

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The Expeditionary School at Black River Embarks Upon Place-Based History Coursework

As part of the Expeditionary School at Black River's (ESBR) commitment to integrating place-based historical connections into their expeditionary learning experience, students, teachers, parents & grandparents visited the von Trapp Family Lodge in Stowe, Vermont on Monday, October 24.

The trip was made possible by support from the VELA Education Fund Micro Grants program, who recently accepted ESBR's proposal *Expeditionary Schools: an atlas of place-based community connections*. During the 2022-23 school year, ESBR will use this grant to travel to a variety of historical locations across Vermont.

Our first expedition was to the Trapp Family Lodge because one of our students is visiting from his home country of Germany. We set out on an official expedition to learn about the Second World War and the importance of building community from the perspective of the family who inspired the classic Rodgers and Hammerstein production *The Sound of Music*.

Following the path, the family took on their first tour of the former dairy farm, ESBR's Trailblazers lived up to their nickname as they hiked up a steep hill to the chapel of Our Lady of Peace, carrying fresh apples from the orchard to the flock of sheep grazing on the other side of the hill. We discovered that the chapel, Our Lady of Peace, was built by Werner von Trapp, who served in the 10th Mountain Division during WWII. When he returned home to Stowe, he decided to build this chapel and carried every stone by hand up the same path ESBR's trailblazer hiked that day. Werner, and his brother Rupert, after their father refused to work for the Nazis regime, arrived in Vermont to then be drafted into the U.S. Army. Hearing about their role in helping bring an end to a World War they initially escaped was an engaging way to participate in history class. From the beauty of the property, we were reminded that during terrible times connection with the natural environment provides a way forward.

In addition to learning about the von Trapp family and how they became part of their new community in Vermont, students learned about the nature around them as they hiked, studying ecological primary succession and learning about the history of the Abenaki

peoples as they walked through stands of birch and tamarack. After lunch the trailblazers walked to the site's sugar shack and learned how to identify the now-leafless sugar maples along the way. To finish the day, we reviewed the process of maple sugaring and sampled some of the maple syrup made onsite.

In our third year of operation, ESBR continues to be funded primarily by charitable donations such as the one that made this field trip possible. For additional information regarding the school's efforts to be approved to accept public funds from school choice communities such as Mt. She wrote the grant mentioned above and is proud to be co-authoring this article with Lorien Strange, who is on track to be a member of ESBR's graduating Class of 2025. So begins the famous poem by C. Rossetti originally published in 1872 under the title “A Christmas Carol.” Friends and Neighbors, winter is indeed upon us—the days grow shorter, darker, and colder. For many of us, this season is indeed “bleak”. The wind chills us to the bone, the signs of life characteristic of our beloved and majestic Green Mountains have disappeared, and the sunny days of Summer and the golden hues of Autumn have been replaced with the cold, gray gloom of our long Vermont winters. Unfortunately, for many of us our moods can reflect the season around us. Some, like Scrooge or the Grinch may have their hearts turn as cold and as hard as the iron ground beneath us. Others, driven indoors by the frosty wind and treacherous roads, may find themselves in increasing isolation, and in turn loneliness and despair. But amid winter’s darkness, lights shine! They festoon our eves and encircle our trees. Where drab despair once was, they remind us of *hope*... they turn sadness to *joy*... stone-cold hearts “grow three sizes” in *love*... and families and whole communities gather with *peace* and good will. Christmas does that.

One of my favorite Christmas traditions is caroling. I remember a few occasions as a child—when the Mount Holly Baptist Church still stood within eyesight of my front porch—when we would set out by car and on foot to sing songs of the season to our neighbors about the town. Despite the frigid and dark nights at people’s doorsteps, I remember the warmth in my heart and the cheery faces of those who came to their doors (or sometimes merely peaked through their curtains) to hear us sing. More recently, I’ve had the pleasure of taking the carols to the residents of the Gill Home in Ludlow. There’s the same warmth, the same love, the same light brightening the countenances of all; but something is missing. Some of the images of Christmas that always bring a smile to my face when they “dance in my head” are carolers on downtown street corners, often dressed in their best Victorian suits, and Charlie Brown and his friends gathered around a transformed twig of a tree singing “Hark! The Herald Angels Sing”. That’s what was missing. As Linus said, “That’s what Christmas is all about, Charlie Brown.” In darkness, light shines.

While caroling does have deep roots, it’s quite a novel invention—born of the renaissance (how fitting a name!) and the enlightenment (two for two!) of the 15th through 17th Centuries. Of course, the traditions do stretch back farther... to the ancient Anglo-Saxon custom of Wassailing, where celebrants would trek from door to door, sing, and exchange a hot mulled cider for gifts. During the Middle Ages, with the spread of Christianity throughout Europe, these songs would combine the dancing origins of the “carol”—with its simple, popular, and contemporary form—with the joyful lyrics of the Nativity of Christ. The custom of the *wassail* (lit. “Good health to you”) found new expression. The ages were not so dark anymore.

This Christmas season, let us share our hope, our joy, our peace, our love, and our light with you all. Join us Sunday mornings at 9:30 if you’d like to know what “Christmas is all about” as I preach a series of messages about the child who is “God with Us”. Join us for our Christmas Eve Candlelight Service at 7:00 p.m. Come join us on the darkest day of the year to light our Christmas Tree on the village green. Let us warm your ears and hearts with songs, and your mouths and bellies with a hot beverage (cider, tea, hot cocoa, etc.), a cup of soup, or some sweet Christmas treats. Let us share our gifts with you!

What? No Room?

Most of us recall educator Leo Buscaglia as the *cheerleader of life*. He tells how, many years ago, he sold everything to make enough money to go off and live in Asia. One Christmas he found himself in Bali. This was before all the big hotels and modern tourist “busy-ness”. There was nothing then but the beautiful creatures, wonderful scenery and clean, pure water. He was in a tiny village called Ubud finding himself, for the first time, in a non-Christian country on Christmas Eve. He’d been staying in the home of this native family, desperately trying to explain Christmas. He said, “When you just tell the simple story of Christmas to someone who’s never heard it, it’s just incredible! Here’s this young couple traveling back to their hometown and while they were there...I imagine, standing in line, filling out government forms, the time comes for Mary to deliver her baby. Now, Joseph had tried to get them a hotel room, but the clerk had said they were all booked up and when Joseph tried to explain that his wife was great with child, the clerk said, ‘Don’t tell *me*, I just *work* here.’ And so they found a filthy stable where an exhausted Mary was able to at least lie down and she brought forth her firstborn son and laid him in a manger, which is a feeding trough for animals.” He went on to describe angels, shepherds and wisemen and they *loved* everything about it. They thought it was the most wonderful thing they’d ever heard. It’s interesting that the one thing that was absolutely incomprehensible to them was, “What do you *mean* they wouldn’t let Mary in at the inn?” In Indonesian culture the door is always open and a stranger is always welcome.

“Well, there was no *room* at the inn.”

“So what does that have to do with it? How much room does a woman take? There’s *always* room at the inn. Wasn’t there room on the *floor*?”

Leo said, “Try explaining *that* some time.” He found himself making all kinds of excuses, “Well, they didn’t *know* that she was carrying the Savior, Jesus inside her.”

“What difference does *that* make?” They kept harping on that, as they’d be going about their business, they’d turn and say, “I can’t understand why they wouldn’t let her *in*?”

He told them too about Christmas trees and tried to describe a pine tree to folks only familiar with tropical plants. After a lovely dinner he came out into the starry night and found they’d cut down a palm tree and put clay candles all around it. They shouted, “*Mairy Chreest-mus!*” Leo just sat down like a fool and cried. They thought they’d hurt his *feelings*.

And then because he’d explained that Christmas was a time of exchanging gifts they began giving him batiks and carvings and the only thing *he* had in his pack were things *they* didn’t have, such as soiled t-shirts and underwear that had been washed a thousand times, but he *gave* and they *loved* it! Here they were taking off their lovely batiks for *his* underwear. But, even as they later put him on a bus to Djakarta one of the kids said, “I *still* don’t understand why you didn’t let her *in*.”

It never stopped. There never *was* any room for Jesus in this world. And as sad as that was, it is a statement that still resounds today. Any room for hospitality at *your* house this season? More importantly, is there room in *your life* for him? *Pastor Glenn*



Clement Clarke Moore Miniature Biography

Clement Clarke Moore (1799 - 1863) came from a prominent family and his father Benjamin Moore was the Bishop of New York who was famous for officiating at the inauguration of George Washington. The tradition of reading 'Twas the night before Christmas poem on Christmas Eve is now a Worldwide institution and tradition.

Clement Clarke Moore (1779 - 1863) wrote the poem 'Twas the night before Christmas also called "A Visit from St. Nicholas" in 1822. It is now the tradition in many American families to read the poem every Christmas Eve. The poem 'Twas the night before Christmas' has redefined our image of Christmas and Santa Claus. Prior to the creation of the story of 'Twas the night before Christmas' St. Nicholas, the patron saint of children, had never been associated with a sleigh or reindeers!


Clement Moore, the author of the poem 'Twas the night before Christmas, was a reticent man and it is believed that a family friend, Miss H. Butler, sent a copy of the poem to the New York Sentinel who published the poem. The condition of publication was that the author of 'Twas the night before Christmas was to remain anonymous.

The first publication date was 23rd December 1823 and it was an immediate success. It was not until 1844 that Clement Clarke Moore claimed ownership when the work was included in a book of his poetry.

Turco noted a request to add an update re: the Back Roads Grant and an item regarding Junk Ordinance complaints and updates. Jeff Chase noted an additional item regarding updating Town representatives to the Rutland Regional Emergency Management Committee.

4. Approval of October 11, 2022 minutes. Diana Garrow made a motion to approve the minutes as written, seconded by Jeff Chase, unanimously approved.

5. Reports

a. Highways & Transfer Station Update – Clinton Woolley: Mr. Woolley reported that he attended a Road Foreman’s conference. No notable updates on the Transfer Station

i. Summit Road Culvert Update: Jeff Chase received the signed contract today from the engineering company and received the stored materials invoice in the amount of \$88,894, to be added to next week’s orders.

ii. Diana Garrow noted that on Belmont Road the speed limit signs go from 40 mph to 25 mph, without a transition. Jeff Chase noted that the Town could install a “reduce speed” advisory to assist in the transition. Mr. Woolley noted that if additional speed limit signs were added, this would require a modification of the current Traffic Ordinance.

iii. Mr. Chase noted that the Vermont Better Roads Grant Program offers a grants-in-aid opportunity from the state Agency of Transportation, and there may be Town needs this grant could address. Mr. Woolley noted that there are some spots on Perry Road that could use some stabilization, and that this might be a candidate for the grant program.

b. Treasurer Monthly Income & Expense Report – David Johnson

i. Monthly Income and Expense Report: Mr. Johnson noted that as of this week, there are \$167,108.64 in outstanding delinquent taxes; this is the lowest delinquent tax amount the Town has had in the last ~15 years. The quarterly payment of state aid has been received. Solid waste label sales are slightly under the same time as last year; this might be accounted for by the fact that the Belmont Store has not purchased stickers since October (due to its closure in November). Mr. Johnson noted that if the Selectboard wished to continue to retain the Sheriff for speed enforcement, there is room in the Town budget to cover ongoing costs of enforcement. All local social service agencies, the *Chit Chat*, the Mount Holly Historical Museum and the Town Library were all paid in October. This month’s Zero Sort hauling and disposal charges have exceeded previous credits received from Zero Sort this year. The blower repair was significant, so the Town has used about half of the budget for vehicle/equipment repairs and maintenance for the year.

ii. Investment Bank Account: Mr. Johnson recommended putting the Rescue Squad’s reserve fund in an account within the Community Bank Subaccount, in order to take advantage of the interest rate increase (from .5% to 1.75%) offered by the Credit Union of Vermont. Diana Garrow made a motion to make this shift as recommended; Mark Turco seconded; unanimously agreed.

c. Mount Holly Planning Commission Update – Jon McCann: The Commission is proposing to update and expand the Town’s FHA Regulations based on a model prepared by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC). There will be a hearing on December 7, 2022 at 6 pm at the Mount Holly Town Office and via Zoom to consider a Flood Hazard and River Corridor Bylaw.

SELECT BOARD SEEKS LISTER

The Mount Holly Select Board seeks a new Lister to serve on the Board of Listers beginning in August 2022.

The primary responsibility of the Board of Listers is to determine the fair market value of town properties. Listers must understand appraisal methods and property assessment administration. Listers are paid, and the commitment is roughly six hours per week.

i. One Three-Year Term Ends November 2022: Letters of interest for the open spot on the

Planning Commission were received by the Selectboard from current Planning Commission Chair Jon McCann and from former Planning Commission member Steven Michel. Multiple letters of support were received for both candidates. Both candidates made brief remarks. Jeff Chase made a motion to appoint Jon McCann to the open position; Diana Garrow seconded. Unanimously approved.

ii. Diana Garrow requested that the Planning Commission share website updates or permit application updates with the Selectboard before making them available to the public, so that the Selectboard can review and understand updates prior to their publication or distribution. Mr. McCann agreed.

iii. Flood Hazard Area Updates: The Planning Commission is proposing to update and expand the Town's FHA Regulations based on a model prepared by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and approved by FEMA. The model involves very few changes to regulation of activities within the special flood hazard area that is already defined. The model includes new provisions governing development in river corridors. Adding these provisions to Mount Holly's regulations will allow the Town to receive a 40% increase in disaster relief funding from the State (from 12.5% to 17.5% of the Town's costs), for a total of 92.5% of combined State and federal reimbursement, during FEMA-declared disasters. d. Mount Holly Conservation Commission Update – Phil Crane

i. Mr. Crane reported that the MHCC is updating the scenic roads mapping for the Town Plan. He also noted that divers have not yet come to remove the bottom barrier from Star Lake. The MHCC would like to submit a proposal for funds from the Vermont Urban and Community Forestry program, which if received would provide outside funding for the care and maintenance of trees planted along the roads of Mount Holly. This opportunity is called "Communities Caring for Canopy" and the MHCC would like the Selectboard's input on their proposal, as it includes a commitment of a 50/50 match from the Town in the form of in-kind labor and services, and/or monetary funds. The Selectboard requested that the MHCC prepare a draft proposal for the grant for review.

6. New Business

a. Vermont Diesel Emissions Reduction Financial Assistance Program: The Selectboard noted that it won't pursue this program's support at this time.

a. ARPA Funding Requests

i. A/V Equipment for Town Office: Patrick Cody at Okemo Valley TV is seeking quotes from vendors to upgrade A/V at the Town Office (a previously approved funding request.) Jeff Chase will pass along those quotes to the Selectboard for

review once they are received.

ii. Oddfellows Hall Renovations: Dennis Devereux noted that efforts are continuing.

iii. Dennis Devereux added that many Town buildings that host public meetings do not have defibrillators; ARPA funding could cover this expense. Mr. Turco noted that some research should be done regarding whether certification is required or recommended once defibrillators are installed. Diana Garrow noted that ARPA funds might also be used to update the smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in the Town Office.

b. FY22 Municipal Planning Grant: Jeff Chase noted that The Town of Mount Holly applied for and received a Municipal Planning Grant from the State of Vermont Agency of Commerce and

Community Development. The Select Board contracted with [Community Roots, LLC](https://www.mounthollyvt.org/planning-commission/municipal-planning-grant), led by Melissa Levy, to identify and understand community concerns related to housing, economic development, and public infrastructure. A survey has been created to collect data to help steer the grant objectives. Surveys will be collected through November 30th and are available online and at the Town Office. 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

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The purpose of the FHA Regulations is to:

1. Minimize and prevent the loss of life and property, the disruption of commerce, the impairment of the tax base, and the extraordinary public expenditures and demands on public services that result from flooding and other flood-related hazards; and
2. Ensure that the design and construction of development in flood and other hazard areas are accomplished in a manner that minimizes or eliminates the potential for flood and loss or damage to life and property; and
3. Manage all flood hazard areas as required by state law; and
4. Make the Town and individuals eligible for federal flood insurance and other federal disaster recovery and hazard mitigation funds as may be available.

These regulations only apply to areas that lie within FEMA-designated "special flood hazard areas."

In short, our current FHA regulations protect us from flooding-related hazards in areas prone to flooding and make us eligible to receive state and federal disaster relief, currently up to 87.5% of costs.

Proposed Updates

The Planning Commission proposes to update and expand the Town's FHA Regulations based on a model prepared by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and approved by FEMA. The model involves very few changes to the regulation of activities within the special flood hazard area already defined.

However, the model includes new provisions governing development in river corridors. Adding these provisions will allow the Town to receive a **40% increase in disaster relief funding from the State (from 12.5% to 17.5% of the Town's costs)**, for a total of 92.5% of combined State and federal reimbursement, during FEMA-declared disasters.

As per State law and the DEC model regulation, the new provisions would regulate development within State identified river corridors. "River corridors" include both larger rivers and also those streams that have a watershed area between ½ and 2 square miles. These provisions apply to the river corridor areas as mapped by the State and, where not mapped by the State, to a default setback area 50 feet from the top bank. The State maps are available in the Town Office and linked from the Planning Commission website.

In the future, FEMA and the State will update the flood maps for Otter Creek/Mill River, West River, and Black River/Branch Brook. Once those maps are done, we will be required to update our FHA regulations. The changes to our FHA regulations proposed by the Planning Commission will give us a headstart on this process.

How does this affect you?

By managing development in the specified river corridors, the proposed regulation would reduce the risk of damage to property and personal injury resulting from structures and objects being washed downstream in extreme flooding. Also, the additional State disaster relief available to the Town would reduce the cost of recovery to Town taxpayers.

The regulation of development within these river corridors will not affect your property unless you are planning a new development within a "river corridor." Otherwise, the proposed inclusion of the river corridor provisions would not apply to you at all.

If your property lies within the special flood hazard area, any development is already required to be permitted under our existing FHA Regulations regardless of whether we adopt the proposed update.

This updated bylaw will offer you additional protection for your property from upstream hazards. It will also reduce the cost to the Town (paid by taxes) in the event of another FEMA-declared disaster.

Proposed Flood Hazard and River Corridor Bylaw

The Town of Mount Holly is considering updating and expanding the Town's existing Flood Hazard Area (FHA) Regulations. The principal change would be to manage development within specifically identified river corridors. This would further reduce the risks of injury and damage to people and property from flooding and erosion and entitle the Town to additional State relief funds following FEMA-declared disasters.

This update was recommended by the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan adopted by the Select Board in February 2021, and its advantages were affirmed by the Select Board at its October meeting this year.

Existing FHA Regulations

The Town of Mount Holly adopted our current FHA Regulations on

Notes from the Mount Holly Conservation Commission:

Bear, There and Everywhere....

It seems like there have been a high number of sightings of black bears in Mount Holly over the past summer and fall. So, as part the Mount Holly Commission's efforts to keep track of our natural resources, including these impressive mammals, we reached out to Commission member and local wildlife expert, Peter Smith, to get some 'bear' facts.

Q: So, are there more bears around than in the recent past?

A: The current bear population is higher than it has been at any time in the last 150 years. When the forests were cleared to make way for farming, bear habitat shrunk, and it has taken a long time for reforestation to provide the necessary habitat. Estimates are that the state wide population is between 4500 and 6000.

Q: Bear mothers sometimes have more than one cub. Is that common?

A: Multiple births are common, with females giving birth to from 1 to 4 young. The cubs generally are born in late January or February and stay with their mothers through the first winter, leaving before the following breeding season, which is in June and July.

Q: What do bears eat?

A: Bears eat a highly varied diet; they eat tree leaves, grasses, and other vegetation found near wetlands, particularly in the spring. This is often when bears create problems with bird feeders, garbage and compost, since food is especially scarce at that time. During summer months, everything from insects to fawns to bee hives and berries become food sources, eventually giving way to apples and, as fall settles in, beech nuts and acorns, which are essential for putting on fat before winter dormancy. If necessary, bears will travel considerable distance to find those nuts.

Q: Are bears dangerous to people?

A: Generally bears do not pose a threat to people. However, having said that, females are VERY protective of their cubs. If they perceive a threat to the cubs they can become aggressive. The recent attack in Stratton, VT is a case in point. The female with a cub was, in her mind, protecting her cub, initially from a dog that chased the cub up a tree and then when the woman came out, she was perceived as the threat and attacked.

Q: When will bears go into their winter dens?

A: Food availability controls that timing. If nuts and other fall foods are available, they will continue feeding into December. If their food is scarce they will head for their dens by mid-November, entering their period of dormancy, which is different from true hibernation.

Q: Bears don't hibernate?

A: No. Hibernation involves a significant drop in body temperature from about 100F to the 40s as in bats, chipmunks, woodchucks, jumping mice and others hibernators. In bears, temperature stays very close to normal, though respiration and metabolism do slow considerably, temperature doesn't. Therefore they can be easily roused, unlike hibernating species. Bears generally emerge from this dormant period in March and April.

Ludlow Rotary Hears About New Bike Path

Charlie Rimer spoke to the Ludlow Rotary Club's recent meeting about the new bike path being considered in Ludlow. Rimer, the manager at Tygart Mountain Sports shop in Ludlow, is one of the coordinators for LAST - Ludlow Area Sport Trails.

He outlined the scope and objectives of the project. The initial phase of the trail will concentrate on lands currently part of or abutting playground property of Ludlow Elementary School and former Black River High School. Additional properties are being investigated to extend this starting area.

LAST is also working with Ludlow Snow Crouchers to utilize some of the area VAST (Vermont Association of Snow Travelers) trails with the project in an effort to get some of its trails connected to the initial start-up bike trail.

The long term objective of LAST is to cover the length of the town with a bike trail. Rimer noted that this may include properties adjacent to Dorsey Park and the reservoir system. All of these objectives, while being considered in the long term project, are secondary to the development of the project behind the school. The trails would be for all ages, abilities, and also plans to build an adaptive trail too.

Funding for the project will depend basically on donations and grants. Rimer did indicate that some of the project's goals were partially funded with a matching grant. He also stated that he did not believe the state would be involved in the project short of possible Act 250 requirements.

State Representative Ludlow, Mount Holly, Shrewsbury

Thank You! I am so grateful and honored for the opportunity to continue to represent you in Montpelier. I spent a few hours at each polling location on Election Day and was able to connect and say hi, thank you for all your support, but sorry if you were hoping to connect and I missed you.

I do regret I was not able to finish the article I was working on about the process of amending the VT constitution on time for last month's edition, but with the decisive votes for both amendments on our ballots I suppose it was not all that necessary anyway.

The new legislative session begins January 4th. This marks my third term in Montpelier and I can easily say that each year I have served has been incredibly unique. And this session again is poised to present many new challenges and opportunities. Phil Scott was re-elected Governor with broad support across the state, but Vermonters also elected 104 Democrats to the House of Representatives, as well as 5 Progressives and 2 Independents who tend to vote with the Democrats on most issues, giving us a roughly 111 vote veto-proof majority for the next session. This significantly changes the power dynamic in Montpelier from last session and I am excited for all that we will be able to accomplish for Vermonters.

My priorities this session are similar to those I ran on in 2018 and have held throughout my time in office, although fatherhood may have shifted their order. My top issue and goal for this session is healthcare. I continue to question the "All-Payer Model" that we have been investing so much money into and not seeing any actual benefits from, and would like to see us move towards guaranteed healthcare for all Vermonters. Drug policy reform is next on my list and inextricably linked to our healthcare efforts. Too often we see people arrested for drug possession and released within weeks or months still suffering from addiction. I intend to continue to fight to change that model. Clearly what we are doing isn't working and we need to do something different, my proposal is to get them out of our correctional facilities and into treatment programs to end the cycle.

I also have a handful of other issues that I have taken on over the past four years that I will continue to work on and lobby for. I will be introducing bills to allow happy hour drink specials in Vermont again, allowing third party vendors like "Instacart" or "Uber" to deliver alcohol, embedding workforce development specialists within our Recovery Centers, and creating a voluntary pension system for volunteer firefighters. As always I would love to hear from you on these or any other issues, call or text me anytime. Please DO NOT email. 


