Home of the Vermont State Terrestrial Fossil Let's save Mount Holly's venerable Will White Blacksmith Shop Museum



Dear Mount Holly Friends and Neighbors,

The Will White Blacksmith Shop has lost its bearings and desperately needs repair. We need your support to save and preserve this historic building, a cornerstone of our community.

Built in the 19th century, The Will White building functioned as a blacksmith shop from the mid-1800s to the 1930s. Subsequently, it became a tea room operated by his daughter Mildred. This was an informal spot for people to gather and spread the local news. In later years, the building was occupied by J. Warner Edminster, a "traveling druggist" who made his own concoctions, and printed the apothecary labels using a printing pre3ss he had acquired.

In 1969 the building became the original Community Historical Museum. In addition to the blacksmith forge and tools, the building houses an extensive collection that includes: apothecary and household items, early Crowley Cheese making equipment, a working printing press, the 1920s post office boxes used in the village, a beautiful antique surrey (carriage), and a restored sleigh. These and many other items depict the way people lived and worked.

Although significant repairs were done in the 199s, over time the Blacksmith Shop's structural integrity has sustained extensive

damage from deficient drainage and flooding in the creek that runs behind it. Using a grant from the Preservation Trust of Vermont, we obtained an engineer's report that highlighted the urgent need for repairs to the deteriorating framework that supports the building.

Based on subsequent estimates, we are seeking to raise \$150,000 to complete this vital restoration project.

This amount will enable us to complete the essential repairs to the foundation, stabilize the building structure, replace the roof, floor and siding, as well as repair windows. This will ensure the long term preservation of our collection and the museum's sustainability. In addition, these repairs will allow us to upgrade the exhibit spaces and improve accessibility.

The Mount Holly Community Historical Museum is a 501(c)3 nonprofit all volunteer organization. We encourage everyone to visit our Perkins House and The Will White Blacksmith Shop Museums, and appreciate the significance of these historic buildings and the wonderful

- 1. Call to Order at 6.02pm
- 2. Pledge of Allegiance: Mark Turco dedicated the pledge of allegiance to Paul Barton who had donated the flags to the Town Office.

3. Consideration of any changes and/or additions to the agenda: items 6b, 7a and 7c were tabled until the next meeting; appointment of Conservation Commission member added to 5c; Catering liquor license request added to item 6a; Ludlow Police Traffic enforcement services moved to follow item 6a; new item 6g Town office electrical systems; item 8 additional comment Katie Kleczkowski.

- 4. **Approval of June 10th Minutes.** Diana Garrow moved to approve the minutes, Mark Turco seconded, approved unanimously.
- 5. Reports
- a. Highway and Transfer Station Update Clinton Woolley: Road maintenance has been completed on Lake Ninevah Road, and culvert work on Hortonville Road. Mowing has started but has been delayed by an equipment failure. The Transfer Station was inspected with no contamination or major issues reported. A couple of signs are needed, and the inspector proposed measures to control odor and flies in the food scrap bins, including purchase of biodegradable bags. These are available at a cost, although Casella does not require them. Mr Woolley will take other recommended steps to see if this improves the situation. He also reported that Casella have introduced a cost of \$45

Paul Wellin requested the Town make repairs to a culvert at his property on Windy Hill Road. Mr Woolley noted this was not installed by the Town or up to Town standards so would not be Town responsibility. Mark Turco agreed to inspect along with Clinton Woolley. Mr Wellin also asked for calcium chloride to be applied on Hortonville Road to reduce dust; Mark Turco responded that due to the rainy conditions this is not effective.

- b. Listers' Report David Johnson
- i. **Grand List Errors and Omissions:** the utility companies (Vermont Transco, GMP and Comcast) had filed grievances with the Town which had not received relevant information from the State. Following receipt of that information the Grand List errors and omissions were rectified. There were no other errors or omissions.
- ii. Waiving Homestead Penalty: Diana Garrow moved to waive the Homestead Penalty, seconded by Jeff Chase, approved unanimously.
- c. Town Treasurer Update Elizabeth Karle
- i. **Monthly Income and Expenses Report:** the cash position is relatively good and should remain so until tax revenues come in. This partly reflects FEMA reimbursements for work undertaken in FY24.
- ii. FY26 Tax Rate: The tax rate has been set reflecting the State's rates which increase the Homestead rate by almost 16% and the non-homestead rate by 3.1%); the proposed rate for Mount Holly is 0.4823, representing approximately a 4.5% increase in the non-homestead rate and almost 15% in the homestead rate; almost three quarters of this is for education. Mark Turco made a motion to approve the tax rate at 0.4823, seconded by Diana Garrow, approved unanimously. Dennis Devereux stated that in his experience there may be some reduction in the education taxes later in the year. Liz Karle noted that the bills will go out no later than July 28th, and proposed the last date for the early payment discount be August 28th. Diana

Garrow made a motion to set the last date for a 4% early payment discount on taxes to be set for 28th August. Mark Turco seconded, approved unanimously.

- d. Planning Commission Update Jon McCann: tabled
- Conservation Commission Update Phil Crane. Phil Crane noted the interest by Birgir Nilsen to join the Conservation Commission and encouraged the Select Board to approve his nomination. He then asked Alexandra Yuster to speak regarding Star Lake. Ms Yuster noted that since the designation of

Star Lake as a wetland the proposed weed harvesting will require a permit costing approximately \$20,000 before any work can be done. The recent Arrowood Study of the Lake shows its good condition and the proposed selective harvesting would not affect that, and would improve opportunities for recreational use by the community. The Commission is proposing to write to State legislators to get a waiver allowing the weed harvesting and Ms Yuster asked for the Select Board's support for this initiative. Select Board members gave their support. Jeff Chase made a motion to appoint Birgir Nilsen to the Conservation Commission, seconded by Mark Turco, approved unanimously.

6. **New Business**

Belmont General Store Liquor License application/update on Belmont General Store (Alissa Chronert): Alissa Chronert reported that the General Store has now opened for limited hours while staffing options are being considered. She asked for approval of the 2nd degree liquor license. Mark Turco made a motion to approve the license application, Jeff Chase seconded, approved unanimously. Mark Turco stated that the Select Board had received a caterer's liquor license permit request for an event at 283 Okemo View Lane, also owned by Alissa Chronert. Ms Chronert stated that she was not involved in any way in the event. Dave Tilly stated that the site was offered at no cost to a neighbor for them to hold a



wedding and that he himself also had no involvement. Kevin Plew asked if this venue was now being used as a commercial wedding venue, despite earlier assurances to the Select Board that it would not; as such the venue should be properly permitted and the Town should have a chance to vote as to whether they want a wedding venue. Mark Turco responded that the Select Board Clerk would seek further clarification on this and that a decision on the License application would be made at a Special Meeting. Mark Turco also noted that the sketches of the elevations of the General Store show that it will improve the Town. Diana Garrow noted that the drawings raise questions regarding the Store's boundary line and whether the proposals will encroach on the Town's



right of way. Mark Turco responded that he and Clinton Woolley will make a site visit to review the details. Dave Tilly and Michael Chronert noted that the proposals would allow a stop sign on Belmont Road, helping to reduce speeding.

- b. Ludlow Police Department traffic enforcement services. Chief Jeffery Warfle of Ludlow Police Department asked what kind of services the Town is looking for in terms of hours, times of day and location. Ludlow can provide enforcement services at a rate of approximately \$80-100 per hour with all costs included in that amount. Services could be started in the next few weeks once details are agreed. Mark Turco responded that the Select Board will discuss and revert to the Chief.
- Appointment of Town Health Officer. Mark Turco made a motion to reappoint Chad Farrar as Town Health Officer for a three

year period, seconded by Jeff Chase, approved unanimously.

- d. Appointment of Board of Adjustment member: Mark Turco made a motion to reappoint Stephen Michel to the Board of Adjustment, seconded by Diana Garrow, approved unanimously.
- e. Land records software: Carol Garrow Woolley reported that the contract with Cotts for management of land records expires in September; a new proposal was received today. She would like the Select Board to consider switching the land records management to NEMRC. Jeff Chase asked that a representative of NEMRC come to the next Select Board meeting to present a proposal. He noted that a key issue will be transition of records.
- Purchase of laptop for Select Board Office: following review of three options, Diana Garrow made a motion to allow Faith Tempest to purchase a 17" HP laptop at a price of \$329. Seconded by Mark Turco, approved unanimously.
- Town Office electrical issues: Following some power issues in the Treasurer's office Elizabeth Karle asked for an assessment of the electrical system. Jeff Chase proposed getting quotes for a review.

7. **Old Business**

a. Review bids for Paving Hortonville Road: Jeff Chase gave the details of the three bids received: Fuller \$278,600, Pike \$290,675, and Wilk \$303,870. He noted that with the lowest bid there would also be funds left in the grant to connect to the intersection and undertake crack sealing. Diana Garrow moved to accept the Fuller bid plus \$30,000 for connection to the intersection and the remainder of the grant used for striping and crack sealing. Mark Turco seconded, approved unanimously.

b. Traffic Enforcement:

- Purchase of radar speed signs: Jeff Chase noted the two options, Radar Signs at \$3796 and Elon City at \$3000. He had received recommendations for Elon City from other towns. The Elon City sign is mobile and has the ability to track and record speeds and times. Elizabeth Karle noted that the entire budget for traffic enforcement is only \$6000. Mark Turco moved to purchase one sign, seconded by Diana Garrow, approved unanimously.
- ii. Speed limit on section of Rte 155: proposed letter to Vermont Traffic Committee. Mark Knoll had prepared a letter on behalf of the Select Board to which they agreed the contents. Mark Knoll reiterated his offer to coordinate signatures of residents to support the effort and be a point of contact. Christine Boudreau and Dennis Devereux both spoke of speeding traffic on Rte 155, including trucks. In response Jeff Chase suggested calling the trucking companies.

Citizen Comments:

a. Evelyn Tully Costa and Katie Kleczkowski - Hortonville Road dust issue

and request for speed limit sign: Mark Turco noted that the paving of Hortonville Road would stop the dust issue. Katie Kleczkowski asked for a speed limit sign on Hortonville Road to try to reduce speeding traffic. Mark Turco responded that signs are being stolen, but the Highway Department will check that there is adequate signage.

b. Dennis Devereux reported that the refurbishment of the Veterans Monument is complete. He also noted that a quote for tree removal at Carlton Cemetery will be submitted - he would like this to be funded through the unutilized cemetery maintenance budget.

- 2. Changes to agenda: none
- 3. Approval of minutes: Commissioner Schulz moved to approve the minutes of April 23rd 2025, seconded by Commissioner Jim Seward. Commissioners Schulz and Seward approved, Chair abstained, motion passed.

5. Correspondence

Subdivision proposals

i. Garrow: Mr Garrow submitted a new plat with revisions based on the requests at the last meeting. Chair and Commissioners reviewed the revisions and confirmed that all had been met except for clarity on the woodland/wetland and class 2 wetlands in parcel 4 which were either covered in text or unclear. Chair proposed scheduling a hearing with the presumption that the wetlands area will be better delineated. In discussion, the issue of the boundary line between Mr Garrow's property and that of Gary and Lori Norton. The plat recites that the parties "are entering into a Boundary Line Adjustment". The status of the adjustment was discussed and it appeared that it had not yet been finalized. Chair proposed that this should be done to avoid any future issues. Carol Garrow-Woolley asked about the process for this. Chair proposed that Chris Corsones prepare an agreement. Commissioner Schulz asked that the BLA be completed before the hearing. Chair concurred and proposed that the hearing be scheduled for 17th June at 6pm. Mr Norton asked about the access. Chair responded that the Town Highway location and a second option by the existing barn are noted on the submitted plat.

b. Email/Other: none

6. New Business:

a. Discussion on Regional Future Land Use Map (with Select Board): Devon Neary (Executive Director RRPC) had presented to the Select Board the future land use proposals in the draft Rutland Regional Plan and asked the Select Board and Planning Commission to provide feedback. Chair noted differences between the RRPC map and the Mount Holly Town Plan in designation of village centers.



Village designations allow more dense development, so a larger village center may allow this, although since Mount Holly has no zoning, the options to manage land development are limited. Chair also noted the way the map only notes a single land use, so it

does not allow carve outs within areas mapped as rural (current use) for other uses, specifically conservation. A formal response will be prepared and shared with RRPC. Commissioner Schulz suggested that a meeting with RRPC may be beneficial. Jeff Chase proposed sending the comments from the Select Board and asking for a specific response.

b. Subdivision permit amendment for PC 2021: Following a site visit by the PC Chair and AO to the Siegordner property on Rte 155, the Chair noted that the work being proposed (a new access) is an amendment to the subdivision permit issued in 2021 and there are two potential approaches – authorizing the AO to issue an administrative permit, or asking for a new sub-division application which will allow for a public hearing. Commissioner Jim Seward asked if a hearing

was necessary given that the proposals are to increase the vegetative buffer. Chair also noted that owner also has an interest in a future land subdivision. The Chair and Commissioner Schulz both supported a new application and hearing to amend the original permit, which will have a binding impact on the land use. Commissioners agreed. AO will communicate with Mr Siegordner.

- Blue Spruce Inn: The PC Chair and AO reported on the findings of a site visit on May 1st 2025. The owners represented that they had completely gutted one of the buildings to make it habitable, removed black mold and human waste, restored power and water, and made the wastewater system functional. They also stated they had undertaken work on the second existing building. The owners stated that the Fire Marshal who condemned the building in 2023 had visited and confirmed that he had previously condemned the buildings, but has not made any other follow up. The Chair reported that during the site visit the owners were informed that the property is in a Flood Hazard Area and that any substantial improvement of the property requires a Flood Hazard Area/ River Corridor permit and that they should complete the application for this permit. The Chair stated to the PC that there is clearly substantial reconstruction above the threshold stated in the bylaw which brings the requirement of the permit, and he informed the owners of that. Chair reported that the owners became somewhat testy, and the Chair informed them that this was not helpful. The Chair noted that there may be some dispute about this so the law must be applied clearly. Commissioner Jim Seward asked if the building the owners are living in has a foundation. Chair did not know.

Notes From Mount Holly Conservation Commission The MHCC has been busy on several fronts in recent weeks.

First, a BIG thank you to those who showed up in June to hand pull weeds from the beach and Lake Street areas at Star Lake. Using long-handled rakes and a great deal of determination, the volunteers cleared nearly 10 loaded tractor buckets of aquatic weeds from near the shore. Special thanks to Brigid Sullivan, Steve Hazelton and Carl Gnome for providing tractors, operators and a place to deposit the harvest. All that work will make the bottom barriers installed July 1 by the beach, and one soon to follow by the Lake Street boat launch, that much more effective in keeping those parts of the lake relatively weed free.

Commission members met with Olin Reed from the

Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation, who is the Permitting Specialist working on Mount Holly's application to use mechanical harvesting to clear the beach and boating areas in the future. Reed re-affirmed that Star Lake is now considered by the State as both a lake and a wetland. He also acknowledged that the water lilies are both native to Vermont... and a nuisance.

The Commission continues to work to try and navigate the state's stringent permitting requirements for Star Lake. And we plan to present to the community a 'Here is what we would like to do now' statement regarding improvements at the recreation area at the Lake. Many of these idea came from the very successful community meeting back in May and include increasing shaded areas, a play area and

improved accessibility. Recruiting local talent will no doubt be part of

any plan.

But it hasn't been all Star Lake all the time. Work also proceeds on other recreation areas, including walking/hiking/biking trails off Shunpike Road, with ideas to expand to other sites.

The Ash Borer mitigation program also continues apace; with participants able to inoculate their trees against the Emerald Ash Borer through the program set up by Commission members Phil Crane and David Martin. For more information email: mounthollycc@gmail.com

Winsome Fly found in Mount Holly

Thanks to an observant biologist in Washington State a Winsome Fly (Istocheta aldrichi) egg on a Japanese Beetle reported on

the Mount Holly Biodiversity Project iNaturalist website was seen and confirmed. The Winsome Fly is a natural parasite of Japanese Beetles and was introduced into the U.S years ago in an effort to control the destructive beetle introduced accidently from Japan in 1912. This report is a great example of how the iNaturalist program can find important information through scientific collaboration. A good reason to get out exploring nature and report your finding on iNaturalist.

If you find a Japanese Beetle (yes, they have begun emerging now)

It is already doomed, will not be able to lay its normal 30-40 eggs, and after the Winsome Fly larva hatches inside the beetle and eats its insides it will emerge as a small fly that will go on to lay its own eggs on Japanese Beetles. Biological control at work!

volunteers, in recognition of those whose efforts have stood out in the creation of


local programming. The following is the list of the four categories that are awarded annually, along with this year's recipients and their projects.

- Awarded \$14,000 in scholarships to seven area graduates. This program has resulted in over \$285,000 in scholarships since its creation
- · Raising the funds necessary to support scholarship awards and programs for local and regional groups through the Penny Sale, Duck Race, and Chili Cook-off
- · Distributed books to schools in our district, including personalized books for elementary school youngsters
- · Seeking partnership with area Rotary clubs for LRC's global grant proposals
- · Continuing to ensure that LRC members still had fun doing all it could to help local, regional, and international groups in need of our assistance

Thomson indicated that he will become an Assistant Governor in the District, which covers New Hampshire and Vermont.

On accepting the gavel from Thomson, Kevin Barnes said he would continue to support efforts to address our goals. "I believe we have achieved a great deal and it is my intention to see that we continue to work on these goals and the new ones that will develop. This club may be small when measured in numbers against large Rotary clubs but it is huge in terms of what it can do and will do."




