

## Letter from Mount Holly Emergency Director

Sadly, our community awoke on July 10th to many of our roads washed. As the storm progressed through the day the situation got worse and some of you had flooding on your property. It was a busy day for many. We opened our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at the Town Office and kept track of damage and reports to Vermont Emergency Management (VEM), Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC), and VTrans, opened a temporary shelter for those seeking refuge from flooding, and fielded phone calls from residents. The road crew ran around town trying their best to keep as many roads open as possible. The fire department fielded many emergency calls, responding to incidents all around town, and kept their shelter open through the night. By the end of the day the sun peeked out from the clouds and we were able to assess all the damage. Tuesday morning it was time to put it all back together, and we have been working on public roads and infrastructure since.

We have met with VTrans, VEM, FEMA, and ANR a few times in the past two weeks. The last meeting was with our FEMA coordinator on Friday, July 22nd. FEMA classifies damage into two categories: Public Assistance (assistance to the Town) and Individual Assistance (assistance to residents).

If you are a resident and need assistance you have **until September 12, 2023** to apply. Information is below on how to apply for FEMA assistance. The state is also offering assistance through Vermont211.org or by calling 211 (or 802-652-4636). FEMA and the state are encouraging residents to apply

to FEMA and 211, as they are separate assistance programs. You can also apply in person at the FEMA Disaster Resource Center (DRC) on Friday, July 22 in the ASA Bloomer Building, 88 Merchants Row, Rutland, VT 05701.

There are many resources available. Even if you are unsure your damage is enough to qualify, it is still worth applying. It is important to realize the next storm may only hit Mount Holly (like our past December 22nd, 2022 rain storm) and it will not qualify for disaster assistance if it is localized. So it may be best to take advantage of assistance available for this storm damage now if you incurred damage such as having to repair a driveway, fix a well, replace a flooded water heater, washer machine, etc.

Other resources for flood recovery include Vermont Department of Health Emergency Water Test Kits, available by calling 802-338-4724. If your well head was in a flooded area, we encourage you to get this kit. Another nearby resource is the Okemo Valley Business Recovery Center located at 126 Main St (Engel & Volkers Okemo Building) Ludlow, VT 05149, with the help of US Small Business Administration (SBA) and FEMA. They are offering help with business disaster loans, homeowner's or renter disaster loan. Walk ins are welcome.

We also have access to some state and local resources/volunteers through Mount Holly Community Association if needed. # Vermont Home Gardener August Garden Abundance!

After the excessive rains of July, gardens are in full maturity and producing an abundance of veggies, herbs, flowers, (and weeds) and soon-to-be harvested potatoes, onions, carrots, beets, and more. It's the reward that a hard-working gardener deserves and should enjoy this time of year. Proper harvesting is key to successful production, and the more you pick the more you get! Leaving blossoms or fruits on plants to get over-ripe or go to seed tells the plant its job is done and to stop production. Keep "deadheading" your geraniums, marigolds, calendula, snapdragons, & zinnias so they will provide more blossoms instead of seeds. Of course, abundance can become a burden too, unless we have some good ways to deal with it. Let's look at what to plant in August, what to do with too many zucchinis, tomatoes, cucumbers, etc., and which pests are out there now.

What to plant in August? As plants come out of the garden there might be some open space where we can plant late crops to get another harvest. Carrots and beets can still be planted for a nice fall crop. Also, continue planting your favorite salad greens (leaf lettuce, mesclun mix, spinach, arugula, etc.). If you add a little extra compost or organic fertilizer, mulch, and keep them watered they will grow well and won't bolt as the days get shorter.

Weeds (definition: the right plant in the wrong place) are enjoying the growing season too. While most garden plants are big enough to compete with weeds, there is one extremely important reason to control weeds: Seeds! Even if you decide to let some weeds have their way in your garden, do not allow them to flower and go to seed. Those seeds will be next year's weeds and you can eliminate them now. In fact, most weed seeds can stay dormant in the soil for several years and accumulate for future seasons. Deadheading and discarding weed tops is a great investment in your future garden!

Tomatoes: As you harvest tomatoes, continue to prune off any yellowing lower branches to get rid of older leaves that are no longer feeding the plant and are prone to infection. Keep your plants upright with supports. Prune away side shoots (suckers) to open plants up for ventilation and sunshine penetration (disease control). Apply weekly preventative sprays through August to inhibit diseases from getting started. Once infected, it isn't possible to cure the disease, only to remove it by pruning off infected parts. Weekly applications of compost tea, Serenade, fungicidal copper, or sulfur powder are all good organic practices to prevent diseases from getting started in the humid days of August. I prefer to alternate between spray applications using a different one each week. I also include foliar fish fertilizer (liquid emulsion) as a supplemental foliar fertilizer to keep plants extra healthy so

they can resist diseases. Compost tea has become a popular practice based on numerous university studies that have confirmed its effectiveness. Here's a short <u>DIY video</u> to help you get started making your own tea.

Too many tomatoes? After you've eaten, canned and given away much of your bounty what can you do with the rest? Freeze them whole! It's very simple and works well for your winter sauces. Simply put tomatoes, especially Roma/pasta types into freezer bags, no blanching is necessary. When you defrost them in a colander the juice drains out (drink it!) and the skins will slip off.

**Zucchini abundance** should not be a problem. Zucchini stuffed, fritters, raw in salads, relish, and zucchini breads are great. But there's more... Zucchini soup! We always make gallons of zucchini soup to freeze as an excellent vegetable base for all kinds of delicious winter soups. Try this favorite recipe, I know you will like it:

#### **Zucchini Soup**

You can decrease or increase all the amounts (depending on the ingredients you have) just keep the ratios similar. The basic soup is delicious as is but even better when you add any leftovers, shredded cheese, ham, prosciutto, chicken, vegies...pretty much anything cooked you have handy. Be adventurous! Makes one gallon.

7 lbs (6-7 medium) zucchini trimmed, peeled and cut into chunks

- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 3 Tbsp butter
- 2 lbs onions, chopped
- 4 large garlic cloves, chopped
- 4 Tbsp flour
- 6 cups water or stock
- 2 Tbsp kosher salt (omit if using salted stock)
  - 1. In a large stockpot (8 qt) heat oil and butter over medium heat.
  - Add onions and cook until golden brown. Add garlic and cook just until softened (about 1 minute)
  - 3. Add the flour to make a thick, chunky paste.
  - 4. Add the liquid to the paste in increments stirring constantly to achieve a smooth sauce.
  - 5. Add the zucchini and cover the pot.
  - 6. Reduce heat to low and simmer for at least 1 hour or until zucchini is very tender.
  - 7. Enjoy the soup as is or puree with a stick blender or food processor for a creamy, velvety texture.
  - 8. Freeze in reusable juice bottles or milk jugs or

**Too many Cucumbers?** Cukes are less versatile than zucchini or summer squash but still have possibilities. Natural pickling with Kosher or sea salt is a great way to preserve them for months. A very simple way to keep them for a few weeks, ready to eat, follows this easy recipe:

#### **Refrigerator Cucumber Pickles**

2 cups thinly sliced cucumbers (unpeeled or peeled)

1 cup water

1/3 cup white or apple cider vinegar

2 Tablespoons sugar

1 teaspoon kosher salt (optional)

Dissolve the salt & sugar into the water-vinegar liquid.

Add the sliced cukes and refrigerate. Eat immediately or let them develop more flavor overnight. Dress them with yogurt or sour cream for some extra appeal.

Simple!

Garlic Harvest & Storage. Most garlic has been harvested by now but just in case...Dig, don't pull the whole plants out. Brush off soil from top and around the roots and set out in the sun for a couple days to thoroughly dry the skins and roots. Next set or hang them in a shaded, well-ventilated area to "cure" for several weeks, until the stems are *completely* dry. Then you can cut off the stems about 1-2 inches above the head and store in a basket away from light, heat and humidity. Most basements/cellars will do. If you have some heads that have begun to open and spread the cloves, eat those first, they won't store well. Set the very largest heads aside for planting in mid-late October so you grow bigger garlic next year.

#### Pest Alerts.

Japanese Beetles continue to emerge from the lawns and are moving onto beans, raspberries, roses, and whatever is

available. As I've said before, handpicking works, commercial bag traps do <u>not</u> reduce their numbers. Every adult that you remove from the garden is one less to reproduce for next year. Mow your lawns tall (4-6 inches) to reduce their breeding for next year. For area control you can apply <u>Beneficial Nematodes</u> to the lawn to reduce the larval (grub) population. This is expensive but lasts for many years.

Cabbage moths (brown or white wings with a black spot) continue mating and laying eggs on cabbages, broccoli, cauliflower, Brussel sprouts, etc. They will hatch into "cabbage worms" that can spoil a great harvest. Snag the flying adults with a children's butterfly net (and crush them) and apply weekly treatments of Bt or Dipel (caterpillar killer) to the plants when rain is not forecast. Bt is a naturally occurring bacteria that will stop the caterpillars and are harmless to us.

Raspberry cane borer Adults are small dark slender beetles that insert their eggs into the tops of raspberry canes that will appear wilted. (see the photo below) Look a couple inches down the cane and if you see 2 dark rings around the stem, that is where the borer larvae are growing. Prune the affected part of the cane off, burn it or chop it up and remove from the area.

Earwigs are beneficial predators of pest insects but also like to chew leaves and flowers. If you find too many small holes or eaten leaves & blossoms (dahlias) apply some Diatomaceous Earth (DE) on plants showing damage after each rain. DE is made from fossilized diatoms (no chemicals) that is like microscopic broken glass to crawling pests such as slugs, snails, earwigs, and ants.

**Spotted Wing Drosophila** (SWD) is a serious new pest of soft fruits (strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, etc.) that probably hasn't appeared locally yet but it's a good idea to keep watching.

**Remember** to compost your food and yard waste for the best garden fertilizer and to make your compost tea. Concerned about bears? Here are some good tips from the <u>Vermont Fish</u> & Wildlife Department.

#### **Conservation Commission News**


ASH BORER Mitigation Update: The good news is that the treatments have started. We have done 185 injections for those of us who were willing to do it themselves. Which brings us to the not so good news. We have at least 850 more injections requested by about 30 landowners and Tim Bickford, our injector-in-chief, has been delayed and not able to able to do injections as soon as planned. We expect Tim will be able to catch up by early August. In the meantime, we will work with Tim to develop an alternative, if needed, and we will help those who may now want to do it themselves. We will keep the interested landowners informed of the progress. In the meantime, anyone who missed our initial signup and is interested, can still participate. Mount Holly Biodiversity Project: As of July 2023, over 216 people have submitted 3,895 personal observations to identify 1,093 wild species of plants, animals, & fungi in Mount Holly. Why is this so important? Many of the observations (165) are introduced species, some of which are invasive. We have also confirmed the presence of 33 threatened species in Mount Holly. We now know where and when these species occur in town. This is critical information for conservation of our natural environment. This community project depends on willing volunteers to continue to submit observations of common or unusual sightings. The record is impressive, but we still need much more and ask all readers, residents, and visitors to contribute their observations, whether common or rare species. When you have the chance to get a photo of a plant, bug, bird, or mammal, etc. please remember to follow a few simple rules to make your observations count:

- Always include a photo or sound recording (birds).
- Always provide a name for the species by using the "What did you see?" feature to get a list of suggestions for species. "Unknown" submissions do not contribute anything to our records.
- Submit only wild species, not cultivated plants or domestic animals.



You can help the Mount Holly Biodiversity Project by contributing your observations to our website at <a href="https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/mount-holly-biodiversity">https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/mount-holly-biodiversity</a>. The project uses the free iNaturalist app (download from Google Play Store or Apple App Store) that helps you identify any wild species you find. It automatically submits your observations to our project. Why not get out with your smart phone and explore our town and contribute as a citizen scientist? The Mount Holly Biodiversity project is co-sponsored by the Mount Holly Conservation Trust (<a href="https://mounthollyconservationtrust.org/">https://mounthollyconservationtrust.org/</a>) and the Mount Holly Conservation Commission (<a href="https://www.mounthollyvt.org/conservation-commission/">https://www.mounthollyvt.org/conservation-commission/</a>).

#### **ESBR Now Approved Independent School**



The Board of Trustees for the Expeditionary School at Black River is pleased to report that after a long arduous process, ESBR is now an Approved Independent School by the Department of Education of Vermont! This means that students who come from a choice or sending town can have their tuition paid

for by the State education taxes. This will allow us to expand our teaching staff and student enrollment.

This approval was completed on June 29, one day ahead of the July 1 moratorium on further independent school approvals. Although grateful we passed, the late timing delayed decisions for previous staff and students for the upcoming year. It also delayed our reaching out to prospective students, until we had the approval and funding to know we could increase our staff. Therefore, we are hustling to acquire new staff and are excited about the future of ESBR. With that being said, we are announcing that we are opening our

enrollment to interested 7th through 12th grade students for the 2023-2024 school year.

If students live in a choice or sending community, such as Ludlow and Mt. Holly, then their tuition will be covered by the State's educational tax dollars. If a student is not from a sending community, they can still apply.

The doors will open August 30th. As you are aware, ESBR is a small, independent school that provides a hands-on, project-based education utilizing many local and state resources, with many outdoor activities. It is an important local option for middle and high school students in the area and is important for the health of our community, especially now as the area rebuilds from the sudden flash flooding destruction on July 10th. People have come together near and far to help neighbors clean up as well as restore local business establishments. An innovative and flexible school option offers much stability for the families of this community. # Flood-Related Solid Waste and Clean-Up Guidance

To protect solid waste workers and the environment, it is critical that residents, businesses, contractors, and clean-up crews remember to:

- 1) Separate hazardous items from trash (see the list below).
- 2) Contact your Solid Waste District or town at <a href="https://www.802recycles.com">www.802recycles.com</a> to learn about <a href="https://www.802recycles.com">household</a> <a href="https://www.802recycles.com">hazardous waste services</a>. Flood damaged appliances, electronics, batteries, and tires can be brought to most <a href="https://www.local.com/local.c
- 3) Avoid dumping, spilling, or mixing hazardous materials on the ground or into the water.
- 4) Safely store hazardous items until they can be disposed of properly.

#### **Keep these items separate from trash:**

- Dangerous wastes such as toxics, pesticides, explosives, gasoline, oil, pool chemicals, acids, drain cleaner, fireworks, flares, ammo, unprotected "sharps"
- 2) Appliances such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, washers, dryers, scrap metal
- **3)** Mercury products such as fluorescent bulbs, thermostats, thermometers
- 4) Hazardous Waste
- 5) Oil, brake cleaner, other toxic car products
- 6) Paint, stain, varnish, paint thinner/stripper
- 7) Propane cylinders, other gas cylinders
- 8) Batteries and electronics
- 9) Tires


# **Are You Familiar With Community Health?**

Regular Select Board meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month at 6:30 pm in the Town Office. Items to be included on the Agenda are due by Noon the Wednesday before the meeting.

Select Board Meeting, Town Office, July 11, 2022, 6:30 pm MINUTES

- 1) Call to Order at 6:30 pm.
- 2) Pledge of Allegiance
- 3) Consideration of Any Changes to the Agenda. Mark Turco noted that the town will significantly amend the agenda in light of the emergency flooding of the last two days. Select Board Clerk Caitlin Boyle noted two additions: consideration of Select Board approval for a private fireworks display, and Select Board signature of the payment estimate from G&N Excavation re: Summit Road.
- 4) Approval of June 13th Minutes. Diana Garrow made a motion to approve the minutes as presented; Jeff Chase seconded; unanimously approved.

#### 5) Reports

- a) Highways & Transfer Station Update: Mr. Turco noted that Mr. Chase and the Town road crew have been especially busy in the last two days to make roads passable. Mr. Turco offered kudos to the Town crew, Poultney road crew, Yankee Management, Casella, Gary Norton, Tim Poczobut, Wayne Taylor, and others, for their support in repairing roads after the floods. He offered special thanks to Carol Garrow-Woolley and Amy Turco for delivering food to crews as well. Mr. Chase noted that Markowski Excavating will be coming to support repair of Freeman Book Road. Mr. Turco also noted that Les Deyette has given official notice of his retirement from the road crew, effective August 1. He noted that the Town thanks Les for his many years of service and wishes him a good retirement. The Transfer Station update will be tabled for the regular August meeting.
- b) Treasurer Monthly Income & Expense Report: Treasurer Liz Karle noted that the Town's CD rolled over at a new interest rate of 4.44% and the FY22 audit took place on site at the end of June. Ms. Karle noted that the Town should continue to document all road and property damage in order to qualify for federal disaster reimbursement.
- c) Listers' Report: Lister Mr. Johnson noted that property valuation grievance hearings will be held July 21. The Town will send tax bills when the Grand List is finalized and the tax rate set; the Grand List can be finalized after grievance hearings have taken place. Mr. Johnson recommended that the Select Board convene a special meeting in the last week of July to set the tax rate and finalize the Grand List. Mr. Turco agreed.

- e) Mount Holly Conservation Commission Update: Mr. Crane reported via email that ash borer mitigation efforts were in progress; their recycling workshop went well.


#### 6) New Business

- a) Establish FY'24 Tax Rate: The tax rate will be set at a special meeting on July 25. Provisionally, Mr. Johnson reported that the Grand List grew by just over \$4 million dollars this year, 37% of which is attributable to the GMP and Vermont Transco increase.
- b) Decision Re: Route 155 VTrans Fund & "Old Cook Fund": Mr. Johnson noted that there are two funds in need of Select Board attention. The "Old Cook Fund" is a fund of approximately \$1,458 donated by the Cook Family; these funds can be reassigned to
  - another fund by the Select Board. Mr. Turco made a motion to put the funds into the Packer Cemetery Fund, in recognition of the Cook Family's interests; Diana Garrow seconded; unanimously agreed. Mr. Chase made a motion to create a town Paving Fund and to move the approximately \$10,000 in funds from the Route 155 VTrans Grant to this new fund; Mark Turco seconded; unanimously agreed.
- Annual Internal Controls Document: Jeff Chase made a motion to make two minor edits re: training and to accept the document as amended; Diana Garrow seconded; unanimously agreed.
- d) Junk Ordinance Complaint: Tabled for August regular meeting.
- e) Traffic Ordinance Complaint: Tabled for August regular meeting.
- f) Culvert Complaint: Tabled for August regular meeting.
- g) Consideration of Countrywide Bid re: PACIF Grant: Ms. Karle noted that the Town's insurer will reimburse the Town for up to \$2,500 of the cost of a Town Office alarm system for heat loss and fire detection. The Town has received a bid for \$2,529 from Countryside to install the system. Mr. Chase made a motion to seek the grant and install the system; Ms. Garrow seconded; unanimously approved.

a. **Town Plan**: Chair presented early drafts of three of the maps agreed at the last meeting. The Transportation map has been agreed with Regional Transportation Planner Ethan Pepin. It represents four classes of roads, trails and public bus stops. Chair suggested adding parking lots, e.g., at Harry's, parking areas at trailheads and VAST trails. Commissioner Andrew Seward suggested also having parking on the recreation maps. Commissioner Sullivan asked for better distinction between the different categories of roads /trails to make the map clearer and suggested that National and State Forest highways could be presented using the same legend. Chair agreed to adjust the colors and will check how State maps represent these different highways.

Chair also noted that there may be some discrepancies in the map based on more recent adjustments to Town highways, and whether some roads are passable in practice. Recreation map: this map shows public access land – Federal, State, Private (conserved) or Town land – and VAST trails and the Catamount trail and associated parking. Chair noted that District Forest Ranger has still not come back regarding improved parking on Greendale Road. Chair also mentioned that the Forest Service will work on new trails if there is a responsible party to deal with any questions or issues – it may be possible to develop some additional trails if such a party can be identified. Chair noted that no bicycle trails are marked. It is not clear where such trails run but he will contact John Seward and Jim Chester to ask them.

Steve Howlett (VAST) is interested in identifying the possibility of all-season trails in its network. There may not be time to identify

all of these trails in time for the completion of the Town Plan. VAST is also interested in funding the Station Road bridge which may be something that could be done in partnership. Landforms and elevation map: This shows prime soils, Town of Mount Holly Planning Commission Page 2 of 2 topography and contours. The higher elevations tend to coincide with already conserved land. Higher elevations (above 2500 feet) trigger Act 250. Areas of prime soils tend to be on Shunpike Road and Rte 155—these are mainly taken into consideration for avoiding solar siting there to conform with Act 49. Chair will work on the additional maps for the regular meeting.



#### Walk Together

Pilgrim's Progress—widely regarded as one of the most influential works of English literature—tells the story of a man's journey "from This World, to That Which Is to Come." Pilgrim begins his journey from the City of Destruction in search of relief from his burden—that is, his shame and guilt—and to escape the coming war and doom of his city. Setting off alone, he is aided and directed towards the Wicket Gate, by which he may enter the King's Highway which leads to the Celestial City.

Since its beginning, Christianity was known as "The Way" and before they were ever called "Christians", they called themselves "disciples" of "followers of the Way." This imagery presents us with two roads that one may follow: The Way of Life or the Way of Death. The story of a Christian is just that: discovering that the road you're on leads to death, sickness, shame, and misery and seeking the road that leads to life, health, a clean conscience, and joy.

The Pilgrim in John Bunyan's allegory finds this road. What shocks me is that for the most part Christian (that is his name) walks alone. He only ever has one travelling companion: Faithful until Vanity Fair and then Hopeful thereafter. Nevertheless, it is primarily a story of one man's journey. He begins it alone and he finishes alone. Those who help, equip, arm, correct, and direct him from time to time do not accompany him.

But this is not how Christianity truly is. We do not walk alone—God forbid! When one becomes a traveler of the Way of Life, it is better to imagine something like the Fellowship of the Ring: nine strangers brought together by circumstance who commit to one another in a common purpose. As each member of the Fellowship adds something to the group—e.g., Legolas' Bow, Gimli's axe; Samwise's loyalty, etc.—so too each Christian is given spiritual gifts to aid the fellowship... "to profit withal" (1Cor 12:7), to build up (1Cor 14:26), and some to equip others (Eph 4:12).

What is perhaps lacking in *Pilgrim's Progress* that is better illustrated in *The Lord of the Rings* is the devotion that each has to one another. When Christ added the first 3,000 souls to His Church, they "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and to prayer." (Acts 2:41-42). And the Apostles to them. There was commitment.



When I returned home after 20 years of service in the Marine Corps, I knew that I needed to find my "fellowship" for the next leg of my own pilgrimage. Perhaps things are not so simple as they once were... If I'd been in Jerusalem some 2,000 years ago, I'd have joined myself to the Apostles. If in Rivendell, perhaps to their company. Or if circumstances put Pilgrim, or Faithful, or Hopeful in my path, I'd accompany them. Today we have a variety of choices for churches and all within easy travelling distance. Which to choose? ...But perhaps things are that simple—or can be. "Bloom where you're planted." Christ told me to put my lamp on a lampstand (Matt 5:14-16) which is His church (Rev 1:20). Where will that light do the most good? Where my neighbors, friends, and family are... among those I grew up with and those I hope to grow old with.

If you are a Christian in this town, will you let your light shine among your own neighbors? Or take it elsewhere? Or worse yet, hide it under a bushel? Or—worst of all—let your oil run dry? If you're not a Christian, may we help to relieve or bear your burden. May we direct you to Life and walk together?

# Private Drinking Water Guidance: Flooding Can Contaminate Your Water

If you get your residential drinking water from a private intake of lake or surface water source, do not use the water, and contact a Department of Environmental Conservation regional engineer for guidance.

If you pay a water bill, you are on public water. Please go to Vermont Agency of Natural Resources Flood Recovery website for more information.

If you use a well or spring, assume your water is contaminated if floodwater has reached your well or spring, and do not use it for drinking until you know it is safe. Water may not be safe to use for drinking, cooking, or cleaning after a flood. During and after flooding, private wells and springs can become contaminated with bacteria, microorganisms and other pollutants from sewage, heating oil, agricultural or industrial waste, chemicals, and other substances that can cause serious illness.

The State is giving free drinking water test kits to people with private wells and springs that were impacted by flooding. Call the Vermont Department of Health Laboratory at 802-338-4724 to order free test kits. Drinking water test kits are also available at flood resource centers and local health offices.

Do not use the water from your well or spring until you have it tested and you know it's safe, especially if it was or is covered with floodwaters or located near flooding, or if it smells sweet or smells like fuel or chemicals or is near a suspected fuel or chemical spill.

#### Recreational Water After a Flood

While rivers and lakes can have hazards and contamination under normal conditions, severe storms and flooding can increase the risk of getting hurt, sick, or drowning at these bodies of water.

Stay out of any body of water for at least 48 hours following heavy rains, and longer if it had flooded.

#### Rainstorms and Floods Create Hazards

- Swollen rivers and fast-moving currents can create dangerous conditions at swimming holes and rivers for days after a heavy rain event.
- Severe rains may bring bacteria or microorganisms that can make you sick into the water from overwhelmed wastewater systems and runoff.
- Sharp objects, like glass or metal fragments, and spilled fuel or chemicals can also be carried into swimming areas by stormwater runoff and flooding.

#### Stay Out to Stay Safe

- Stay out of rivers and streams until the water is clear and calm usually several days
  after a storm. Watch the currents and listen for the sound of unusually loud rushing
  water. Natural waters can have hidden dangers below the surface, like formations
  that create suction.
- After heavy rains, stay out of any body of water for at least 48 hours to avoid the risk
  of getting sick from contaminated water. In a public swim area, you can swim if the
  water has been tested and it's safe.
- After a flooding event, it may take several days before water is safe for swimming and recreation.

#### What to Know Before You Swim

- Check with the park manager or town to see if the swim areas are open and whether they have tested the water quality.
- Look for and obey any posted signs at beaches and parks.
- Never swim alone. Water is stronger than you think, and accidents can take only an instant.
- Watch for cyanobacteria in the water, since extra nutrients from the floodwater may cause blooms. They can make the water appear dark green, and look like pea soup or spilled paint.
- Don't swallow beach water or swim with open wounds that can get infected.
- Shower after swimming, and wash your hands before eating.

#### **Community Health Tip: Tick-borne Diseases**

In Vermont, reports of tickborne diseases are on the rise year-round.

Lyme disease symptoms include fever, headache, fatigue, and a skin rash that looks like a bullseye. Anaplasmosis symptoms include fever, severe headache, muscle aches, chills and shaking and not a rash.

Illness occurs 5 to 21 days after exposure to an infected tick.

Babesiosis symptoms often don't occur but typically begin one to four weeks after a tick bite and can include fever, chills, sweats, headache, body aches, loss of appetite, nausea or fatigue.
