewide protection for women's rights guaranteed under Roe v. Wade. The truth is it is a legal catastrophe waiting to happen which ought to be unacceptable to *both* sides in this debate. Whatever your inclination on abortion you should be concerned with your state's constitution. (Vermont has not added a new article to Chapter 1 since 1786!)

You've heard the phrase, "What happens in vagueness stays in vagueness." This proposal is so vague that it could open a




Pandora's Box to allow for all kinds of serious collateral damage permanently. Proposal 5's run-on sentence reads this way: "That an individual's right to personal reproductive autonomy is central to the liberty and dignity to determine one's own life course and shall not be denied or infringed unless justified by a compelling state interest achieved by the least restrictive means."

Does that read like a tossed salad of words? What does it mean? *Nobody knows*. It is a "toss up". "Personal reproductive autonomy" is a concept so broad you could drive a truck through it. "Anything goes" is rarely a good idea, particularly in a field as morally fraught as procreation. For example, with no age restrictions or safeguards this could allow underage kids to be free to make reproductively autonomous decisions without *any* parental input. That means, anything, from abortion to hormones to gender-altering surgery would hypothetically, be legally available to any minor. With a blank check like Prop 5, activist judges in the future could interpret it to mean virtually *anything* expanding it with every legal challenge.

So there is nothing in this word salad that protects and balances the rights of parents against the reproductive liberty of children. Nothing in the wording protects the conscience rights of doctors, nurses, and other medical professionals from demands by patients, their employers, or the state. Likewise, nothing in this language allows our government to create

regulations designed to ensure the safety of those granted unlimited reproductive freedom. The wording gives priority over others rights such as religious and freedom of speech rights. Oh, and nothing in that sloppy sentence protects tax paying Vermonters from unlimited demands. Interestingly enough, in this ambiguous proposal that supposedly protects women's rights and abortion rights, nowhere is there any mention of a "woman" or "abortion." If this proposal is passed how would the unborn be protected from anything? Would it allow experiments on unborn babies? Could a partner demanding a boy force the abortion of an unborn baby girl? Could 12 year-olds pursue their right to sexually engage with individuals three times their age? And the state shall not deny or infringe that right? That's a huge overreach. It does not reflect where most Vermonters stand on this issue. If we want legislation that is clear, specific and balanced we need to let our legislators know by voting "no" on Proposal 5 (Article 22) in November. Glenn Davis






EXCITING NEWS FROM THE MOUNT HOLLY CONSERVATION TRUST

The Mount Holly Conservation Trust (MHCT) is excited to announce the purchase of a 449-acre parcel in Mount Holly and Weston for Conservation and creation of a new Wildlife Management Area (WMA).

The 238-acre parcel in Mount Holly and 211-acre parcel in Weston, situated north of Route 100 between Weston and Ludlow will be known as the Doolittle Lands, adding a new protected link to the Okemo State Forest. The family of Peter Doolittle made a generous contribution to preserve the high elevation critical bear and wildlife habitat as a lasting tribute to him. State wildlife biologists identified this land as one of their top three highest priory acquisitions in the 1980's. They are thrilled to finally have this important piece protected. Lory Doolittle commented at recent Select Board meeting, "Although none of our family currently reside full time in Vermont, we remain Vermonters at heart and would like to leave a Doolittle legacy as a reminder of our small footprint in the state we all dearly love."

Earlier this year, MHCT acquired this parcel that fronts on Route 100 and rises steeply up Okemo Mountain (see attached map). A significant portion of the Mount Holly parcel is above 2500 feet in elevation. A headwater stream of the West River cascades down the mountain, crossing under Route 100. Once the transfer is complete, the land will be open to the public for hunting, trapping, angling, birding, hiking, cross country skiing, and snowshoeing.



Plans for a public parking area, signage and trails are in the works for the property. The property will be thoughtfully managed by the Okemo State Forest stewardship team, with activities including invasive species control and timber harvest to promote



wildlife habitat. State ownership of this land will serve as a gateway for public access to Okemo State Forest and ensure the land is open for public use in perpetuity. A big thank you to the Doolittle Family for their generosity in conserving this wonderful parcel of land for current and future residents and visitors!!

Mount Holly Conservation Trust is an all-volunteer organization. Since our 2004 founding we collaborated with like-minded groups to conserve more than 2,000 acres in 8 projects. In addition, we rebuilt the Star Lake Dam, boat launch and beach. These projects are possible because of the generous support of people who love Mount Holly's views, wildlife and landscape.

Senator Alison Clarkson's Legislative Update

What a Biennium this has been. It began in January of 2021 in the depths of the Covid-19 pandemic, conducted entirely by Zoom, and it ended in mid-May 2022, in the Statehouse, in person – except for those members of the Legislature who had Covid or needed to care for a family member with Covid, It was an historic biennium. It contained the first Vermont Legislative Session ever held virtually, the largest budget (FY'23 \$8.3 B) ever passed in Vermont enabled by federal Covid relief



support, the first unanimous over ride of a Governor's veto (the Pension reform bill), and for the first time, the Vermont Legislature was led by all Speaker, Pro Tem, Lt. women: Governor and both Majority Leaders.

Part of the story of this biennium involves resilient Legislature, working through difficult circumstances, responding to the unprecedented needs of Vermonters. The length of Covid's impact on our lives and economy has required us to rethink assumptions, re-examine our laws, re-deploy our resources and renovate our public spaces. proud of our Legislature's ability to work together productively to address the challenges Vermonters faced. Unlike much of the country, I think Vermont's democracy is in good shape. We strengthen democracy with

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every bill we pass, and in how we conduct our business. And, while we may disagree, we seldom disagreeable. 90% of our bills are passed with consensus votes. I believe that Vermont legislators serve order to make progress on behalf of Vermont and Vermonters.

Another chapter of this biennium's story tells the tale of the historic investments the

Legislature has been able to make in Vermont and Vermonters as a result of the vast amount of federal stimulus dollars. Since 2020, billions of dollars have been invested in Vermont businesses to keep them afloat, in Vermont's unemployed workers, in helping people stay in their homes and apartments, in distributing food to those in need, in housing the homeless, in educating and training Vermonters, in building new housing and renovating old, blighted properties, and in the free tests and vaccines made accessible to all.

This year we're making transformative investments in Vermont's infrastructure - both human and physical. From shoring up our fiscal house (pension reform to IT modernization), to maintaining essential services (mental and home health provider rate increases to childcare and education) to making strategic one time investments in climate change mitigation, affordable and mixed income housing, broadband, community, economic and workforce development – we are investing hundreds of millions of dollars in Vermont. In future articles I'll go into more depth as this story has many more chapters. Our hope is that in making these targeted investments, Vermont will emerge from this pandemic, stronger, more resilient and better prepared for the future.

Turco noted a request from Town Treasurer David Johnson to add three items to the Treasurer's report, re: the Conservation Reserve Fund, the Waiver of the Homestead Filing Penalty, and the Lister's Report. He also noted a request from Town Highway Foreman Clinton Woolley to add an item re: the Town's purchase of an excavator for the Highway Department.

4. **Approval of May 10th & May 17th Minutes.** Mark Turco made a motion to approve the minutes as written, seconded by Diana Garrow, unanimously approved.

5. Reports

a. Highways & Transfer Station Update - Clinton Woolley

- i. Mr. Woolley noted that the Highway Department will apply again for grants through the Vermont Agency of Transportation's Better Roads (formerly called Better Backroads) program.
- ii. Mr. Wooley reported that he has been test-driving a new excavator; he has been using the machine for about two weeks. Mr. Woolley noted it is the right size, has the right amount of power, and is digging well, and recommends purchasing it. The price is \$96,409 with a five-year, 5,000-hour warranty. David Johnson noted that there are funds in the budget, from several relevant line items, that amount to \$36,500 dollars; these funds could be used to make a down payment summer outside services, winter material, better back roads grant reimbursement for town equipment, on the excavator. In addition, the

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Town could use the balance from the equipment fund toward this purchase. This would require a reallocation of additional funds for the equipment fund in the future.

iii. Mr. Woolley also noted that Highway Department employees attended a crack-sealing training and recommended renting a crack sealer to help maintain the roads. The Select Board agreed that this approach would be useful in the interim period before repaving can be done.

b. Treasurer Monthly Income & Expense Report - David Johnson

- i. David Johnson noted that the Town budget is in good shape through the end of the year. We will have an approximately \$300K surplus in funds for the operating budget at the end of the year, which will be used to operate the Town until tax payments are received next year. Additionally, the delinquent tax collector has reported that there are three properties that are delinquent in paying taxes; two have received a letter from the Town attorney. One has made partial payments.
- ii. **Internal Financial Controls Checklist for Municipalities:** David presented this report to the Select Board for receipt and signature; this report is required of municipalities by state statute but does not need to be filed with the state. Diana Garrow made a motion to accept the Internal Financial Controls Checklist; Mark Turco seconded; unanimously approved.
- iii. **Conservation Reserve Fund:** David Johnson noted that only \$50 of the \$500 budgeted in the Conservation Reserve Fund has been spent. David Johnson wondered whether it is necessary to establish a Reserve Fund for the remaining \$450. Fra Devine noted his desire to establish the Reserve Fund; David Johnson will do so.
- iv. Waiver of the Homestead Filing Penalty: David Johnson asked whether the Select Board would like to waive the filing penalty for property owners who file their homestead declaration late, as has been done historically. Diana Garrow made a motion to waive the homestead filing penalty fee. Mark Turco seconded; unanimously approved.
- v. **Lister's Report:** David Johnson noted that there were 16 grievances; 3 were denied; 10 were reduced and 2 are unchanged due to the property owner's ultimate satisfaction with the assessment after meeting with the Listers. One grievance will go to the Board of Civil Authority. Overall, the Town's Grand List has grown by \$5.7 million.

d. Mount Holly Conservation Commission Update - Phil Crane

i. General Updates: Fra Devine reported that the Conservation Commission received a "Tiny Grant" of \$500 from The Association of Vermont Conservation Commissions (AVCC). These grants are small grants given to Town conservation efforts. The grant will be applied to ongoing conservation efforts at Star Lake. The Vermont DEC also approved the Commission's grant application to place a bottom barrier in Star Lake. The Conservation Commission also voted unanimously to approve the proposal to be presented later this evening by the Mount Holly Conservation Trust re: the transfer of land in Mount Holly to the State of Vermont.



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ii. Shade Tree Update: Phil Crane, on behalf of the Conservation Commission, has created

a comprehensive Shade Tree Preservation plan, portions of which are required by state statute, and which outlines how the town will maintain or remove trees that qualify under state statute as "shade trees." (A "shade tree" is defined by the law as a shade or ornamental tree that is located in whole or in part within the limits of a public way or public places, provided the tree was planted by a town or is designated as a shade tree in the town's Shade Tree Preservation Plan.) The Conservation Commission requests that the Select Board consider the Shade Tree Preservation Plan to preserve the beauty of public roadways, and to fund the planting of

ervation Plan to preserve the beauty of public roadways, and to fund the planting of additional trees in the Town. Phil Crane requests that the Select Board add consideration and approval of the proposed Shade Tree Plan as an agenda item at the next Select Board meeting. Mark Turco agreed.

6. New Business

a. Mount Holly Conservation Trust Land Transfer to the State of Vermont - Brigid Sullivan

i. Brigid Sullivan, the President of the Mount Holly Conservation Trust, requested the support of the Mount Holly Select Board for the Trust's planned transfer of

ownership of the parcel formerly owned by Michael and Jacqueline Ryan to the Vermont Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW). The DFW is seeking the town of Mount Holly's support for its proposed acquisition of a 238-acre parcel, which will be part of a proposed 449-acre Wildlife Management Area (WMA). MHCT acquired this parcel and an abutting 210.9-acre parcel in Weston and on the border of Mt. Holly with frontage on Rt. 100. MHCT purchased the property earlier in 2022, with the intent to transfer it to DFW for the creation of a new WMA. The WMA will be open to the public for hunting, trapping, angling, hiking, cross country skiing, and snowshoeing. Plans for a public parking area, signage and trails are in the works for the property. The property will be stewarded by DFW, with other planned management activities including invasive species control and timber harvest to promote wildlife habitat. This is a landlocked parcel that is on the Mount Holly side of the disputed town line with the Town of Ludlow. The State of Vermont is the owner of the Ludlow parcel adjacent to this parcel. State ownership of this contested

parcel will forever remove that dispute from future contested issues facing the Town of Mount Holly. DFW ownership of this parcel as a WMA adjacent to the Okemo State Forest will provide better public access to the State Forest and ensure the land is open in perpetuity to our citizens.

ii. Lori Doolittle, the benefactor of the Trust's conservation and transfer efforts, offered some history of her family's connection to Vermont and her reasons for supporting the MHCT's efforts to transfer the land to the DFW for wildlife management.

iii. Will Duane of the Department of Fish and Wildlife (Land Acquisition Coordinator) offered further detail on the proposed transfer of the parcel to the State of Vermont. He explained that WMAs are similar to state parks, in that they are owned by the DFW, but they are acquired primarily for wildlife habitat and public access. They do some limited mowing, cutting and logging in WMAs, but generally leave the land wild, as the primary goal for a WMA is the encouragement of wildlife habitat management; the properties are kept open to the public for hiking, cross-country skiing, hunting, and other dispersed recreational activities. Creation of a parking area and/or maintenance of culverts may be done. The primary wildlife management for this area is securing stable and safe wildlife passage, north to south, specifically for black bears. Will Duane also noted that the transfer will have only minimal impact on the Town's property tax receipts. DFW takes the assessed value of the land in the year it was required, and multiplies that value by the current municipal tax rate. The DFW's initial payment to the town on this property would be \$1,032.90 in the first year. He further noted that the DFW is required by statute to notify towns of its intent to acquire land; it seeks to go beyond notification to seek the affirmative support of the town for the acquisition; it must also notify the governor.

Tim Morton, the Stewardship Forester at the Vermont Agency of Natural Resources, Department of Forests, noted that there is already a road system within the property in question; these are gravel roads that are in disrepair; repairs would be made to the road system in as far as that would enhance public access; failed roads in the hills would be water-barred as needed.

v. Dennis Devereux noted that the Town should understand how the transfer of the land might affect the Grand List. Will Duane answered that in terms of the Grand List value; the property's value is locked in at the time of the acquisition, and is established by the assessed value at the time of the acquisition (2022). The value of the property as assessed by the Town would still be reassessed when the Town does a reappraisal. David Johnson noted that the current annual property tax on the property is about \$800; this includes the education fund. David Johnson noted that the difference between the taxes the town currently receives on the property and what it would receive in the PILOT tax payment from the DFW, would be approximately \$100.



vi. Will Duane reiterated that the state is requesting the Town's support and noted that he provided a template letter of approval; a motion by the Select Board is also sufficient for state statutes. Mark Turco made a motion to accept the proposal as written, Jeff seconded the motion; unanimously approved.

b. Notice of Initial Act 250 Application Filing

i. The Select Board noted that Green Mountain Power (GMP) has filed an Act 250 application for electrical line work at 1358 Shunpike Road, as well as a Proposed Land Use Permit for pole and line relocations on: Shunpike Road/Syria Spur. Zina Gates noted that she is pleased with GMP's similar work on the poles and lines on Gates Road.

c. Vermont DEC Aquatic Nuisance Control (ANC) Permit

i. The Select Board will coordinate with the Nineveh Foundation and the Conservation Commission to submit the ANC for both Lake Nineveh; to this end, Caitlin will forward the Permit to Fra Devine and the Conservation Commission.

d. Upcoming Town Appointments

- i. **Health Officer FY23**: Tim Bickford did not express interest in continuing in the position. The opening will be posted in the Newsflash and Chit Chat and the appointment will be made at the next regular Select Board meeting.
- **ii. Road Foreman FY23:** Jeff Chase made a motion to appoint Clinton Woolley as Road Foreman FY23; Diana Garrow seconded; unanimously approved.
- iii. Rutland Regional Planning Commission Rep & Alternate FY23: Jon McCann and Ryan Harder are current rep and alternate for FY22; the term expires at the end of June. The opening will be posted in the Newsflash and Chit Chat and the appointment will be made at the next regular Select Board meeting.

lighting on Old Turnpike Road, to move it out of the public right-of-way. Amy Turco asked Mike Blais whether the new light being installed will be as bright as the current light, which can blind oncoming traffic. Mr. Blais noted that the new light will not impede drivers' vision; it will be similar in intensity and directionality to a highway street light; it has zero effect on the driver's upper field of vision, as it is directional. The wattage of this bulb will be lower than the current one; it will be a 120-watt LED bulb. (The one that is there currently is a flood light.) Elevation of this light will be at 22', rather than the current 14' foot elevation. Ms. Turco thanked Mr. Blais for altering the light. No further concerns were expressed by members of the public or the Select Board.

c. Historic Village & Speed Limit Signage Update

i. Jeff Chase will lead coordination of sign enforcement with the Sheriff and ordering of posts and signs. Costs are roughly \$2,500 for posts and less than \$1,000 for the signs. Clinton Woolley stated that once posts are delivered, it will likely be a few days to install; he and Jeff Chase will coordinate on ordering and installation. Caitlin noted that the Select Board received a letter from

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Paul Frazier encouraging the final installation of the signs and offering to help.

d. Star Lake Cyanobacteria Signage and Water Testing Update

i. Jeff Chase noted that he is coordinating with Health Officer Tim Bickford re: testing Star Lake for E.coli during the summer months; he will also coordinate with Jim Corbin on the Conservation Commission re: water testing and cyanobacteria signage at the lake.

e. Junk Ordinance Enforcement Updates

i. Certified letters were sent by the Select Board to the two property owners, on Belmont Road, and on Shunpike Road, who were deemed to be in violation of the Junk Ordinance at the May meeting. 

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Companion & Succession Planting

Garden planting and transplanting is now in full swing and everything we want to grow can be planted out including favorites like tomato & pepper plants, squashes, potatoes, onion sets, broccoli, herbs, or greens. But one question remains, which plants make good garden companions with each other, and which do not? Plants affect their neighbors and the soil around them so we should try to place compatible or non-competitive plants near each other when possible.

A similar principle applies when deciding which plant follows recently removed ones (called plant succession). We don't want to re-plant the same plant or one that needs the same soil nutrients in the same place over and over; that would risk depleting the soil and depriving the subsequent plants of nutrients that they need to be healthy. Our second topic is succession planting - a great way to get more out of limited garden space and have your garden favorites available all season long. Finally, we'll cover a couple pest alerts and some thoughts about that lawn.

Here is a list of some common garden plants and recommended **companions**. This doesn't mean they are *required* neighbors, but we do know they are compatible, and they might even benefit from each other by repelling pests or sharing nutrients.

Green Beans:
Broccoli*:

Potatoes: Beans, Corn, Cabbage* family, Marigolds
Squashes: Corn, Beans, Nasturtium, Marigold
Tomato: Onion, Carrot, Nasturtium, Marigold

You can also see from this list that the classic "Three Sisters" combination (pole beans, corn & winter squash) is made of 3 mutually beneficial plants that help each other with nutrients (beans add Nitrogen), weed suppression (squash leaves smother weeds), and support (corn stalks support the climbing beans). It is an ingenious design that works! There are more good details online here.

Succession planting simply refers to repeat planting of a same crop over time to produce repeated harvests over time. We have a very limited growing season, but you can still get multiple harvests of certain fast growing plants if you time them right. Successions are great way to maximize the productivity of limited garden space too. For example, if you plant leaf lettuce or mesclun seeds every week you should harvest fresh greens every week all summer and into the fall. I've found that a short row (4-6 ft. long) of different salad greens every week produces a good supply for fresh salads into November.

Late crops of carrots, turnips and beets can also follow (in the same place) the harvests of early salad greens. After the garlic is harvested in late July there is time to plant fall broccoli and cauliflower plants started from seeds before 4th of July in the same place.

Bush beans planted every 2 weeks provide a good extension of harvests too. Too much zucchini is a common problem, but if you plant one hill of 3-4 plants now and another hill in early July that will spread the harvest out so it can be enjoyed over time. The same works for herbs such as dill and cilantro that tend to mature early before we can use them in pickles and salsas. There's some very good information and specific planting recommendation online here.


Pest Alerts. So far the dry weather has limited outbreaks of **slugs & snails** and most plant diseases but every rain shower brings them out. Preventative applications of an iron phosphate product (Sluggo, etc.) with avoid surprise damage.

New tender growth on any plants will attract sap sucking **aphids** that can quickly get out of control. Baby aphids are born pregnant! Aphids are nearly invisible but can be found by looking for unusual ant activity on young leaves. The ants are tending aphids for the sweet honeydew they produce (aphid pee) and are a signal that aphids are present. Natural controls of aphids include lady beetles and wasps that we should always protect. Beneficial wasps (98% of wasps are non-stinging) are attracted by small blossom flowers (yarrow, Queen Anne's lace, fennel, asters, mints, etc.) which they use for nectar. Small numbers of aphids can be finger squished and bigger infestations sprayed with insecticidal soap or neem oil, if you prefer.



Consent under this section shall not be subject to disaffirmance due to minority of the person consenting. The consent of a parent or legal guardian shall not be necessary to authorize outpatient treatment. As used in this section, "outpatient treatment" means psychotherapy and other counseling services that are supportive, but not prescription drugs. Subchapter 2. Prohibition of Conversion Therapy"

H659- pending in House Health and Welfare Committee

"This bill proposes to allow a minor who identifies as transgender to consent to receiving hormone blockers and other nonsurgical, gender-affirming care and treatment without requiring parental consent."
