The students at ESBR continue to take expeditions beyond our normal classes of Social Studies, Math, Science, Art, P.E., and English. As you can see by the pictures, the students have been quite busy. We made holiday cookies for the array of people who share their expertise about the July flood and its impact on Ludlow and the surrounding area. Our Science teachers wrapped up that study providing a localized water table, which the ESBR students then displayed and explained to Ludlow Elementary School students. We then began our Ludlow History studies visiting Georgia Brehm at the Black River Academy Museum. We are also interviewing several local residents about their own personal Ludlow-centered history. These interviews will also allow

Vote Yes on School Bond

The Mount Holly and Ludlow Schools have gone more than twenty years without significant work. Though they have performed all the necessary annual maintenance, now is the time for some major repairs and upgrades. The boilers at both schools are very old, inefficient and in need of frequent repairs. At Mount Holly there is no backup heat, so if the boiler needs repairs that cannot be completed immediately then the school would have to close until the repair is done. At Ludlow the roof is leaking. If we do not replace it immediately then more damage will be done. In Mount Holly one of the walls has only cinder blocks and water is leaking through onto the classroom floors. Lighting fixtures are old and inefficient. In Mount Holly the nurse's office is on the gym stage, with only a curtain for privacy.

The school committee reduced the scope of the planned work to the minimum that is needed at both schools. If you want to know more about what is being proposed go to TRSU.org and click on Ludlow/Mt Holly School Upgrades Presentation to see videos and PowerPoint documents explaining what is in the proposed bond. I personally ask you to vote YES because if we do not do this work now it will still need to be done and will be more expensive in the future. David Martin

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A Letter to the Editor and Mount Holly Town Voters re. the School Bond Issue

I grew up in this town. I went to our elementary school, my children attended school here and my grandchildren as well. Mount Holly's elementary school has always had an excellent educational reputation. Which is why I find myself conflicted over the school bond issue as proposed this year. The school board is asking us to approve an over 9 million, 20 year bond to fund maintenance for the Ludlow and Mount Holly elementary schools as well as an addition to the Mount Holly school. While I agree with some (not all) of the proposed maintenance items on the list and I don't know about regulations and construction costs, the amount of the bond for maintenance seems excessive. Are there critical items on the list that can be dealt with and then approach the others over time? I really have an issue with the cost of the proposed addition. I don't disagree with the argument that the Mount Holly school facilities are inadequate to accommodate what is State required (without funding). Have you visited the school recently? The stage in the gym has been cut away

for a nurse's office (inadequate) and IT maintenance area. The cafeteria has been cut away for a special ed. room (with no entrance except through another special ed room). Areas have also been carved out of the cafeteria for After School Program storage and more special ed as well as two other cubicles for private meeting areas. Other special ed and guidance areas are placed in closet spaces and a hallway has been narrowed to give cubicles for these needs. I do not envision a quality learning experience in these conditions to say nothing of the stress this must put on the staff. I agree that the school needs more area to accommodate all of the State mandates, BUT I believe the 1.4 million for the proposed addition is a lot to ask of the taxpayers of Mount Holly, especially with additional tax burden being considered in Montpelier. I know the School Board has spent much time with a consulting firm to develop this proposal. I would like to caution them to explore other options before asking the townspeople to agree to this bond issue. Millicent Johnson

are heard and reflected in the town's decisions. He seeks balance and is effective in finding the middle ground.

In addition to his regular responsibilities as a member of the Select Board, Jeff serves as the town's emergency management director, the town's representa9ve to the Rutland Regional

Emergency Management Committee, and the head of the town's Hazard Mitigation Planning team. Jeff served as the town's point person with FEMA in connection with the past year's flooding, and his expertise and writing skills have been crucial to the town's successful applications for multiple grants (including, among many others, two Municipal Planning Grants, road/highway grants), which he then also managed.

Jeff also has worked tirelessly overseeing/supervising multiple other projects. He recognized the need for a free public WiFi access point during the pandemic, and was instrumental in obtaining a grant to bring it to the town library. His work has improved our quality of life and security, often in very tangible ways (we probably would not have gotten the back-up generator if he had not included that as part of the hazard mitigation plan).

Reminder File HS-122 Homestead Declaration

Homeowners are required to file with the State of Vermont Department of Taxes form HS-122 to declare their property as a homestead each year. The form can be found on the Department's web site

https://tax.vermont.gov/document/2021-form-hs-122 The due date is April 15, 2024.

Filing on time is especially important if property taxes are paid by a property owner's mortgage company.

Veterans Property Tax Exemption and Property Tax Credit Claim Options

Like other homeowners, veterans may qualify for a property tax credit. This Property Tax Credit Claim is made in conjunction with the Homestead Declaration. The state education property tax may then be adjusted based on a percentage of household income. You will need the following forms to file a Property Tax Credit Claim:

Chit Chat Letter, re Open Meeting Law

Mount Holly has chosen to have a Select Board to manage town business. We have three good and knowledgeable members on our current Board. Each Board member brings different skills and strengths, but no one person is an expert at everything. Running a town's government is becoming more and more complex. State mandates and grant requirements have precise requirements that must be met exactly as specified. Thousands of dollars may be at stake, and "close enough" doesn't count.

We need a five person Select Board to add "hands on deck" and increase the expertise on the Board even further in order to deal with this complexity. This will benefit the town in three ways: 1) more people have additional experience and knowledge; 2) Board members will be able to share their knowledge and experience (and thus the work load) with other Board members, and 3) we increase the opportunities for the Board to respond quickly and accurately to issues and opportunities.

Vermont has an Open Meeting Law that prevents a quorum of the Mount Holly Select Board from discussing town business outside of a publicly warned meeting open to the public. With a three person Board, a quorum is two people. No two Board members can collaborate on a town issue or project outside of a warned meeting. One member cannot help another member, or even answer a question, no matter how valuable or important or timely the issue. One member can work alone on a project, but that's it. By law, any assistance or feedback from another Board member must wait for a properly warned meeting, open to the public. If they are not able to complete the project as specified and on time, Mount Holly loses the opportunity. If they do collaborate or even communicate to conduct any town business outside of a meeting and it is discovered, the actions can be negated, or they can be fined.

With a five person Board, one member can easily reach out to or work with another member between meetings without violating the Open Meeting Law because two people does not constitute a quorum. There is much more flexibility, and two heads are always better than one. The knowledgeable Select Board member not only shares their expertise in a timely manner, they educate the other Board member for the next time. Mount Holly wins.

Hello from the Vermont Statehouse!

On behalf of Rutland County Senators Dave Weeks and Terry Williams, I wanted to give you the report for this very special edition of the Mt. Holly Chit Chat. Congratulations on the 50th Anniversary issue!

On Wednesday, February 21st, the Vermont Senate passed H 850 which had already been passed in the Vermont House. As I write this report, it has now been sent to the Governor to sign the bill into law which he is expected to do. For some background, the Agency of Education had forecast that statewide education spending would increase by \$243 million from the previous fiscal year. This is an increase of nearly 15%. The estimate was based on warned school budgets. Funding for our education spending in Vermont comes from revenue from the lottery, sales tax and rooms and meals taxes and property taxes. If the money that comes from the lottery and sales taxes is not enough to cover actual expenditures, property taxes must be set at a level that makes up for the difference. When Act 127 was signed into law in 2022, there was a provision that capped growth in the homestead property tax rates to 5% and was intended as a way to transition in the weighting changes of the Act. It was obvious that, based on the increase of \$243 million dollars, that it was not going to work. H 850 repeals that 5% cap and instead implements a new mechanism for the next 5 years which will apply a "cent discount" to the pre-CLA homestead rate for each percent decrease a district experienced in tax capacity. It also allows school districts to re-warn or postpone budget votes until April 15th, 2024. All three Rutland County Senators voted to support this bill.

As of this writing, the Budget Adjustment Act is still in a Committee of Conference and has not been finalized yet. The House and Senate version of the so-called BAA were very different, and it is up to the conferees to iron out those differences.

On a related note, S 160 was the first bill signed into law this session and is effective immediately. This bill will reimburse a municipality for certain state education property tax payments if the municipality granted tax abatements to property owners for damage caused by flooding.

Crossover deadlines were announced which are dates by which a bill must have been voted out of the committees of jurisdiction. The deadline for policy bills is March 15th and the deadline for bills which include appropriations or taxes (money bills) is March 22nd. This session seems to be moving more slowly in terms of bills actually reaching the floor for a vote, but I expect the next month to see many more bills reaching the final stages.

There are still committees working in both the House and Senate dealing with housing issues and public safety but nothing as yet has come to the Senate floor for a vote.

As I discussed at a recent CEDRR (Chamber and Economic Development of the Rutland Region) legislative breakfast, my feeling is "the cupboard is bare, and the pantry is empty." Vermont received and appropriated over the last several years approximately \$10.9 billion from the CARES Act and ARPA. Those one-time funds are gone. While it is always tempting to want to fund additional programs and positions that are positive and well meaning, there are only 2 ways to do that. You can either cut an existing program or service to free up money, or you increase taxes or fees to pay for the new program. Most Vermonters are just beginning to feel the effects of the new payroll tax from last year to fund childcare and the new DMV fees which were used to pay for other budgetary holes. Add to that the very real possibility of increases in property taxes and further down the road the "affordable" heating bill looming in 2025 and I believe this is not the time to raise taxes or fees. We no longer have help from the

the range of annual expenses. Winter road expenses are also slightly high, though still within range of the budget. FEMA reimbursement work is taking up a significant portion of Treasurer time; all requests and documentation will be submitted shortly. The Town is still awaiting the state's response to the Municipal Equipment Fund request.

c. Listers' Report - David Johnson: The Listers will complete property inspections in the first part of April, and no extension will be needed.

i. Grand List Certificate of No Appeal. There are no appeals pending, and the Listers will file a certificate of no appeal.

d. **Conservation Commission Update** - David Martin. Mr. Martin noted that the Town has been approved for a MERP Mini grant in the amount of \$4,000; there is no required Town match; the funds must go to energy resiliency education project for residents. The MHCC is also planning ahead for mitigation of aquatic nuisance species this coming season at StarLake.

5. New Business

a. Rutland Regional Planning Commission Re: Regional Plan - Ethan Pepin. Mr. Pepin noted that the Rutland Regional Plan is in the process of being updated; the RRPC expects the plan to be complete in 2026. Like a Town Plan, the purpose of the Rutland Regional Plan is to provide framework within which individuals, businesses and local governments can make decisions regarding growth and development. Mr. Pepin encouraged residents to attend an open house in Wallingford regarding the revisions being considered; more information can be found at https://www.rutlandrpc.org. Public feedback and input is strongly encouraged.

b. Discuss Document Retention Plan - Elizabeth Karle. Ms. Karle noted that the Town Office currently stores many documents and should articulate a plan for document retention to guide archiving and disposal of materials. The state has a policy in place to guide municipalities; Ms. Karle recommends the Town follow the state's guidelines and use the state's archivist as a resource in instances where there is a question of what to retain or discard. The board agreed.

c. Discuss Four-Way Stop at Belmont Store - Dennis Devereux. Mr. Devereux noted that additional enforcement and signage

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may be needed at the intersection of Belmont Road and Tarbleville Road; if not a fourth stop sign, then perhaps additional signage. Mr. Paul Barton noted that he also observed speeding issues at the Tarbleville Road intersection. Mr. Francis DeVine observed that seasonal speedbumps might be a solution in warmer months. Mr. Barton agreed that additional road stencils or signage may be needed. Mr. Chase noted in order for a fourth stop sign to be enforceable, the Town may need to alter its traffic ordinance; this is not likely to be a burdensome task. He recommended starting with road stencils; Mr. Turco noted his agreement. Ms. Garrow noted that the Town can also research implementation of seasonal speed bumps.

REGARDING THE PROPOSED SELECT BOARD EXPANSION

The February issue of the ChitChat included a thoughtful letter identifying six reasons why a 5-member Select Board is needed to help our town meet the challenges that lie ahead. The ChitChat also included letters questioning the need for the expansion, including one claiming that "they" want a 5-member board so "they can control the Town."

This is not a partisan issue. The Vermont League of Cities and Towns believes that 5-member Select Boards make it easier for the board members to work more effectively and efficiently. This also is not about trying to stack the Select Board with people who will vote one way or another on particular issues. If the voters approve the expansion, a separate vote will be held to fill the new seats. My personal hope is that this will create an opportunity for younger community members, who are not already involved in town government, to take an active role in Mount Holly's governance.

One of the reasons identified in last month's letter to the ChitChat supporting expansion of the Select Board is limiting the town's risk of liability under the State's Open Meetings law, which prohibits any two members of a 3-member Select Board from discussing town business outside a public meeting. This risk is illustrated by a lawsuit that arose out of the town of Norwich's attempt to get its work done by creating committees and working groups. According to VTDigger, the town spent \$100,000 in attorney's fees over three years before settling alleged violations of the Open Meetings law. See <u>bit.ly/3SRsI6y</u>.

If anyone doubts the complexity and burdens of running a small town, I suggest they read the opinion piece recently published in the VT Digger by Chris Campany, executive director of the Windham Regional Commission. See <u>https://bit.ly/3I77Qn9</u>. Among other things, Chris writes that many "volunteer elected municipal leaders give dozens of hours of their time each week to the needs of their respective towns, and it's still not enough. Their work has become more complex. . . . Every day I see our towns holding on by a thread or breaking, and I fear those doing the work of towns are on the verge of breaking as well."

March Gardens. Let's Begin!

As March begins, we can't be sure if it's going to snow or rain but there are garden tasks for us to do. Snow has buried any sprouts peeking up from the ground but the good news is that the snow means more water availability come spring. As the days get longer there are indoor and outdoor garden preparations we can be doing now, including planting, pruning, and feeding!

If you haven't yet pruned your **fruit trees** (apples, pears, cherries, etc.) use a mild day to get that pruning done before the trees break dormancy and buds swell. Basic pruning is the removal of dead, diseased, and downward growing limbs. Also cut off vertical "suckers" growing up from branches and trunks. <u>UVM</u> <u>Extension has helpful videos online</u> to show the basics of good pruning practices. I'll cover specific pruning of woody bushes (raspberries, blackberries, hydrangeas, etc.) in the April edition. After pruning, give fruit trees a first spray of Dormant Oil to smother the over-wintering eggs left by last year's pests.

Longer days trigger early growth on indoor plants so now is a good time to prune and feed them. If you have geraniums, fuchsia, peppers, or other outdoor plants give them a serious pruning. Remove any lanky, too long branches and re-shape the plant before they grow too much. Re-potting into larger containers with a fresh soilless starter/compost mixture (not "potting soil"!) is often helpful. Root pruning to match top pruning is recommended. An



early feeding with fish emulsion or other good soluble plant food will stimulate growth. Give them your best southern exposure for sunlight or artificial lights. (see previous article).

In early March you can plant **onion** seeds (I like 2 varieties: Ailsa Craig and Cipollini) along with **Wave Petunias**. Refer to last month's article for details about seed starting. These plants are slow to start and require a long head start before transplanting out



e slow to start and require a long head start before transplanting out in late May so now is the time to sow them. Onion seedlings produce better & bigger onions and are much less expensive than sets (small bulbs grown from seeds last season) and come in better varieties than sets. You can also buy young onion seedlings ready to plant from many seed companies and garden stores later in the season but they are pricey. Most other seeds (vegetables & flowers) should wait until early April before starting. More on this in a future article.

Commit to **Composting** as one of the most important jobs every gardener can do. It's great for your soil and plants, keeps climate warming carbon out of the atmosphere, and reduces expensive hauling of materials to landfills or centralized composters.

The State of Vermont has been allocated RHP funds for FY20-FY23 that are intended to be used to address the needs of transitional housing for people recovering from substance use disorder in the State. The RHP Action Plan outlines priorities for the use of approximately \$3.3 million in federal funds being provided to the State.

This is a copy of the very first Chit Chat. The drawing here was done by Miles Richards he often would doodle pictures to fill in some space.

Chit Chat The would be typed out on typewriter using а stencil carbon type paper and no typing errors could be made as you would have to start all over again with a new stencil. After the stencil was done then it would go to mimeograph machine to run off each page and they would have to correlated be and stapled together. Then the mailing labels were typed out to be mailed. Some papers were hand delivered.

In the late 80's early 90's the paper would still be typed out but run through a copy machine with all the same process of putting together.

Miles When Richards took over in the late 90's, it was still typed out with а combination of some pages being computer generated and other pieces were cut and pasted. These made up pages which were taken to Express Copy to print, correlate, staple into a booklet or magazine style and Miles would have Sue our Town Clerk at the time print off the labels for him from her computer.

VOLUNIZER FIRE DEPARTMENT - James Garfield Potter, Fire Chief The Mt. Holly Volunteer Fire Department was organized in 1946. The very first piece of equipment was a secondhand Larabee truck, bou in Long Island, with donations from several residents. 2 years later a portable pump was added and throughout the years other additions were made; one of the most important was a tank truck, as it scon became evident that lack of water to fight the fires with was a big problem. Most of our equipment has been secondhand with the men working many hours to make them efficient.

In 1960 it was decided to build a much needed fire house for all theequipment; in 1966 a 1954 GMC pumper was bought and in 1968 the o tank truck was replaced with a 1954 GMC oil truck; again many hours were spent in rebuilding this piece of equipment for our use. Next year this truck will have to be replaced with something larger and more capable of handling the needs of our growing community. Besides working on the equipment the volunteers have attended schools on firefighting, and in the Ray's 25 years several 45-hour courses were taken. as well as intensive fraining in the local depart

CIVIL PREPAREDNESS

Civil Freparedness "means that a community is prepared to react promptly to save life and protect property if it is threatened or hit by a disaster or major emergency of any type. This requires that planning and preparatory actions be taken before there is an emergency?

planning and preparatory actions be taken <u>before</u> there is an emergency: For the town of Mt. Holly it means that a Unit be organized with knowledge of supplies, equipment and trained people to meet any emergency we may have. Besides the organization, at present underway, 8 people are enrolled in the Red Cross Advanced First Aid and Emergency Procedure course in Rutland. This course requires 56 hours to complete and demands recretifications every three years. Another course may be given in L,dlow in the near future.

given in L₁dlow in the near future. Besides our volunteer firemen, Civil Preparedness will give us intersection guards to assist in the safe passage of fire or emergency vehicles to the site. These guards will also act as guides for emergency vehicles drivers from other communities unacquainted with the area.

Communications with these guards, the firemen and first aiders will require a broader means than the present two fire phones. Volunteers will be needed, who are home, and can receive and pass on phone messages to those who will assist in the emergency.

A survey is being undertaken of volunteers and equipment available in the community; a quick look in this area indicates that there are 90 self employed residents. Some of these would have services and equipment to share with the Civil Freparedness Unit when necessary.

Notes from the Mount Holly Conservation Commission

In partnership with the Mount Holly Conservation Trust, we will be beginning a formal study of the vegetation around Star Lake. This will include both invasive and non-invasive species. When the study is concluded, results will be made available to the public. And the data will allow the MHCC to better support management of the Lake and surrounding area.

We have received a \$4,000 grant from Municipal Energy Resilience Program (MERP) for public outreach in community energy conservation. Plans for a public energy fair and support to residents to reduce their energy costs are being developed for this summer.

The Commission is also in the beginning stage of a plan to reach out to local land owners in creating foot paths and hiking trails that will make recreational opportunities more available to all interested town residents.
